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
MILLFIELD PREP **GIVING DAY**

Uniform -






SCIENCE

Year 7 science lessons have been all about acids and alkalis recently. Here is **Enid** who has made a lovely pattern using universal indicator; testing substances to see what pH they are. There are acids and alkalis in your house, for example lemon contains citric acid, vinegar's scientific name is ethanoic acid and your toothpaste is most likely alkaline! Year 7 have also been carrying out neutralisation reactions, which is when you add acid and alkali together and you make some salt and water. The boys here are hoping that when they evaporate the water from their bright blue solution, they will get some lovely big crystals of copper sulphate.





WESSEX WATER



Last week, Year 5 were lucky enough to visit the Wessex Water treatment centre in Ashford. The day was split into three sections, which helped explain how the water arrived at our taps from both rivers and reservoirs, and our drains. Following the trip, we asked the children to write a recount of their day. Here are some of the things they recalled:

"Wessex Water collect and clean around 20,000,000 litres of water a day!" - Georgina Fraser

"We compared lots of different waters; dirty river water, old juice, washing up water and lots more! This showed that fresh water out of a tap is not instant, and it takes a large process to clean it." - Hugh Murray

"We were shown two bottles filled with the same river water. One was dirtier than the other because on the day it was sampled, it had been raining and it contained the churned up mud from the river." - Kitty Danner

"It was amazing to hear that they purify 20 million litres of water every day. If we use 143 litres a day, then they produce water for 140,000 people!" - Hester Horgan

"We found out that the water from the water purification process was used to make fertilizer." - Flynn Edwards

"There were some swans nesting in the reservoir, it was amazing. There were six eggs." - Will Billige

Launched in 2015, Discord has steadily emerged as a major player in the online communication marketplace, certainly as far as gamers are concerned. Indeed, with the ability to coordinate gameplay and talk tactics with multiple fellow players in real time, it has also become the collaborative platform of choice for many professional e-sports competitors.

The flip side of Discord's success is that in addition to genuine gamers who simply want to improve their playing experience or discuss their favourite titles, it's also attracted unsavoury individuals, who use the platform to post extreme political views, belittle other users or share explicit content. NUTRITION TALK




Our U11A team placed 4th: Isabella Mattar-Peake, Maddie Maddock, Emma Champion and Isabelle Paterson.

MESSAGE FROM MR JORY

Another amazing week flies by in Pre-Prep. The chicks are almost ready to fly the nest and move to their new home. The Pre-School children are observing carefully as the tadpoles are starting to change into froglets.

Pre-School have been planting seeds in the new planters and making wormeries. Ask them what seeds they have been planting? Reception have been working hard on their letter formation, as well as learning about different artists in the outside role-play 'Art Studio'. Can they remember which artist they have been learning about this week? It begins with a P... Year 1 have been using their imagination to write about the wildlife that might be in their gardens and what they might be doing or eating. Ask them what they wrote about? Year 2 have been learning about position and direction, using mathematical language to direct each other carefully and safely. Ask them to direct you from one room to the other using their mathematical language.

In assembly, we discussed the importance of positivity and happiness. We read the story 'Incredible You' to remind ourselves how brilliant we are and to celebrate everything that we achieve. PLANTING FLOWERS



Pre-School started the week planting flowers in the new planters. Pupils planted cornflowers, bidens, campions and nasturtiums which will attract insects and bugs to our garden area. We then planted some sunflowers seeds and are very excited to see how tall they grow!







Whilst the pupils were gardening, they found a worm and decided they wanted to learn more about them. Inspired by their fact finding, the pupils made a wormery to see how worms move under the ground. They worked in teams to make their wormeries and layered soil and sand inside large plastic bottles. They then took the wormeries to Forest School to find the most important ingredient, the worms! The pupils had a fantastic time at Forest School looking for the worms under the soil and tree trunks. They then popped them inside our wormeries and added leaf litter to the top and sprayed them with water. Black paper was also wrapped around the outside to make the worms environment really dark and they were placed under the table in the Pre-School. Over the coming days, we will add some vegetable/fruit peelings for the worms to feed on. We can't wait to see what will happen!
