Foundation High School Program W. Endorsement (26 Credits) Algebra II is required for Distinguished Level of Achievement

- 4 credits ------ English (English I, II, & III, & 4th credit of English)
- 4 credits ------ Math: Algebra I, Geometry, and 2 additional math credits*
- 4 credits ------ Science: Biology, IPC/Chemistry/Physics, & 2 additional science credits*
- 3 credits ------ Social Studies: World Geography <u>or</u> World History, US History, US Government (1/2 credit) and Economics (1/2 credit)
- 2 credits ------ World Language and Culture (same language)
- I credit ----- PE or PE substitute
- 1 credit ----- Fine Arts
- 7 credits ------ Electives (including necessary endorsement credits)

*FHSP's flexibility in 3rd and 4th level core curriculum may not meet NCAA eligibility requirements. Refer to CCISD EPG.

Successful completion of STAAR end-of-course exams (English I & English II, Algebra I, Biology, US History – courses completed in 19-20 had the STAAR EOC waived.)

Post Secondary Planning

By the year 2022...70% of jobs in Houston will require training beyond high school

Options	Description / Anticipated Length of Study
On the job training	Specific training offered by an employer, includes military service; less than 6 months
Vocational or Technical Certificate	Gain additional entry level job skills; offered at some comprehensive high schools; <u>1 – 3</u> <u>years</u>
Private Trade School	Specific skill training after high school for a particular occupation; <u>3 months – 2 years</u>
Associate's Degree	Offered at junior & community colleges; increase employment options with certifications; <u>2 years</u>
Bachelors Degree	Formal course of study ; significant increase in employment options with completion of an undergraduate curriculum; <u>4 years</u>
Masters Degree	Advanced degree – may be required to pursue certain careers; <u>1 – 2 years beyond</u> <u>bachelors</u>
Doctoral or Professional Degree	Advanced degree – may be required to pursue certain careers; <u>3 – 5+ years beyond</u> <u>bachelors</u>

Juniors: College Planning Tasks

- Develop a preliminary list of colleges and universities, including <u>probable schools</u>, <u>safety schools</u>, <u>and reach schools</u> (Colleges I'm thinking about)
- Research colleges and financial aid information & <u>plan a college visits</u>; look for organized campus visits for rising seniors
- Consider applying for summer academic or enrichment programs or internships
- Develop your <u>resume</u>; prepare visual and performing arts or sports portfolio if needed
- Begin your college application essay draft
- Volunteer / Community Service
- Begin the search for scholarship opportunities

What Influences the Admission Decision?

- Class Rank and GPA
- Academic Record & Rigor of coursework (transcript)
- Meet Admission Course Requirements – colleges may require classes beyond graduation requirements
- College Entrance Exams SAT and ACT (optional in many places now)
- Essays

- Extracurricular Activities
- Special Circumstances
- Interviews
- Leadership
- Special Interests/Talents
- Community Service
- Service to the School

House Bill 588 - Top 10% Rule for automatic admission to a Texas public

- Rank in the Top 10% of your class.
- Must graduate Foundation with Endorsement Distinguished Level of Achievement
- Enroll in college no more than 2 years after graduating from high school.
- Complete application process to a Texas public university before application deadline.
- The 2009 Legislative Session granted UT Austin permission to raise the admission standard to admit students in the top 6% of their graduating class for fall 2023. This will fill 75% of the admission openings.
- Automatic admission does not mean automatic admission to any major. Majors in high demand require holistic review.

Tests for College-Bound Students

*Many schools are test optional or test blind.

SAT collegeboard.org

- Scale ranging from 400 to 1600
- Scale ranging from 200 to 800 for Evidence-Based Reading and Writing; 200 to 800 for Math;

ACT actstudent.org

- An achievement test designed to measure student's knowledge in four subject areas: English, Mathematics, Reading, and Science
- Scores reported for each subject area plus a composite score (1-36)

Always request to send scores when registering for an exam. Scores will **not** be sent with transcripts per CCISD policy. If you wait until after you test, you pay more.



- Increase your SAT and ACT scores with as little as 10 to 15 minutes a few times a week.
- Earn potential scholarships due to higher scores.

Tests for College-Bound Students

This is a placement test for college English and math course.

TSI Texas Success Initiative

- Standardized exam designed to assess college readiness for entering freshmanlevel students in the areas of mathematics, reading, and writing; must be completed before a student can earn any hours for coursework toward degreeplan
- Some students may be able to exempt the TSI with certain scores on other standardized exams, such as the SAT or ACT

College Application Portals

Apply Texas - Applications open on July 1, 2022

<u>Common Application</u> - Applications open on August 1, 2022

School Specific - Most open August 1, 2022

We strongly recommend you use one of these two types of applications. This makes it much easier to get documents to the colleges. Apply Texas is far easier to use and requires fewer supporting documents.

Naviance & The College Application Process

1. Request College Application Documents from CBHS

- Transcripts We will not send these until mid-August; If we send them earlier your transcript still says you are a junior.
- Letters of Recommendation (complete the Student & Parent Brag Sheet and Student Resume)
- Secondary School Report (Common Application Counselor Evaluation and Letter of Rec)
