

A New Choice in Learning



Superintendent's Message Dr. David Daigneault

If there's one thing we've learned about life in 2020, it's hard to say what tomorrow may bring.

But that hasn't stopped us each day from trying to answer the question on everyone's mind: what will school look like this fall?

We've reached out to parents in order to better understand their concerns in dealing with the unique crisis presented by the COVID-19 pandemic, and we've spent the better part of the year working on a solution.

Many of you have expressed hesitation sending your child back to school in August. Parents don't want to risk their child contracting the virus and bringing it home, where they live with family members who may be dealing with chronic health problems or underlying medical issues that increase the dangers of this particular illness.

This summer we sent out a survey to parents. Big thanks to the seventy percent of you who responded! Among the responders, roughly half said they were ready to send their children back to school, and the other half were interested in exploring at-home learning options.

So we developed Grenada's Education Plan of Choice, which offers a choice of traditional person-to-person learning at school, online learning from home, and a hybrid model that incorporates both in-class and online learning.

When we announced our plan, there were naturally many questions about how we planned to conduct online learning. It's never been done before at Grenada School District. Will students receive the same level of quality instruction?

Rest assured, online learning is something we've been thinking about for a while. Even before the shutdown in March, we began creating and archiving video lessons that we anticipated would be useful for students who had to be out of school for illness or other reasons.

We've ramped up our efforts, and since March, many teachers have already taught an entire year's worth of lessons for our archive. With help from our administrators, specialists, and the video production team in our communications department, every lesson in grades K through 12 has been recorded for a new series, Video Classroom. This series will give students access to hundreds of videos that teach the lesson standards set forth by the Mississippi Department of Education. In addition, teachers will be developing targeted lesson videos specific to their classes. These will reinforce their instruction in the Video Classroom archive while addressing challenges or concerns unique to their students.

Checking temperatures will allow us to identify hot spots before they can spread throughout the school."

Social distancing among students will be practiced when possible in the classroom and hallways,

and school buildings will be cleaned and sanitized daily.

In the traditional learning model, students will come to school Monday through Friday, observing usual school hours. Lunch will be served in the cafeteria or classroom. Students who take the bus home will wear facial coverings and will sit one person per seat unless they are from the same household.

The virtual classroom will introduce home-learning via computer. Students will have access to a teacher, though all instruction and classwork will be done online through such programs as Canvas and Google Meet.

Internet access is recommended for the virtual learning option. Students without reliable access will be able to download assignments through flash drives acquired at the school or by visiting one of many internet hot spot locations throughout the county.

This year, every student in grades K-12 will be assigned a laptop computer through the district's one-to-one computer initiative. Students working from home will be able to use their assigned laptop to complete their work and correspond with teachers.

The hybrid option combines the traditional and virtual learning experi-

In the hybrid model, students will receive instructions in class and complete assignments at home via Canvas. Students will be divided into two groups, which determines the days they will attend face-to-face classes at school. Groups will meet either on Mondays and Wednesdays or Tuesdays and Thursdays. (Siblings will be assigned the same days for transportation convenience.) Fridays will be reserved for at-home virtual learning, where students will interact with their teachers to clarify lessons and complete objectives.

When at school, students in the hybrid model will wear facial coverings, eat lunch in the classroom, and be responsible for adhering to the same rigorous safety measures as traditional students.

Students in both the virtual and hybrid models will be eligible to participate in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, including athletics, band, Visions, ROTC and other groups.

Parents and students were expected to declare which option they would commit to for the fall semester in early July. Daigeneault said that any families who had yet to declare their learning choice must quickly do so.

"We can't schedule our classes until we know which choice is made," he said. "A lot of decisions about the upcoming school year can't be made until we have these numbers."

Daigeneault added, "We believe that we have designed the best scenarios possible for our community and keeping kids and teachers safe. These are extraordinary times, and we've never executed a learning plan like this. More than ever, we ask for patience and cooperation this semester to make this experiment work."

In response to ongoing health and safety concerns over the COVID-19 pandemic, Grenada School District has announced its Educational Plan of Choice for the fall 2020 semester.

"We've developed an effective system of teaching to meet whatever circumstances we may encounter this fall," said GSD Superintendent Dr. David Daigneault.

Students and parents must choose one of three options for returning to school on August 6. The choices include traditional person-to-person learning at school, online learning from home, and a hybrid model that incorporates both in-class and online learning.

For the traditional learning option, students will come to school as normal. The main differences will be reduced class sizes and new health and safety measures.

Daigneault said the district will follow Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines to minimize the risk of virus infection among students and faculty.

"Facial coverings will be worn in the

School is back in session August 6, but this year is not like any other. The traditional Meet the Teachers event at GSD will undergo some necessarv changes as the district introduces new health and safety policies on campus. In an effort to follow CDC health guidelines, procedures are being put in place to minimize contact inside the school buildings. Each school will be conducting the first day a bit differently. Students who elected to participate in virtual and hybrid classes will be contacted about their first-day procedures. Students returning for traditional instruction should be aware of new routines to ensure a smooth return to class.

