Last week students in Ms. Mojzsis' SWMHS Advanced Art class were visited by Art Conservator, Karen Thomas, who spoke to the students about career opportunities in the field, and reviewed with them her experience working at the Metropolitan Museum

of Art. Similarly, a couple of weeks ago students in Mr. Coleman's SWMHS Physics Class tested the amazing paper bridges that they constructed. For their paper bridges, the students were allowed to

only use up to 100 grams of ordinary computer/printer paper and up to 25 grams of masking tape. In addition, the bridges needed to span a gap of 35 cm between two lab benches. One of the stronger bridges held about 300 times its own weight! This bridge had a mass of





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about 70 grams, but held nearly 48 pounds of sand and metal plates in a bucket. You and your students Rock Mr. Coleman!



As always our amazing students and staff continue to impress and inspire us with their incredible accomplishments. After receiving hundreds of entrees, senior Patrick Pusung's graphic illustration was selected to be the new logo for Sayreville. As a result, Patrick was thanked, honored, and recognized last Monday evening by the Mayor and Borough Council at the Sayreville Borough Council Meeting. In addition, Sayreville Leo (the

We also congratulate the SWMHS Winterguard Team, which recently placed 4th in a statewide competition. Likewise, we would like to commend the SWMHS French Class students who earned Honorable Mention in the Montclair State University French Day and Film Festival. Furthermore, we congratulate the Samsel Upper Elementary School 5th Graders who recently competed in the New Jersey Regional History Bee in Monroe Township. Abhay Ullas placed 3rd in the 5th grade and younger category and is now

eligible to complete in the national competition. Likewise, Paige Cleary, David Lee, Abigail Rosa, Adrian Ciesla were also finalists and thus are also eligible to go to the national competition. In fact, as a team, they took 3rd Place overall, came in 1st Place in Social Media, 2nd Place in the MIST Bowl, 3rd Place in the Science Fair, and was named the Best Coordinated Team.
