Summer Reading Suggestions 2022 Entering Grade 4

Sharing Books with Older Children

Here is a selection of books for you and your family to enjoy over the summer months and a few simple tips to help parents and caregivers nurture a child's love of reading. Many of these titles can be found at your local public library and <u>Sora</u>, our online eBook and audiobook collection. Students should try to read every day and are asked to read at least five chapter books of their own choice during the summer months. Your teacher will provide one or two of these five books, depending on your grade. You may also want to refer to this list throughout the year when borrowing books from the school library.

Make it a family value. Children are expert observers. Whether you prefer to read books, blogs, manuals or magazines, let your child see you enjoy reading.

Make reading a social activity. Talk with your child about what she or he is reading or what you have read together. Start a parent-child book club. Which is better: the book or the movie? Sometimes children will be motivated to read a book because they liked the movie. Why not listen together to Roald Dahl's *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*, see the movie, and at the conclusion of the audiobook, celebrate by whipping up a dish from Dahl's *Revolting Recipes* cookbook?

Use the books as conversation starters and allow books to lead to other learning. Reading aloud is a wonderful way to bridge discussions on topics that you may not know how to bring up. As children get older, you can choose material that leads into conversations about relationships, choices, current events, religion, and other relevant subjects.

Use audiobooks. Listening to audiobooks benefits all readers! They are an easy way to introduce children to books above their reading level and model good interpretive reading and critical listening skills. Audiobooks can also provide a bridge to important topics of discussion for parents and children who can listen together while commuting to sporting events, music lessons, or other destinations.

Make it part of your summer routine. Try to encourage your child to read 20-30 minutes a day. You can make reading a part of your child's evening routine, or perhaps a morning activity of "breakfast and books" works better for your family. The goal is to encourage your child to pick up the habit of reading.

Portico Reeves' secret identity as Stuntboy allows him to use his superpower to keep everybody safe, but when his superhero parents start fighting a lot he feels the responsibility to save them. (A Schneider Family Book Award honor)

★★★★Weatherford, Carole Boston. *Unspeakable: The Tulsa Race Massacre.*

Author Weatherford and illustrator Cooper join forces to present this important story with sensitivity and care for younger readers. (The 2022 Coretta Scott King Book and Coretta Scott King Illustrator Award winner, a Caldecott Honor Book, and a Sibert honor book)

★★★Wang, Andrea and Jason Chin. *Watercress*.

A Chinese American girl, too embarrassed to eat the watercress her family picked from the roadside, learns of her mother's childhood experience with famine in China. (The 2022 Caldecott Medal winner, a Newbery Medal honor book, and the 2022 Asian/Pacific American Award for Literature Picture Book winner)

*Griffin, Adele. All Pets Allowed: A Blackberry Farm Story.

When Becket and her twin brother, Nicholas, adopt new pets from the local shelter, Becket's dream dog turns out to be a shy scaredy-pooch, and Nicholas's cat is more outgoing and attention-seeking than he was expecting.

*Maguire, Gregory. Cress Watercress.

An animal adventure story about growing up, moving on, and finding community.

*Phelan, Matt. The Sheep, the Rooster, and the Duck: A Tale from the Age of Wonder.

Farm animals and French children unite to save the fledgling United States from a scheming mastermind in this airy 18th-century adventure.

Fantasy, Science Fiction, Spooky, and the Supernatural

Barnhill, Kelly. The Girl Who Drank the Moon.

An epic fantasy about a young girl raised by a witch, a swamp monster, and a perfectly tiny Dragon, who must unlock the powerful magic buried deep inside her.

*Cate, Annette Leblanc. A Dragon Used to Live Here.

This multilayered story blends adventure and humor, medieval tropes and modern sensibility, in a satisfying read for the whole family.

*Córdova, Zoraida. Valentina Salazar is Not A Monster Hunter.

Eleven-and-a-half-year-old Valentina Salazar grew up as a monster protector until her father's loss, but when a video of a mythical egg appears, Valentina convinces her older brother and sister to help her find and save it——all while avoiding the monster hunters who want to destroy it.

*Lloyd-Jones, Emily. Unseen Magic.

Eleven-year-old Fin has never felt safe until she and her mother move to the magic-infused town of Aldermere in the Pacific Northwest, but when the town is suddenly overrun with disturbances Fin is the only one who knows why—and she's the only one who can stop the havoc.

*The Provensen Book of Fairy Tales. Compiled by Alice and Martin Provensen

*Khan, Hena. Zara's Rules for Record-Breaking Fun.

Zara Saleem is the queen of the neighborhood. When Naomi moves in, she feels threatened. To reclaim her crown, Zara decides to break a Guinness World Record for the attention.

*Matheson, Christie. Shelter.

A moving story about family, friendship, and the meaning of "home" when you don't have a house of your own.

Palacio, R. J. Wonder.

Ten-year-old Auggie Pullman, who was born with extreme facial abnormalities and was not expected to survive, goes from being home-schooled to entering fifth grade at a private middle school in Manhattan, which entails enduring the taunting and fear of his classmates as he struggles to be seen as just another student.

*Swender, Jennifer. Stuck.

A coming-of-age story about a boy who is used to flying under the radar, and the classroom of kids determined to help him stand out.

Key West, Florida is far different from her New Jersey home in many ways, but with the help of her mischievous cousins and through her own industrious spirit, she's determined to explore her new island surroundings.

The true story of the young surgeon who, with the help of his canine lab heroes, successfully isolated the pancreatic secretions later known as insulin, saving countless lives in the process.

*LaMotte, Lily. Measuring Up.

Cici has recently moved to Seattle from Taiwan and desperately misses A-má, her grandmother. To pay for a plane ticket for A-má to visit her, Cici hopes to win a cash prize through a junior chef competition.

