



INTRODUCTION

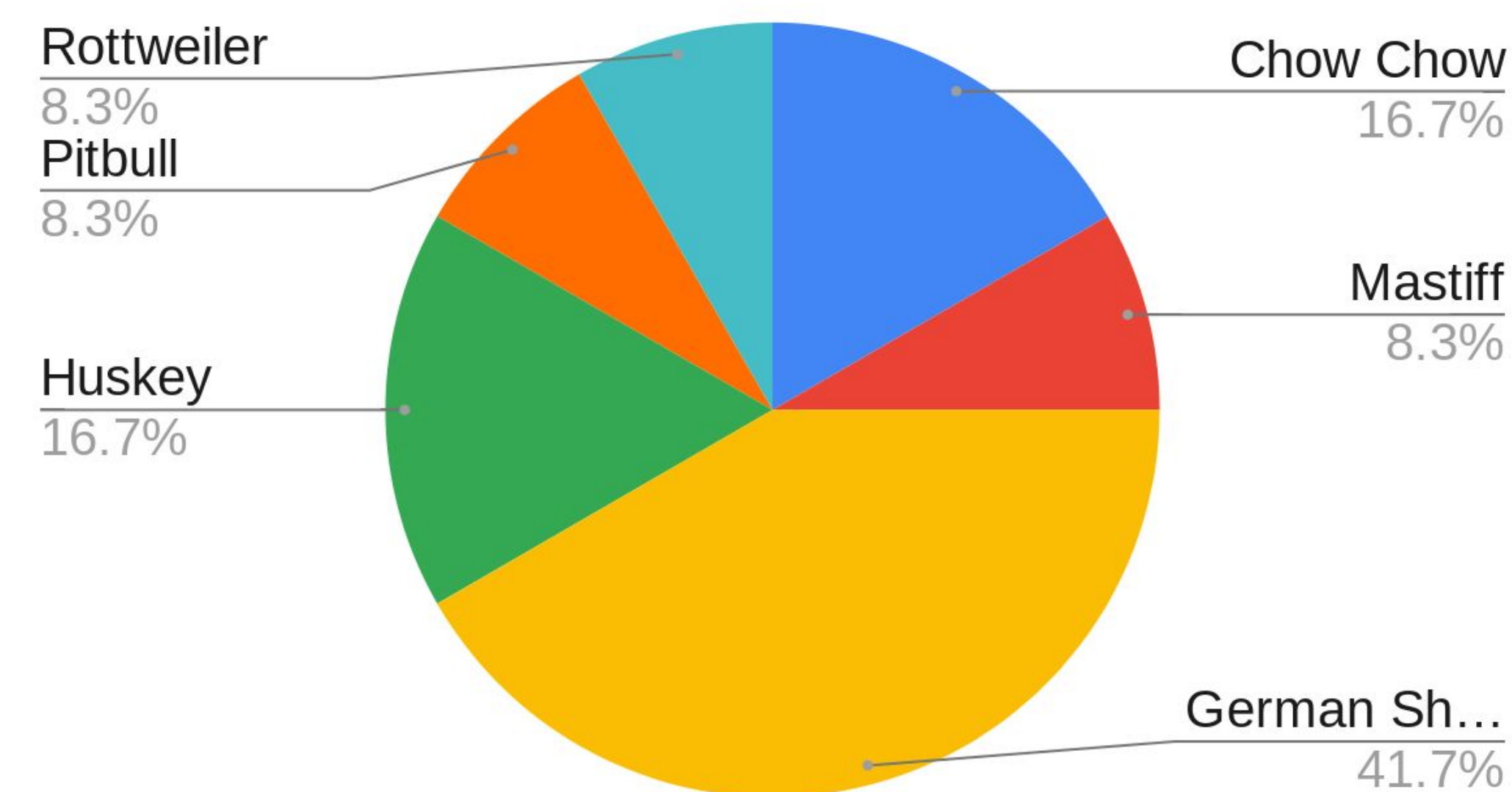
My overall question was..

