Division Champions for the 2nd and 3rd consecutive years respectively. Likewise, in a very dramatic comeback win over Colonia High School, the SWMHS Wrestling Team clinched a GMC White Division Championship. Finally, both the Girls and Boys Basketball Teams had big

wins on Saturday over New Brunswick High School.

Our winter sports teams will be back in action this week. The Wrestling team will wrestle at New Brunswick High School on Wednesday evening and then again on Saturday at South River High School. The Boys Basketball Team will play away at North Brunswick High School on Tuesday, home on Thursday against John F. Kennedy High School, and away against Rahway High School on Saturday. Similarly, the Girls Basketball Team will play at home against North Brunswick High School on Tuesday, away at John F.
