



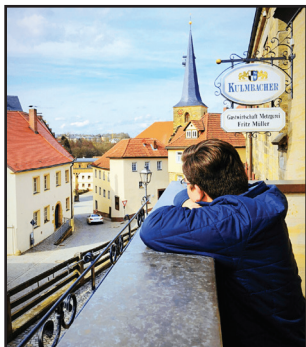

TCS Proposes New Buildings

TROY- It is common knowledge around Troy that the Troy City Schools' buildings are quite old and some are in dire need of replacement. The district has constantly updated their existing buildings with new, modernized security systems, computer systems for learning, and even a new roof for the aging Cookson Elementary.

So to get some more information on what the school district is going to do to help fix this issue, and what will happen with Cookson, Hook, Forest, Concord, Kyle, Heywood and Van Cleve Schools, the Trojan Tempo staff sat down for a one-on-one interview with none other than the big man in charge, Troy City School District Superintendent, Mr. Piper, to get more information on this new plan.

A failed building initiative that included two new buildings located on the city's west side has led to a new plan. This new plan calls for four new buildings, three K-4 buildings

and one 5-6 building. Despite the hopes for new buildings, Troy City Schools has to maintain current buildings. For example, Cookson Elementary School had major roof work done this summer to fix the aging roof.

"The reason that this bond issue is important is because our buildings are old, and we have to continue to put money in them to keep them up, and we have to make sure that students are dry," Mr. Piper said. "Cookson's roof had been there for a long time and that is a tough choice to make because we spend \$300,000 on a roof, and then in a few years we go tear it down." Cookson is a great example as to why this bond issue needs to be passed.

The new schools would have all the needs that any elementary school must have for 21st Century learning, along with all of the creature comforts of your typical modern day building.

"The new schools would have air conditioning, be much safer, have better air quality and flow, better lighting, new furni-

ture, more flexible learning spaces like the commons, be handicap accessible (for example kids in wheelchairs), and more energy efficient," Piper said.

Another important feature that is vital for the Troy community is that new buildings would save a good sum of money based on energy efficiency. An energy efficient system would allow the ability to save money over time for improvements.


"Troy High School for example, is spending \$1.25 per square foot in energy costs," said Piper. "Milton Union's new building is spending only \$0.65 per square foot with air conditioning, so we expect to get about \$0.75 a square foot with our newer buildings."

This is an impressive stat that would both save money for our school district and make Troy City Schools education better.

Now many students may be wondering if this bond issue passes, would

4. Install more efficient lighting and air quality controls.

Parts 1 and 2 of the 5-year Strategic Plan for the Troy City Schools will rely on passing a building bond in March of 2020.

Troy High School be getting air conditioning. That answer would lie not in the bond issue, rather the school improvement fund to get A/C in the high school over a period of time. The bond issue could not legally fund A/C, at THS, but it could free up funds to add it over time.

Finally, the fact that your parents will be wanting to know the most, the cost of this bond issue. According to Mr. Piper, the

annual cost for a homeowner is around \$245.00 per \$100,000 value of their home.

Troy residents will be able to vote on this important bond issue on Tuesday, March 17, 2020, or better known as St. Patrick's Day 2020. So go out to the polls and vote yes for the March bond issue.

THS- The Trojan Way is a new idea that the THS staff and administration came up with to add positive energy to the school.

"I think it's cool, I mean who wouldn't like to win some cash?" said sophomore Jesse Barnhart.

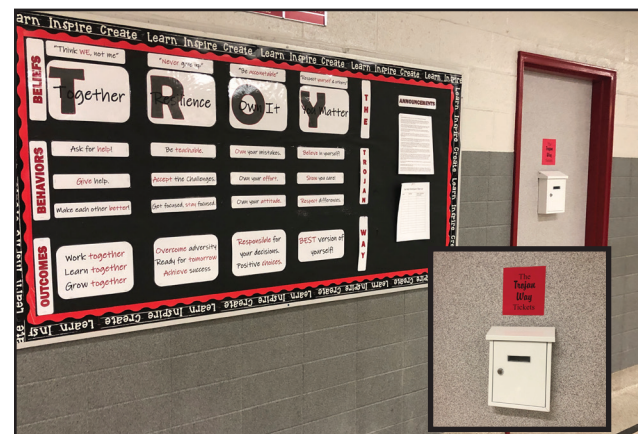
Here are some of the many examples of why students earned Trojan Way Tickets so far.