RESEARCH METHODOLOGIES steps

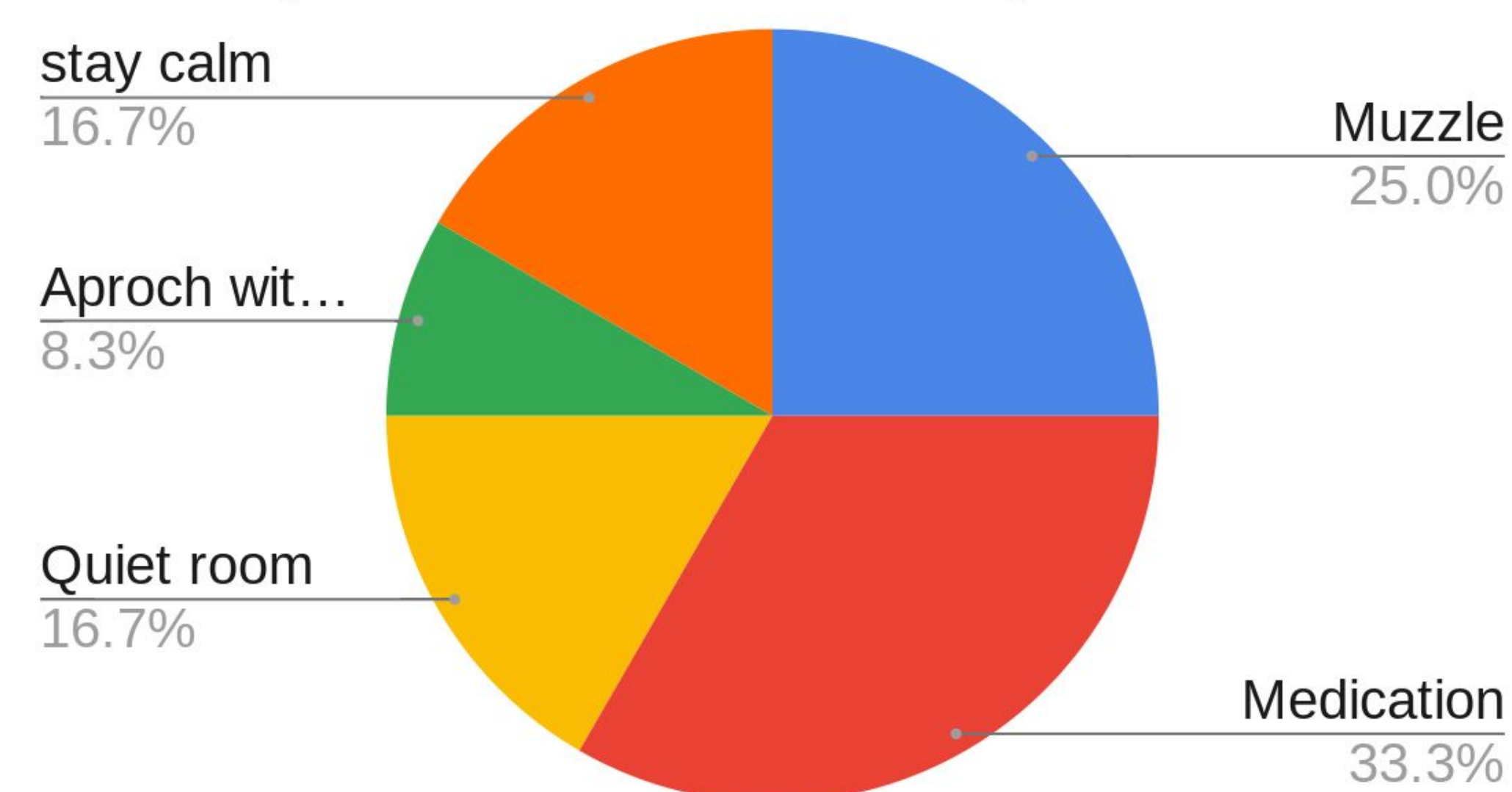
1. Figure out a plan, question and overall idea.

