We continued the progress of our Connecting Aviators: Our Children, Our Community strategic plan. We are engaged in working on all 43 of the 43 strategic actions called out in the plan.

Our students excelled in the classroom, in extracurricular activities, athletics, and clubs they participated in outside of the school day. We were ³/₄ of the year through, getting ready to send our wrestlers to state competition when Governor DeWine ordered the closure of all schools and activities at the start of the nation's response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Two weeks led to a month, and then another, and then another in keeping our doors closed and moving us to our attempts to continue educating our students remotely. With three days notice, we dove headfirst into remote education. It was not perfect by any stretch, but the partnership between parents and staff to make the most out of the situation was impressive. So was the community's involvement in the efforts to honor our students, particularly our High School Seniors, for a very unique graduation. We learned many valuable lessons in the last nine weeks of the 2019-2020 school year. These lessons helped form the foundation for our return to school for the 2020-2021 school year. Most important of all the lessons was the critical role the schools play in the intellectual, social, physical, psychological, emotional development of our students in serving the community and the irreplaceable value of the strong relationship and support we are blessed to have with our parents, community, and schools!

We hope that this Vandalia-Butler City Schools Quality Profile will demonstrate to you, the reader, the values the community places on educating its children and the progress the district is making toward that end even in a pandemic, ESPECIALLY in a pandemic. It will also highlight the district's commitment to be fiscally responsible and true partners with the Vandalia-Butler community.


The Board of Education generally meets at 5:00 p.m. on the fourth Tuesday of the month for regular business meetings and on the second Monday for work session meetings.


BUTLER HIGH SCHOOL 4 YEAR GRADUATION RATE



PARENT & COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

The Vandalia-Butler City School District values its community partnerships and connections. Having such strong affiliations within the community enhances the number of opportunities available for our staff and students and heightens our students' level of education.

ANOTHER RECORD YEAR



- \$11,259 to Butler High School — \$5,000 for materials and supplies for new biomedical sciences classes in the Project Lead the Way curriculum; \$3,845 for lighting improvements in the Performing Arts Theatre; \$2,258 for studio-quality computers for media production classes; and \$156 for a real-life math curriculum aid.

- \$7,384 to Smith Middle School — all enhancements for a widely used vocal and instrumental music curriculum, including a soprano xylophone, 45 ukuleles, vocal and instrumental music, music notation board and a storage cart for music stands.

- \$3,000 to Helke Elementary School — \$2,100 for a Muse Machine artist-in-residence for first graders to work with a professional actor to create an original script, music and choreography for a live production and \$900 to help fund a third grade trip to the Indianapolis Children's Museum, particularly for families who cannot afford the extra expense.

\$1,833 to Demmitt Elementary School — \$1,183 for speech-language assessment kits and \$650 for communication devices, largely to assist students with special needs.

\$600 to Vandalia Preschool — a climbing apparatus and other outdoor play items to build gross motor skills.





DID YOU KNOW



Approximate operating spending per pupil - \$10,536





Classroom Instruction - approximately 69¢ of each dollar is returned to the students! This includes teachers, classroom supplies and equipment, and support services including nurses, psychologists, and media centers

Operations / Maintenance - approximately $\underline{16}$ \bigcirc of each dollar is spent on building maintenance, custodial services, utilities, transportation costs, and food service costs.

OHIO SCHOOL funding 101

STATE FUNDING -

The Ohio Department of Education bases its funding on the State Foundation Formula, a complicated formula which takes into account student enrollment and property wealth in a district.


LOCAL FUNDING -

Property owners pay the lion's share of local funds for Ohio's school districts through property taxes. Local property taxes are expressed in mills, or \$1 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. Property taxes are based on the assessed valuation (35% of market value) of a property.