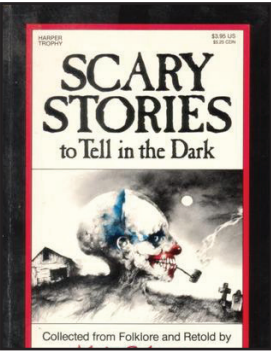
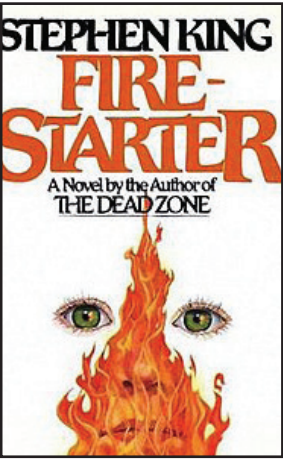

Troy Piqua rivalry set for 2019 edition

THS- As the end of the regular season is approaching, coaches and players all around the country are looking at possible playoff pictures, but before Troy can do that, they must end the season playing their rival, the Piqua Indians. Like many previous meetings between Troy and Piqua, there's a lot riding on this one.

After dropping a league game to Xenia last week, the Trojans need to win tomorrow to secure the Miami Divisional Championship. A loss would put them in a three-way tie with Piqua and Greenville (should the Green Wave win).

"Knowing that the Piqua game is tomorrow, I am kind of nervous," said defensive linemen Austan Good. "I am really excited to see what we both bring to the table. Last year's game was really close so I can't wait to see



how this game unfolds. It is my senior year so getting the win against our rival Piqua would be a great way to cap off the season."

On November 1, the Indians will be meeting the Trojans in Troy Memorial Stadium, in one of the greatest high school football rivalries in the country. The Troy-Piqua rivalry has been

going on since 1899 and they have been playing each other consecutively since 1911. The record is currently 65-63-6, with the Trojans leading by two wins. For much of this century, the two teams have gone on winning streaks in the rivalry. The last time the Trojans and Indians alternated wins three years in a

row was from 2003-2005. Piqua won in 2003, Troy won in 2004 and Piqua won in 2005. Piqua followed its 2005 victory with second-consecutive win in 2006. Troy followed that with a five-game winning streak over its rival that lasted from 2007-2011. Piqua immediately followed with a four-game winning streak

from 2012-2015. Troy has won 2016-2018 and are hoping to change that "18" to a "19" following the game on November 1.

The Trojans are currently number one in the MVL Miami Division with a record of 7-2 overall and 6-1 in conference play. The Indians are 5-4 overall and 5-2 in conference play.

Kevin Walters leads not only the Trojan offense, but is second in the Miami Valley League with 1,064 rushing yards. Defensively, Weston Smith leads the MVL with six interceptions. Jerell Lewis of Piqua leads the Miami Valley League with 9.5 sacks.

"With it my first Troy-Piqua rivalry game being head coach, I know how important it is to the fans and parents but especially the players," Head Coach Dan Gress said. "This community is owed getting the best effort from the coaching staff and players. They are owed that every single year. I feel that, I honor that and I respect that. These are the games the boys will remember. We owe it to the boys to make them as prepared as they possibly can be."

The game is on November 1 with a kickoff time of 7 PM at Troy Memorial Stadium. Fans, make sure you bundle up because a Trojan storm is brewing.

YouTuber Releases First Four Parts Of Anticipated Docu-Series

TROY- Shane Yaw, known online as Shane Dawson, has made content for the social media platform YouTube for more than ten years. The 31 year old influencer has racked up over 22 million subscribers. Starting in 2008, he created comedy skits, but as his fame grew, his channel's content changed. He began to do more videos about conspiracies such as deepfake, Chuck E. Cheese selling leftover pizzas, and more. Dawson also created food videos and collabs with other YouTubers such as Garrett Watts and Miranda Sing. He now creates longer videos, docu-series. Although he doesn't post as often as he used to, what he does post is always worth the wait.

Dawson currently lives with his fiancé Ryland Adams, his two energetic dogs Uno and Honey, and his cat Cheeto in Southern California.

In the nine part series, we follow Dawson on his journey to create his own makeup line with widely known celebrity Jeffree Star.

Jeffree Star, born Jeffrey Steininger, is a 33 year old makeup artist, model, and entrepreneur. He is also the founder and owner of Jeffree Star Cosmetics, a widely known makeup company.

The series was filmed by 26 year old Andrew Siwicki, who also assists Dawson in editing the videos.

