Talk Sup Week 40 Review and Preview

June 15, 2020



Good afternoon Sayreville! I hope you had a nice and relaxing weekend. Welcome to the **last** edition of *Talk Sup Review and Preview* for the 2019-20 school year. In fact, you will not receive another from me until **September 1**st.



As you know, both in-person and virtual instruction for this unprecedented school year ended last Thursday. However, before we begin the arduous process of preparing for what instruction may look like in September, we would like to take the time to express to our staff and parents our sincere gratitude for EVERYTHING you did to either directly or indirectly promote the best possible learner outcomes for the children in Sayreville, especially considering the obvious challenges that we had to contend with during the

pandemic. Please know that the Sayreville Board of Education, Administration, and I deeply appreciate and fiercely admire all that you do for your children and students. We know all too well how hard you work and how much you sacrifice every day for them. In fact, not a day goes by in which I do not count my blessings and feel forever grateful to have the privilege of serving this district and working alongside of you to make a difference in the precious lives of our students.







That said, the end of a school year is also a time for us to say goodbye. For those members of our staff who will be pressing on through the summer, we thank you in advance for extending learning and for helping us prepare for 2020-21. For those of you who will be leaving and returning in September, we wish you a relaxing and rejuvenating summer break, and anxiously await your safe return back to us. Finally, for those who will be leaving us for one reason or another, please know the indelible impact you have made on all of us, and how grateful we are to you for the service you

have provided to our district and most importantly, our students. Please remember that goodbyes are not forever, nor are they the end. They simply mean, we'll miss you until we meet again.

Speaking of extending learning over the summer, once again our Governor has put us and other school districts in a very challenging position through the timing of his latest announcement to allow for in-person summer school instruction. While I do not disagree with his decision, the timing of it, which came weeks after decisions were made on private summer camps, day care centers, youth sports, and even the opening of private and public schools, was to say the least bewildering. Nonetheless, while we will still be performing virtual instruction for students in need of middle school credit completion, as well as for students with disabilities who are eligible to receive extended school year (ESY) in accordance with their individualized education programs, we are now considering whether to provide some form of in-person instruction during the second half of ESY. If our staff is willing and we can ensure that we can safely provide instructional and therapy services without putting them or our students at risk of being exposed to COVID-19, we will implement an undetermined level of in-person instruction during the second half of ESY beginning on or about July 22nd. Delaying it until then will give us the time that we will need in order to post for additional staff, such as bus drivers and aides, nurses, and paraprofessionals. It will also allow us more time to purchase personal protective equipment, to develop procedures and guidelines in alignment with the guidance provided by the New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE), and to train the staff on them. More information for applicable students will be forthcoming from Mr. Knaster, our Director of Pupil-Special Services.



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With regard to the 2020-21 school year, many parents and staff have inquired with me about whether we will be allowed to reopen our schools for in-person instruction on **September 3rd**, which will be the **first day of school** for students in **grades 1-12**. Although I think we can all agree that trying to predict what our Governor will decide to do that far in advance is clearly an act of futility, as of this moment our district is preparing for one of several possible scenarios. The first, which is probably the least likely, is that our schools will reopen for all students with or without social distancing restrictions. The second, which is more likely, is that we will open with virtual instruction for all students before easing back into in-person instruction in schools over the course of several weeks. The third, which is probably the most likely, is that we will open with some hybrid form of in-person and virtual instruction with either an alternating split schedule, or simultaneous in-person/virtual instruction for parents to select based upon whether they are comfortable sending their children to school or not. Although this is the last Talk Sup of the 2019-20 school year, upon receiving any information about the opening of schools for in-person instruction in September, I will share it with our entire school community via a broadcast email.



During last week's Talk Sup, I reported to you that there was currently no vendor contracted to provide subscription busing for our students at the middle school and high school who are not eligible for district transportation, as Durham School Services was no longer willing to provide it. However, as you may have noticed from the Bomber Blast sent out last Wednesday, Melanie Yetman and Jessica Esposito, graduates from the Class of 2020, have graciously volunteered to find and negotiate with a bus vendor to provide these services. As per their letter that they sent to the community, which you

In fact, as per the comments that I made in my pre-taped address to the Class of 2020, while we apologize for not being able to provide them now with the commencement ceremony they so fittingly deserved, I had the time of my life going to their homes to present to them their diploma in front of their family and closest friends. Furthermore, I know that all our administrators, board members, and faculty advisors felt the same way. Nevertheless, as I also noted in my speech, if social distancing requirements relax



enough in the summer for us to hold a ceremony with the entire Class of 2020 and their parents, we will consider scheduling one provided that our students and staff would willing and able to participate.