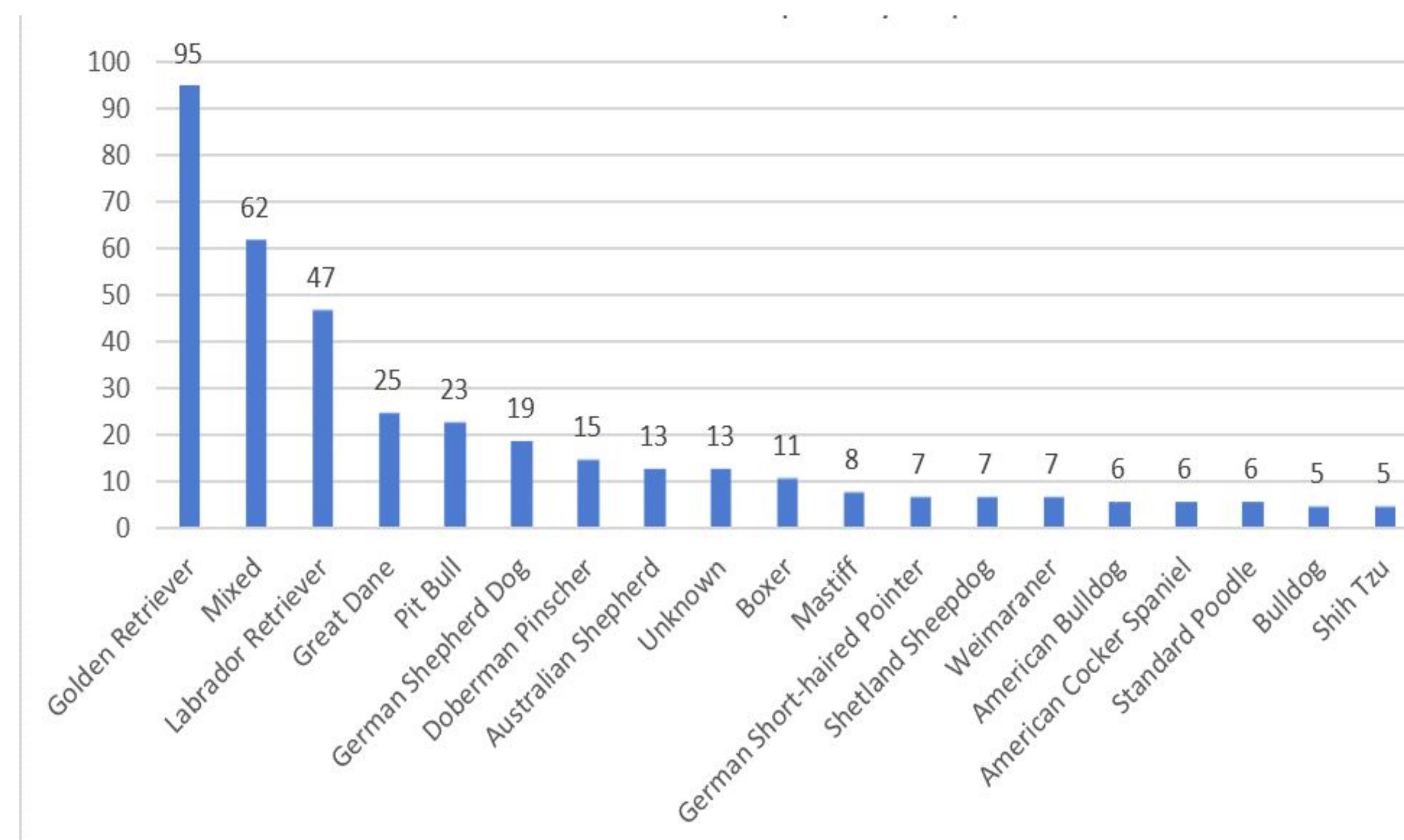
Most difficult breed of dog?