On the first day of October, his main channel, shane, uploaded The Beautiful World Of Jeffree Star, which is part 1. The video got more than 8 million views in a span of 24 hours. If you haven't watched the video, here's a summary. The video shows a typical day in Jeffree Star's busy life. The two fly on a private jet to Sacramento, California, where Star heads to a mall to meet thousands of awaiting fans

and to promote a major beauty launch.

In the second part, which was released three days later, it shows Dawson going to an important meeting with Star. At the meeting, the two discuss Dawson creating his own makeup products. They spoke about finances, possible makeup line names, and more.

In the third episode (released October 11), Dawson and Jeffree Star discuss more makeup names. Some of the eye-shadow color names include: I'll go home, Not a fact, Sleep Paralysis, and more. They also gave viewers a glimpse of what his eyeshadow palette will look like.

Lastly, in part 4, the two approved more eyeshadow colors and names. They also had an over the phone conversation with a large makeup retailer, Morphe.

The series so far has also gained a lot of positivity from other YouTubers on the Twitter platform.

"Wow this is so great and is literally like a movie!!! Loved this so much. I'm sooo excited to see the rest of the series!!" tweeted friend and fellow YouTuber Eugenia Cooney.

"OMG I just cried at the end, also this was so well made wow" tweeted Ricky Dillon, another YouTuber.

You may find yourself wondering - why would I enjoy watching this? One reason is the drama. Dawson and Star will be delving through controversies, such as the James Charles and Tati situation that unfolded last May. Another reason why watching it is a good idea is because it's a lot like a documentary. It's really cool that you can watch something for free on YouTube that's similar to a documentary you'd see on Netflix.

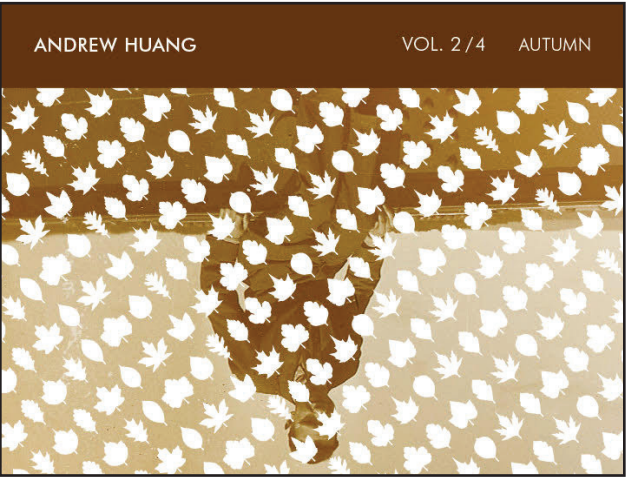

The Tempo Road Going Review: a Pony Ride

TROY- When you hear the words “Modern American Muscle Car” uttered from somebody on the television, five major cars come to mind: the Dodge Charger, Dodge Challenger, Corvette C7, Chevrolet Camaro, and the Ford Mustang. The Ford Mustang is a name that relates to speed, V8 engines, performance, and patriotism all the while keeping style and comfort in mind. The Ford Mustang is powering through its sixth generation and has no plans of slowing down now that the long awaited and ludicrous sounding 760 horsepower 2020 Mustang Shelby GT500 is out on showroom floors.

Now Ford needs to keep its customers coming back to buy Ford vehicles, so to help supplement the action plan of improving sales, a refresh was done in 2018. The 2018 Ford Mustang got a front fascia change, minor rear fascia change, performance updates, new special edition vehicles, and discontinuation of the less efficient, less powerful, and low selling 3.7L V6 engine. With all of these changes, Ford still has not enlarged or disposed of the tiny back seat that only Mr. Owen could fit in.

The basic Mustang comes with a 2.3L Ecoboost Turbocharged I-4 Engine pumping out 330 Horsepower and 350 Pound Feet of Torque, enough power for a casual driver, but sort of lacking in performance. If you bump it up one level you get the Mustang GT, with the infamous and revamped Gen III 5.0L 302ci Coyote V8 pumping out 460 horsepower and 420 lb.-ft of torque, with improved 93mm bore and 92.7mm stroke. Two different track packages are included this

year and a race car inspired interior with your option of cloth or leather bucket performance seats. A standard 6-speed Manual is offered as usual with a brand new 10-speed Automatic that was co developed with Chevrolet Performance.

