A Smart Tax Incentive



Superintendent's Message Dr. David Daigneault

As you prepare to pay your state taxes, consider this little-known tax incentive: you can invest in Grenada School District's Pre-K Learning Blocks program and get reimbursed in full by the state with a tax credit.

That's right. A FULL CREDIT. In essence, you're paying your taxes directly to the school.

So how does this work exactly? Let's say you contributed \$5,000 to Grenada's Pre-K Learning Blocks program. You would be eligible for a full \$5,000 tax credit. That's a credit, not a deduction, which would reduce your taxable income by \$5,000.

This valuable credit was put in place several years ago to encourage businesses and individuals to support the Pre-K initiative in Mississippi.

The state's Early Learning Collaborative Act made it possible for Grenada School District to partner with the local Head Start center to form the Learning Block Collaborative for three- and four-year-olds in our community. State regulations require that our program meets national standards of quality, and let me tell you, we're exceeding all expectations.

We started the Pre-K program in 2015 with three classes of four-year-olds at the Grenada Elementary Red Top. We've now grown to seven classes serving 116 three- and four-year-olds. Our classrooms are developmentally appropriate and designed to encourage children to learn through hands-on experience. We've invested in award-winning technology designed for Pre-K students.

Our goal has always been to meet these young children where they are and give them the skills to hit the ground running once they enter kindergarten. At the end of Pre-K, it is recommended that students obtain a scale score of 498 or above on the state's kindergarten readiness assessment test. Last year, our four-year-olds scored an average of 465 in the fall and 675 in the spring. They exceeded the target by 177 points and attained the highest Pre-K scores in the state!

This remarkable accomplishment is encouraging for the sustainability and growth of Grenada. Having a robust Pre-K program gives all children in our community the opportunity for a great start in school.

Gaskin is known for promoting the spirit-lifting effects of "dirt therapy," a stress-reliever and general sense of well-being that comes with working in the dirt. So how does this new soil-free system stack up?

Gaskin said. "I'm trying everything I can

After years of heavy-lifting and clawing through the dirt, Gaskin likes the relative ease of hydroponic growing. "You don't have to hoe or pull weeds, just monitor chemicals and temperature," she said. "And if you build the table high enough, you don't even have to bend over!"

Gaskin said hydroponic techniques are uniquely suited to urban agriculture because it allows people to grow their own food in small spaces, whether it's a garage, a basement, or an apartment balcony.

It's often a challenge to keep the attention of young, technology-oriented minds, but Gaskin said her students are always eager to see how the seedlings and plants have developed during their twice-a-week visits. From seedling to dinner plate, it took just 30 days to grow their first crop of hydroponic lettuce.

In addition to teaching students how to use tillers and mowers, she has added new hydroponic meters that measure pH, conductivity, total dissolved solids, temperature, and nutrient levels. "There's a lot of chemistry going on here."

By sharing her knowledge of plants and growing, Gaskin emphasizes our dependence on plants. "Nothing you eat can't be traced back to a plant," she said. "If we can't grow, we can't sustain ourselves and we starve."

In addition to minding the plant life of GSD, Gaskin also coaches the school's archery team. She added archery to her 21st Century curriculum because it ties in perfectly

with agriculture. "You take up archery, and with a different type of bow, you can hunt for protein," she said. "If you know how to get your own meat and raise your own plants, you can feed yourself forever."

Some of Gaskin's other projects this winter will make their debut once spring arrives. She has been landscaping the Grenada Middle School entrance and planted Natchez white crape myrtle around the building.

She's also gearing up for her annual spring plant sale at the GCTC greenhouses. Her regular customers enjoy the prices as well as the great selection of plants. She's been tending thousands of plants, which she raised from sprouts, and said this year's crop will offer beautiful new blooms, colors and varieties. Watch for signs around campus advertising the plant sale in early April.

This summer, Gaskin's urban agriculture and archery class will be available from the 21st Century Learning Center. Applications for the summer skills classes will be available on May 1 at the Parent Resource Center, 423 South Line Street, Room 10, 662-227-3370, or GMS or GHS principal.

Grenada Schools groundskeeper Lois Gaskin is responsible for the vibrant landscaping at the district's administrative buildings and school campuses. Her latest and perhaps most unique arrangement can only be found in the greenhouse behind the Grenada Career and Technical Center.

Along with housing her many plants and flowers, Gaskin uses the greenhouse as a classroom to teach urban agriculture and archery, one of seven after-school skills classes offered by the 21st Century Community Learning Center. This winter, in addition to nurturing the spring's new crops, she introduced the concept of hydroponic gardening to her students.

