Talk Sup Week 38 Review and Preview

June 8, 2020

Good morning Sayreville! I hope you had a nice and relaxing weekend. Welcome to another edition of *Talk Sup Review and Preview*.



Although this week our focus will be on ending an unprecedented school year and celebrating our amazing young men and women from the Class of 2020, who will be participating in their last week of school and graduating from our school district, before we do, it is essential that we reflect upon the fight to end the senseless violence, racial oppression, and social injustice going on right now in our country, state, and even local community. As an educator, I have dedicated myself and career toward promoting the

most positive outcomes for ALL children, and have harnessed the strong belief that education is the great equalizer in our society, as it provides ALL the children we serve with the power of possibility and the opportunities that will enable them to aspire to great heights, achieve their goals, and live the happy and productive life they deserve and are entitled to in this country. However, it is painfully obvious nationally and even locally, that we are failing in that endeavor, as systemic racism is still rooted in our society and quite possibly in our school district. While contrary to what you may have heard or read on social media, our district has never nor will ever tolerate overt discriminatory, biased, or racially offensive behavior by anyone in our school community and will exercise our board of education policies and regulations, as well as state and local laws to impose consequences against anyone that we can substantiate has committed them, but I would be naïve to suggest that covert or hidden forms of systemic racism do not exist in our school district culture and curriculum.

In fact, within the past several years our district has addressed incidences of racial bias, including one just recently. Although the reaction by the district to this intolerable and disgusting behavior has always been appropriately addressed in accordance with our BOE code of conduct and state law, they are still a painful reminder that we are not effectively teaching our community members, particularly our students, the essential message of diversity and that we must not only respect differences in others, we must embrace and appreciate them. Moreover, while I strongly denounce the false accusations and slanderous attacks on the character of some of our students and staff, including me, made recently by individuals on social media, we clearly hear the underlying message of mistreatment and injustice expressed by current and former black students. Therefore, effective immediately, our district will begin the meticulous process of self-assessing and reexamining our cultural norms, school climates, and curriculum in order to identify assumptions, biases, and other elements of systemic racism, as well as deficiencies that may be fostering it. It is inherently important that ALL members of our school community, especially our students of color, know that we equally love and value them very much, will turn over every stone possible to ensure their physical safety and emotional well-being, and will use the powerful weapon of education to promote the most fruitful opportunities for them to succeed and to change the world they and we will live in.

As per my Off Day Update email to the community yesterday (click here to see it), which will be the last one that I send to the community this school year, based upon the absence of a formal decision by Governor Murphy and guidance from NJDOE, we had no other choice than to cancel Camp XL and Summer Enrichment. Instead, this summer we will only be providing virtual instructional and therapy services for students with disabilities who, based upon what is stipulated in their individualized education programs (IEP), are eligible for extended school year (ESY). In addition, we will be providing virtual instructional services for students in the middle school in need of credit completion.

Educating Today's Learners to Be Tomorrow's Leaders



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Later today and tomorrow afternoon, we will be delivering high school diplomas during intimate individual ceremonies at the residences of all our Class of 2020 Sayreville War Memorial High School (SWMHS) graduates. While I know that this is not what they wanted and more importantly, what they deserve, we hope that all our students in the Class of 2020 and their families have an enjoyable and memorable experience. The pre-taped and edited ceremony will be posted and streamed live on our website at 6 pm on Thursday evening. Likewise, the Sayreville Middle School

(SMS) 8th Grade Promotion Ceremony will be posted and streamed live on our website at 6 pm on Wednesday evening.

As also noted in my Off Day Update, there is currently no vendor to provide subscription busing for our students at the middle school and high school who are not eligible for district transportation, as Durham School Services is no longer willing to provide it. Thus, since the district is not responsible for nor involved in providing this service, we are asking for a parent volunteer to emerge to engage potential vendors in negotiations for providing this service. In addition, this week we will complete the vehicle drive-up and drop-off/pick-up process for all remaining students at the high school and middle school, along with all students in the upper elementary school, K-3 elementary schools, and preschool. Finally, since this will be the last week for meal deliveries, and since many of the parents of our students may still need assistance with providing their children with nutritious meals, I included in my broadcast email the process for parents who may be food insecure this summer to receive assistance from the New Jersey Department of Human Services Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) by means of Pandemic-Electronic Benefits Transfer (P-EBT) funds.



As they have been since the beginning of the pandemic, last week our amazing group of Operation BStrongSayreville volunteers once again prepared and delivered over 3,000 meals, several devices, countless student work packets, and toilet paper, paper towels, and tissues for anyone who needed such last week. Since many of our volunteers will need to shift their focus on fulfilling their end of the year responsibilities, our district cafeteria workers and cafeteria/ playground aides will assist us in preparing breakfast/lunches for delivery on Monday and Wednesday, which will be our last

delivery days of the year. Thus, we are asking parents to order for two days at a time for today and Tuesday, and three days at a time for this Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. For more information pertaining to the ordering and delivery of meals and supplies this week, see my BStrongSayreville Off Day Update email, which I sent to the community on Sunday morning. As per it, remember that we are also allowing community members to refill one 12ounce container of hand sanitizer in the main vestibule of SWMHS from 8 am - 12 pm on Mondays and Wednesdays.


