## LIBRARY BY NUMBERS FOR 2021/2022

- ✓ Our Media Center together with our Bookroom is home to **18790 titles**.
- ✓ Along with this impressive book collection, we offer unlimited potential for reading and learning opportunities with **5 research databases, 225 interactive ebooks** and **10 periodical subscriptions**.
- ✓ In total VM students and faculty read **28392 books** this year.
- ✓ The most checked out book was: **Big Shot** by **Jeff Kinney**.
- ✓ **Miss Young's 4<sup>th</sup> Grade** checked out the highest number of books this year – **1319 books!**
- ✓ We had **178 hold** requests since September 2020.
- ✓ **Mrs. DiPasquale** was the **faculty** member who borrowed most books – **397**.
- ✓ **Wyatt** from **Mrs. Simmons's** class was the **student** with the highest check out number – **86**.

## DID YOU KNOW?

Summer reading is as treasured a seasonal tradition as splashing in sprinklers, barbecuing, and watching Fourth of July fireworks. Teachers and librarians say this practice is integral in preventing what's called "summer slide" — when kids experience educational setbacks because of the break from school. The first summer reading program dates back to 1895. It started in Cleveland, when a woman named Linda Eastman created a "Best books in the library suitable for children" list and shared it with schools in June.
