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Boys Lacrosse

The Frederick Gunn School has built a strong lacrosse tradition in which our players strive for both academic and athletic excellence. Our program honors our founder, Mr. Gunn, by concentrating on the four cornerstones of character: scholarship, integrity, respect, and responsibility.

As you have read, we are a small school (310 students) and being small is one of our biggest strengths. It affords all of our students an opportunity to be known by all of their teachers and classmates and also allows for many leadership opportunities. We believe that all of our students are encouraged and expected to contribute, in the classroom, in the community, and on the playing fields.

We intentionally keep a small varsity roster compared to other boarding schools, typically 26 players, to ensure that we are developing all of our players in games and practices. While many of our players are multisport athletes, something we value as a school value, our goal is to develop young men of character who will become leaders in our community, outstanding students, and exceptional lacrosse players. We stress player development, personal excellence, respect, and sportsmanship and we look to develop these traits within the structure of the team. As a coaching staff, we work throughout the year to instill these values in our players.

On the college front, our program is placing student-athletes in top DI, DII, & DIII programs such as Cornell Univ. Holy Cross, High Point Univ., Quinnipiac Univ., Univ. of Tampa, RIT, Rollins College, St. Lawrence Univ., Connecticut College, Middlebury College, Springfield College, Washington College, and College of Wooster.



In 2022, Eddie Rayhill earned All-American honors, our third player to receive All-American in six and we finished with a 13-5 record.

We play in one of the premier leagues in New England, the Western New England Secondary School Lacrosse Association (WNESSLA). In speaking to college coaches, they consistently remark about how players in our league are developed and ready to play in college. I attribute this to the premium we put on developing each player on a daily basis and the quality of competition in our league. Simply put, there are no days off in our league. Our players play at a high pace day in and day out in practice and face every game situation imaginable through the course of our season in games.

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Each year we begin our season with a spring break training program organized by the coaching staff. The trip is an excellent opportunity to come together as a team and hone our skills before returning to campus for tryouts. During this time, we compete against teams from around the country in preparation for our regular season schedule. While the demands of a rigorous schedule are great, our student-athletes meet them head-on and look forward to the challenge with enthusiasm.