Hydroponics is a fast-growing field of agriculture in which plants are raised in water and nutrient solutions instead of dirt.

Gaskin built her first Nutrient Film System from lumber and PVC pipes. A raised, wooden frame holds the network of pipes that channel water to the seedlings, which are set into drilled holes in the PVC. A retrofitted aquarium pump circulates water from a plastic storage bin and carries a fertilized solution to the submerged plant roots.

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

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Career Prep

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College Prep: Traffic Director

When Grenada High School students complete their freshman year and enter tenth grade, they inevitably face a fork in the road.

Think of GHS counselor Mark Davis as the traffic director for the school's sophomore class.

"Students have to ask themselves, where am I taking my education, how do I get to this future I've imagined?" Davis says. "When they come see me, I help them pick the right lane."

At the counseling center, Davis sees three types of students.

The first type of student knows they're going to college. Many of them are already concerned if their grades are good enough to earn scholarships or membership in the National Honor Society. Some have attempted the ACT but aren't satisfied with their scores, while others are preparing to take it for the first

Davis helps them plot their course through the second half of high school by setting their junior-year schedules. It's important to make sure these students are not only meeting state requirements for graduation but also taking upper-level courses and electives - such as a foreign language and high-end Project Lead the Way courses — that universities like to see on high school transcripts.

Davis also prepares students for the opportunity to begin taking dual-credit courses such as English and algebra in eleventh grade. These classes have become so popular at GHS that instructors from Holmes Community College now come to teach the courses. Davis says an ambitious student can almost complete their freshman year of college without leaving GHS campus by taking dualcredit courses.

The second type of student Davis sees are those ready to join the workforce right after high school. He says students at GHS are fortunate to have Grenada Career and Technical Center, which offers skills classes such as culinary arts, information technology and health sciences. Students can work toward earning professional certification in carpentry, welding, and auto repair. These credentials will give them a major advantage when entering the competitive job market.

"Even if a student plans to attend college, I may recommend the courses at career tech because school doesn't have to be academic all day," Davis says. "They have terrific classes where students can pick up useful skills they'll use the rest of their lives."

The third group of students Davis sees aren't ready to make major life decisions dealing with college and career. They don't have a passion for any particular area of study or specific aspirations for a

He can offer surveys to help them narrow their interest or interview them about how they perform in various subjects. "If they're not sure," says Davis, "I tell them, let's err on the side of college.'

By the end of their sophomore year, Davis says, students are often surprised to find themselves at the midway point in their high school careers. Just when they've grown comfortable in the role of a high schooler, it's halfway over.

"The future is not far away come tenth grade," he says.

Whether a student feels anxious or eager about life after graduation, the counselors at GHS can help navigate the road ahead.

In addition to reading — which our four-year-olds are already doing in these classes! — our Learning Blocks program teaches children early communication skills, which helps with discipline and retention down the road. At such a young age, one year — and in some cases two years - can make a tremendous difference. It greatly improves the odds of these kids succeeding, which in turn strengthens our entire community.

Of course, with great success comes new challenges. These young children have adapted brilliantly into the GES Red Top setting, but in order to keep up with the current rate of growth, we must seriously consider expanding our facilities within the next couple of years.

That's where local investment — offet by this beneficial tax credit — becomes critical.

So how does one go about claiming this tax credit. Here's what to do in four easy steps:

- 1. Call the school district's business manager, Rodney Murphy (662-226-1606), to see if the collaborative has reached its cap. All 14 of the state's collaboratives are eligible to receive a combined total of \$6.5 million in one year, a sum which has yet to be reached since the law has been in effect.
- 2. Write your check to Grenada School District, earmarked for Learning

- 3. The district will notify Mississippi Department of Education of your contribution, and they'll send you a certificate that proves you have contributed to Grenada's state-approved collaborative. This certificate is used for tax filing.
- 4. When filing your state income tax return, have your accountant indicate your contribution using form 80-401. If you prepare your own taxes, download the form on the MS Department of Revenue's website.

The tax credit will be taken off your tax liability before your monthly withholdings, so you'll still qualify for a refund if you've overpaid. Contributions are eligible for a credit up to \$1 million per taxpayer. Any unused reimbursement can be carried forward three years of tax

Remember, contributions must be made during the calendar year for which a tax return is filed, so plan to invest in Grenada's Pre-K program this year to apply your credit when filing your 2019

This is money that you or your business will be paying anyway, so why not take a few extra steps and make it work right here at home? You'll get the chance to see your investment at work in the community and take comfort in knowing you've increased the chances of success for our youngest citizens.