*Paulsen, Bree. Garlic and the Vampire.

Someone new has taken up residence at the castle across the hill from Witch Agnes's Garden. Now it's up to Garlic and her veggie friends to scope out the situation and learn a bit about bravery along the way.

*Probert, Tim. Lightfall: The Girl and the Galdurian.

Bea lives with her aging and forgetful adopted grandfather, the Pig Wizard, protecting their flame jar and helping gather ingredients for his potions. On a foray into the woods for supplies, Bea falls out of a tree and is rescued by the last Galdurian, an extinct people responsible for the inventions that bring light to their dying planet.

*Riess, Natalie. Dungeon Critters.

In this mad-cap fantasy adventure, a group of quirky animal friends use their various Dungeons and Dragons skills to defeat a botanical monstrosity and investigate a plot for the crown.

*Robinson, Robin. No One Returns from the Enchanted Forest.

When earthquakes threaten a subterranean goblin, sister Pella and Bix worry they'll have to leave their home forever.

*Sell, Chad. The Cardboard Kingdom #2: Roar of the Beast.

Nate is positive he saw a monster, but none of his friends believe him.

*Torres, J. Stealing Home.

After being forced onto a Japanese internment camp, Sandy feels like he's in another universe. But by bringing his love of baseball into his situation, both as philosophy and as a pastime, he's able to hold onto hope of a better future.

Bradley, Kimberly Brubaker. The War That Saved My Life.

A young disabled girl and her brother are evacuated from London to the English countryside during World War II, where they find life to be much sweeter away from their neglectful mother.

- DiCamillo, Kate. The Beatryce Prophecy.
 - DiCamillo returns to fairy-tale mode with the story of a girl destined to unseat a king.
- Park, Linda Sue. Prairie Lotus.

In Dakota Territory in the 1880s, bicultural Hanna (her mother is Chinese-Korean and her father is white) face racism and resistance to change as they try to make a home for themselves.

*Tarshis, Lauren. I Survived the Wellington Avalanche, 1910. (A series. Book 22)

*Peirce, Lincoln. *Max and the Midknights:Tower of Time.* (A series. Book 3)

Max's twin is public enemy number one, and it's up to the Midknights to find her before time runs out! But dangers loom like bloodthirsty trolls, murderous pirates, and even a ruthless king—or two. Can Max and her band of loyal friends unlock the mystery of her past?

Each month, Young People's Poet Laureate, Naomi Shihab Nye recommends a book of poetry for children. Selections include classics of children's literature, adult collections that are well suited to children, as well as newly published books.

Series, Best Loved and Newer Titles

*Arnold, Elana K. Just Harriet.

The first book in this new series introduces Harriet Wermer, who is out of sorts because she is being sent to stay with her grandmother at her bed-and-breakfast on Marble Island for the entire summer. Nothing seems to be going her way until she is faced with a mystery to be solved.

*Butler, Dori Hillestad. Dear Beast.

Simon the cat has always taken good care of Andy, but when Andy's father moves out and adopts a dog that Simon calls Beast, the cat gets increasingly jealous that Andy may grow to love a new pet. Simon and Beast engage in a correspondence that is both funny (complete with misspelled words) and heartwarming.

*Higgins, Carter. Audrey L. and Audrey W.: Best Friends-ish.

Audrey Locke strives to be the best at everything, but it seems that whatever she does is never enough. When a new girl, also named Audrey, enrolls in her class, Audrey L. contemplates how she and the new Audrey might become friends. Readers of Annie Barrows' *Ivy and Bean* will clamor for this new series.

*Kelly, Entrada Erin. Surely Surely Marisol Rainey.

One of Marisol's least-favorite things is gym class, especially when Coach Decker announces that they will be playing kickball, so Marisol and her best friend Jada ask the best (and stinkiest) athlete they know, Marisol's big brother Oz, for help.

Look, Lenore. Alvin Ho.

Alvin Ho fears almost everything, but when he is in the comfort of his home, he takes the identity of a superhero called Firecracker Man. He reaches out to his brothers and father to help him conquer his fears.

McDonald, Megan. Judy Moody.

Judy Moody lives up to her name, because she is very moody. She sometimes encounters teacher trouble, and through her antics in the classroom, on the playground, at home, or in the neighborhood, she reveals her individuality and displays a giant attitude.

Mills, Claudia. After-School Superstars.

A group of friends of various ethnicities and genders take rotating turns in the spotlight in this series, which has them explore new skills in the after-school program at their elementary school.

Watson, Renée. Ways to Make Sunshine.

Nine-year-old Ryan is a vivacious and resilient fourth-grader who is struggling with tough changes in her life. When her father loses his job and takes one that pays much less, the family is forced to move to a smaller home.

Sora, the C. V. Starr's Online Audiobook and eBook Collection

Visit Sora for a selection of audiobooks your child might enjoy.

Sora encourages many of the traditional independent reading habits students learn during library such as perusing books, checking out and returning books, putting books on hold, and reading books by the same author. Sora also keeps track of time spent reading (a reading log of sorts), includes a built-in dictionary, and students can create their own lists of books they want to read.

Your child has access to two eBook collections:

- 1. St. Hilda's & St. Hugh's collection
- 2. Hudson Valley Library Association (HVLA) consortium collection

During the summer months, your child can access Sora by installing the Sora app on your personal device from the Apple App Store or Google Play Store, or go to soraapp.com. Please remember to sign in with your child's SHSH's gmail credentials.

The HVLA, and any public library collection, must be added to your child's Sora account manually the first time, and then will remain linked. For access to public libraries, a library card from that institution is required. You can apply online for a public library eCard by visiting your public library's website.


Social Emotional Learning


