

Sixth Form Dress Code

Premise	Formal Office Wear
Jacket	Formal subdued style suit jacket or blazer (With complementary trousers/skirt/dress) Jacket to be worn around school and to lessons at all times
Shirts	A formal office-type shirt with collar and tie. Blouse. Blouses do not need to have collars. Long or short sleeves, no vest/sleeveless tops.
Trousers/Skirts	Formal (subdued colour) trousers, not jeans. A fair guide would be "no external seams". Formal (subdued colour) skirt or dress. Excessively long, short, or tight, skirts/dresses/trousers are not appropriate for a school environment. Trousers should reach at least the ankles. A fixed/measurable rule is impossible, but as a guide if the skirt is shorter than the hands width above the knee, then the skirt is not suitable for school wear. No denim or leather/leather style materials, or corduroy.
Cardigans/Jumpers	Acceptable only if plain and easily worn under a jacket: no large buttons, baggy or thick-knit. A blouse or shirt must be worn under a jumper / cardigan.
Hosiery	Tights must be worn with a skirt or dress, and socks with trousers. No bare legs. Socks should not be worn over tights.
Footwear	Leather-style shoes (not boots) in dark, subdued colours. For safety reasons, and to protect wooden floors, high heels (more than a few cm) are not appropriate.
Hair	Smart and clean hair, styled appropriately, kept out of eyes. If students wish to dye hair it should be of a natural (not bright) colour.
Facial Hair	Clean shaven, unless there is an agreed reason with the Head of Sixth Form.
Jewellery	If worn, should be discreet.
Piercings	Ear piercings (one per ear only) should be the only visible piercing. No nose studs.
Make-up	If worn, it should be subtle. Nail polish, if worn, should be of one solid colour.