Grenada Elementary Red Top (PreK-3)

For many kindergarteners and PreK students, this will be their first year at the Red Top, so teachers will host an inperson Meet-the-Teachers event. Meeting times will be staggered to alleviate crowds in the building. Once contacted and given a meeting time, parents may walk their child to the classroom, meet their teacher, and drop off nap mats and supplies. The three- and four-year-old PreK meet-the-teacher day will be Mon., Aug. 3. Kindergarten students will be assigned a meeting time for Weds., Aug. 5. In 1st through 3rd grade, teachers will contact parents of students to introduce themselves. Parents will not come to the school, but they will have a chance to

Aug. 5 on Google Meet. Parents who are unable to teleconference will be notified by phone.

On Aug. 6, all students should be dropped off from their designated car line. Duty teachers will be stationed around the building to meet the child and escort them to the correct classroom. Student temperatures and facial coverings will be checked upon entering the building.

"We're excited about having kids back in the building and seeing all our students whether traditional, hybrid or virtual," said principal Cole Surrell. "We've been planning to make school as safe as we possibly can for the students."





21st Century Skills Work with Masks and Social Distancing

While teachers and administrators at Grenada School District spent the summer preparing for school to reopen this August, 100 students in the 21st Century summer program were the first back at school.

The after-school learning program at Grenada School District, made possible by the Mississippi Department of Education and the 21st Century Community Learning grant, provides students an outlet each summer to learn new skills and brush up on old ones.

This year's classes — held Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. (June 15-July 14) at the Grenada Career and Technical Center, as well as the middle and high school — presented unique challenges to the teachers and students. Lynne Russell, director of the 21st Century program, said they learned a lot about conducting instruction in a safe and socially distanced environment.

"We felt it was important to host the class this summer, especially with the kids being home since spring break," Russell said. "We put in place measures to screen every student before entering the building. We took their temperature and asked them to wear masks in the classroom and on the bus. We asked if they'd had contact with anybody who had the virus, or were feeling sick themselves."

This year's classes were smaller to make social-distancing easier. In classrooms, students worked six feet or more apart. The studio-based classes opened garage doors to allow fresh air to circulate. Students regularly washed their hands and sanitized tools and equipment.

"These classes are useful," said Russell. "They introduce some of these kids to skills that may help them get a job later. The tutoring classes help kids pass to the next grade and even graduate high school."

GSD teachers facilitate the smallgroup tutoring classes in GCTC rooms, while skills classes are held in the various labs, kitchens, studios and garages throughout the building.

Students in the skills classes sign up for hands-on instruction in traditional vocational skills such as carpentry, automotive repair, pottery, and culinary arts, or computer lab classes that teach computer graphics and design, video film production/editing, sound engineering, and podcasting. There are also two unique classes that combine skills, the urban agriculture/archery course and the weightlifting/law enforcement course.

GHS junior Trey Wilbourn enrolled in the computer graphics class for the fourth summer in a row and said the class gets better every year. He convinced his sister, 7th grader Mary Taylor Wilbourn, to enroll this year. "I love Photoshop because it's something I've never done before," Mary Taylour said. "And wearing a mask [in class] was great once I got used to it. Now I forget I'm wearing it."


Lisa Holland, the new culinary arts instructor at GCTC, taught cooking in the classroom kitchen. "Sanitary work conditions are part of the normal kitchen routine when handling food anyway, so keeping clean to fight the virus fit perfectly into our lesson," she said. "If I was nervous about anything, it was teaching a class for the first time. But my students were great, and we prepared a lot of food to share with the other classes." In addition to the skills and tutoring classes, the 21st Century grant helps fund the Parent Resource Center. Located at 423 S. Tobacco Users More Susceptible

For less than a year now, the coronavirus COVID-19 has been infecting people around the world, changing the way we live and work dramatically. There is a lot that is unknown about this novel disease, but there are a few things that are certain.

Older adults and people of any age who have serious underlying medical conditions are at higher risk for severe illness from COVID-19. Some of these underlying diseases include chronic lung disease, moderate or severe asthma, and serious heart conditions. Smokers may be putting themselves at an even greater disadvantage.

"The CDC places smokers in the high risk category for COVID-19 related illness since smoking suppresses the immune system and makes smokers more susceptible to illness," said Amy Winter, Director of the Office of Tobacco Control at the Mississippi State Department of Health. "Smoking significantly worsens COVID-19 because it helps infectious diseases progress."

According to a new meta-analysis by the University of California San Francisco that included 11,590 COVID patients, researchers found that among people with the virus, the risk of disease progression in those who currently smoke or previously smoked was nearly double that of non-smokers.

