As we near the end of the school year, 5th graders have been busy wrapping up the Revolutionary War Unit.


Their final summative project was to create a "Battle


Book." In their books, students summarized and illustrated 9 major battles of the

each hour are pictured here.






LANGUAGE ARTS with Ms. Udalla

Seventh graders have traveled the world in the last couple of weeks and discovered many different styles of poetry. With this new found knowledge, students were asked to create 4 different types of poems. They selected their first two poems from specific countries with specific rules and formats. Students focused on word choice, mood, rhythm, and rhyme scheme. The worldly poems consisted of a Haiku from Japan, a Naani from India, a Limerick from Ireland, a Terza Rima from Italy, and an Acrostic, Diamante, and an I Am poem all from the USA.

The third poem our poets created is a form of FOUND poetry or Blackout Poetry. Students were amazed and delighted when they were able to FIND a poem within a page of text. They then used their artistic abilities to make their poems come to life. Their final poem is called - A Picture is Worth 1000 Words. Students were given a wide variety of pictures. They took their time and found one that was inspiring. With their photograph they could choose any type of style or format to use when writing their poems. Many tried free verse and allowed their ideas and feelings to flow out on the paper! Overall, it has been a wonderful couple of weeks listening, creating, and finding poetry. The poems will be sent home next week!
