REGULAR SESSION

TIME/PLACE: A regular meeting of the Douglas County School District No. 4 Board of Directors was convened at 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday, April 13, 2022, in the multi-purpose room of Eastwood Elementary School located at 2550 SE Waldon Avenue in Roseburg, Oregon, in person with an electronic link available.

CALL TO ORDER / PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: Board Chair Rebecca Larson called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m., and invited Student Services Director, Melissa Roberts, to lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

ATTENDANCE: Board members were in attendance, along with Superintendent Cordon and Cabinet members. RHS leadership student, Marin Gray was present, with Emma Kahler excused.

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE BOARD / REVIEW OF AGENDA

Superintendent Cordon welcomed everyone here in person, as well as those joining the meeting remotely. He offered congratulations to student representative, Marin Gray, on her acceptance this fall to Harvard University. In reviewing the agenda, Jared announced that the administrative working retired recommendation is now included within the Consent Agenda.

WELCOME TO EASTWOOD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL: Chair Larson thanked Principal Thompson and the Eastwood staff for hosting this evening and acknowledged the fabulous artwork on the walls courtesy of the talented students of Eastwood Elementary.

STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE REPORT: RHS leadership student, Marin Gray, reported all the current and upcoming activities at the high school. In honor of Staff Appreciation Week beginning April 18th, FFA students potted flowers for staff district-wide in partnership with the Wellness Crew. She added that Assistant principals were honored recently during national Vice Principal week. FBLA competition resulted in 9 first place finishes. Aiyana Brown received a \$2,000 scholarship, and 22 students qualified for the national competition to be held in Chicago! Middle and high school bands performed Monday and the concert choir qualified for state. The recent PRIDE Night was deemed a success. Director Howard Johnson moved to approve the Consent Agenda and Director Ann Krimetz seconded. The Motion passed unanimously.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION:

Chair Rebecca Larson opened Public Participation and asked Assistant Superintendent Michelle Knee to explain the process for the "raise your hand" feature in Zoom for those attending remotely and explained that she would advise speakers as their two-minute limit approached.

Linda Snyder, Roseburg resident, expressed her concern about kids wearing masks for six months, stating it is very bad for their health and mental state. The requirement was controlled by the state, not locally, and she believes it is a permanent mask mandate. Her research leads her to believe that masks are not effective on viruses and referenced statistics from New York and Florida. In her view, this is a control issue, and she thinks they are planning on masking again if the CDC has their way.

Chair Larson announced that with public participation concluded, those individuals present for the student and staff awards were welcome to remain, but we understand if they preferred to go celebrate. The attendees were given a few minutes to make their departure.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT (copy attached)

Superintendent Cordon noted that some items were previously covered during Marin's report. We are accelerating our work around the school bond campaign. Jared took the opportunity to express thanks to Communications Coordinator, Chelsea Duncan, and the Board for getting the message out. A bond tour is scheduled at RHS on April 26th from 5:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Patrons may have seen the Board Chair presenting at the Roseburg City Council meeting where the council unanimously approved support of the bond. In honor of our amazing students, Jared noted that RHS and Fremont students who competed at the state FBLA competition resulted in more than two dozen qualifying to attend the National Leadership Conference this summer in Chicago. Fremont and Jo Lane middle school students joined with homeschool students in the musical performance of "Frozen Jr." RHS drama's "Sense & Sensibility" had additional performances this weekend.

Jared shared the exciting results of varsity student-athletes achieving GPA results as follows:

Fall Sports: 3.55Winter Sports: 3.41Spring Sports: 3.43

The overall GPA for RHS sports for 2021-2022 is 3.46. Jared reflected that as we think about our democracy and country, because of our kids, we are in great hands.

The superintendent pointed out that our teachers are continuing to do amazing work in inspiring our students to grow and think for themselves by providing meaningful experiences and opportunities.

At the April 27th Board Work Session, the Board will engage in conversation regarding our Strategic Plan that will drive the joint Board and Superintendent goals as we work together over the next 3-5 years. Jared also shared that he and UCC President, Dr. Rachel Pokrandt, are working to forge a closer partnership for developing programs for kids and illuminating pathways to career opportunities, including welding, science, and medicine. They presented some ideas during a presentation at the Chamber of Commerce for developing strong partnerships with our middle schools, high school and the college. We look forward to sharing more information in the future.

INDIVIDUAL REPORTS BY DIRECTORS

Director Charles Lee noted how happy he was to see everyone tonight in person.

Director Ann Krimetz shared that she had a nice time working with RVS Principal, Dani Jardine and Assistant Superintendent, Michelle Knee, on curriculum development, including the new health curriculum being considered for our elementary students. Staff are doing a good job in piloting the options. She provided assurance that the district strives to be transparent with parents, and inclusive, noting that this is not always the case in other parts of the country. We are committed to keeping our doors open for parents, who will have the opportunity later this month to come in and view the proposed curriculum at the district office. She offered that most parents will be satisfied when they are looking at some really exciting parts of the

curriculum. Director Krimetz is also looking forward to the May bond. An acquaintance purchased a headboard for her Airbnb from an RHS woodworking student and plans to purchase additional pieces. Our students are learning marketable skills!

Director Howard Johnson took the opportunity to share that he attended the City Council Meeting remotely. He was quite proud of the job our Board Chair did in presenting and answering questions, observing that the information was well presented and received. Good job!

Director Rod Cotton shared that he also observed the City Council Meeting via Zoom, and agreed that Chair Larson and committee representative, Lance Colley, did a great job. He appreciated their work very much. The testimonies and letters to the editor in the local paper have been spot on and well-thought out. In particular, the teachers at RHS who live in that building every day have just been great. He encouraged everyone to attend the bond open house on the 26th. Again, he is just really impressed with the letters and comments and hope it works out well.

Chair Rebecca Larson shared how wonderful it was to see Director Krimetz enjoying herself at the high school play. She expressed gratitude for the support staff have shown for the bond, and for our dedicated teachers. She noted that the play was put on by one of our first-year teachers, and she understands how much time and effort goes into one of these productions. It's wonderful to see expanded opportunities extended to homeschooled students. Teacher Appreciation Week is coming up soon, and she acknowledged the work done by our teachers and staff this time of year as the weather improves and kids get antsy.

ADJOURNMENT: With all regular business before the Board completed, Chair Larson adjourned the meeting at 6:33 p.m.