The analysis also found that when the disease worsens, current or former smokers had more acute or critical conditions or were more likely to die. Ultimately, smoking was associated with almost a doubling of the risk of the disease progression.

Even without the additional harm from COVID-19, tobacco use remains the

number one cause of preventable disease and death in the U.S. Tobacco kills more than 480,000 people per year. In addition, 16 million people in the U.S. currently suffer from smoking-caused illness. "Quitting smoking yields large and immediate benefits to your health, no matter when you quit," said Sue Mashburne, Director of the Mississippi Tobacco-Free Coalition of Grenada, Yalobusha, and Calhoun Counties. "These benefits are more important now than ever."

Students who receive at-home learning will still be assigned a teacher, with whom they will communicate via Canvas, which functions as an on-line classroom with messaging and video conferencing. Those who choose the hybrid learning option will meet with their teacher face-to-face at school two days a week and on video conference each Friday.

While we look forward to welcoming your children back to the physical school room, we are committed to practicing social distancing whenever possible. Dividing instruction between in-person and online will naturally reduce the number of students per classroom. This will allow us room to maintain a safe distance among students, thus decreasing the risk of infection.

A new culture of health consciousness must be taught in school. One major component is wearing facial coverings, which have been proven effective against spreading the virus from person to person. Students will be asked to wear their facial coverings in the classrooms and hallways, not only to protect themselves but their teachers as well. We



Tech Advances at GSD

Before school closings and distancelearning became the norm in education, online instruction at Grenada School District was already taking off. In dual-credit courses at the high school, juniors and seniors receive college-level instruction and complete assignments online. In the middle and elementary schools, students are able to catch up on i-Ready assignments from home.

The new school year's online and hybrid learning options are taking remote learning to a new level. To make the leap, the district invested in new technology.

For years, GSD has strived to meet a one-to-one ratio, whereby each student has his or her own computer. The goal has been achieved, and this year, there will be a laptop for every student in grades K-12.

Chris Corbett, director of technology for the district, said each student will be assigned his or her own laptop. "This will serve our traditional, online and hybrid students, and if another situation arises in which the schools need to close, every student will be able to complete their school work from home," he said.

The Chromebook laptops will become a fixture of high schoolers' daily life, as much a part of their supplies as binders and textbooks. Corbett said internet filtering will be installed on each device, so the computers can be used safely both at home and school. A national rush to equip students with at-home learning tools has created high demand for the Chromebooks "We're working to make sure students taking online and hybrid classes will have access to Chromebooks for home use in the event the computers arrive late."

Another development in GSD tech is the adoption of Canvas, a popular learning management system. "Canvas is an online classroom," Corbett said. "Basically, anything you can do in class, you can do online." This includes completing and submitting assignments, web conferencing with the teacher, grades and more.

Canvas, he said, has become the standard online classroom software at all colleges in Mississippi. "It will be a natural progression for our students when they move on after high school."

Logging in is simple, said Corbett. Students reach Canvas by logging into Clever.com and clicking the Canvas icon. When they're logged in, students may find class assignments and supplementary materials such as worksheets or videos. The messaging and video conferencing functions take the place of email and Zoom, so students can conduct most of their work and all teacher communication through a single platform.

Corbett said the Canvas interface is user-friendly and should be simple for students to pick up. The software has been used at GSD for years in middle and high school, so many students are already familiar with the platform.

When students arrive on campus, they are to enter one of four designated entrances, depending on their first-period class. Tindall said instructions on the correct entrance will be posted on the high school and district Facebook pages prior to the first day of class. Students entering both the main high school building — as well as the B building, the art building, the field house, and the Grenada Career and Technical Center — must have their temperatures checked and facial coverings in place.

es as an opportunity to grow as educators," Tharpe said. "We know that change of any kind can present a set of challenges, but we are excited to provide a customized and innovative education for each child at Grenada School District."

Grenada Middle School

In the days leading up to Aug. 6, parents of students in grades 6-8 will receive an AIMS call notifying them of their child's schedule. Students may log in to Canvas to access their schedule. Each teacher will post a welcome video for their students, which will offer any pertinent information about the class. Parents and students who are unable to access Canvas will receive a time to pick up their schedules at the school.

The student drop-off routine, beginning Aug. 6, is as

GHS Principal Emily Tindall announced that parents and students in grades 9-12 would receive an AIMS call in early August to notify them of two options for getting their class schedules, including pick-up and online. Students who access their schedule through canvas will receive video messages from their teachers regarding their classes.

Students in the traditional model will report to the high school on Aug. 6 and follow new procedures for entering the building. "Instead of congregating outside until the bell rings, as in previous years, students will enter the building through their designated entrance and then proceed straight to their first-period class," Tindall said. She added that students may stop in the cafeteria to pick up breakfast, which they will carry to their class and eat.





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