The very interesting Bullitt special edition package was added this year with special emblems and interior design, two paint choices of either Dark Highland Green or shadow Black, a 6-speed manual, custom rims, and a horsepower boost up to 480hp. The Bullitt Mustang is a nod to the 1968 Academy Award winning movie Bullitt starring Steve McQueen and has a very high \$55,000 price tag.

The Mustang GT is by far the most well known of the trim levels due to its history, ease of modification, and being the most widely built and modified V8 Mustang on the U.S. market. The Mustang’s 5.0L 302ci can easily be cammed, Twin Turbocharged, and tuned to put out 800hp, of course with straightened internals.

Outside of Ford there is a group that had been with

Ford during the Mustang’s beginning, the group does both in-house and aftermarket mods. This group is by far the most famous company with their famous one off packages and modification to produce street going monsters alongside Saleen, Roush, and Petty. Founded by the legendary Carol Shelby in 1962 to work on the Cobra, but soon started making modified Mustangs for Ford, being the GT350, Cobra GT350, and various GT500 models. For 2020 Ford revealed their newest Mustang GT500 to supplement their GT350 and GT350R models, and to defeat the Camaro ZL1 1LE and Corvette C7 ZR1, the new GT500 has a street and road package with a Supercharged 5. 2L Predator V8 cranking 760hp and 625 lbs of torque with the help of a 2.65L inverted roots supercharger.

The GT350 is the GT500’s little brother now considering performance and cost, the GT350 and GT350R has a similar engine to the GT500, with a 5.2L Voodoo flat plane crank V8 with 526hp and 429 lbs of torque, not nearly as much as the GT500 but still

impressive with 9250 RPM rev limit versus the GT500’s 8925. The GT350 it is also not either Supercharged or Turbocharged, rather naturally aspirated to compete with the then track focused and in production gen. V Chevrolet Camaro Z/28. The GT350 comes with a 6-speed Manual with the 7-speed dual-clutch automatic being saved for the GT500, and is 25 grand less than the GT500.

So in conclusion the Mustang is a very capable pony car with the same name as a famed and feared World War II fighter, being the P-51 Mustang. It will be interesting to see what its future has in store for us and what other companies can do to compete.

THS- In the Troy High School parking lot there are some real nice rides, and some not so nice rides that students and faculty drive. Madison Wilmoth had her Black 2005 Ford F-150 suggested to the Trojan Tempo automotive review division by a friend, so naturally it was time to go and interview Madison to see what her truck was all about.

So to start off this clunker review of this iconic American pickup truck, we are going to start off with the quirks and broken things that you could find to be rather interesting. According to Madison, the air conditioning works but barely, kind of an issue in Ohio during the summer time. A/C is almost a necessary feature these days due to the ninety degree plus temperatures, high heat index, and high humidity.

When you get a car that has been built from all the way back in the early 80s, standard features from then, might not even exist today. Back then a standard feature meant having speakers and a radio in your car. Now the 2005 Ford F-150 is no exception to this fact, but it is rather difficult to listen or enjoy your Spotify play list if the speakers hardly work. Madison’s passenger side speaker (50% of the speakers in her truck) only works when it feels that you need to listen to music come from it, and does not work for reasons we do not understand and it only knows.

Now, there are always advantages and disadvantages to owning a vehicle that has been used rather heavily in the past, so starting off in the negative sides will let us end on a positive note. So according to Madison, her Ford F-150 has only has one major drawback. The first drawback is the less than stellar gas mileage, according to Ford the 2005 F-150 can get 15 mpg with the 4.2L V6, 15mpg with the 4.6L V8, and 14 mpg with the 5.4L Triton V8.

You could come up with a whole list of reasons as to why owning a pickup truck is a smart thing to do as well, especially if you like to help people move or haul yard waste. Madison stated that her truck is fun to drive and has space for her friends, something trucks both excels in no matter what you buy. Having a pickup truck can also give you the ability to drive in the snow with ease if you have 4-wheel drive or sandbags in the back, and given Ohio’s weather and the possibility of having a foot of snow at a moment’s notice, this would be a smart thing to invest in and have in your driveway.

Onto the Tempo Clunker rating, a system that will rate the overall car with respects of reliability, cost effectiveness, teenager sensibility, squad room, and style. This will be done on a one to ten scale with ten being the best and one being terrible, after all of the decisions have been made by the official THS Clunker judging panel, the scores will be added up it will be a score out of fifty points, or now on called pistons.

On the reliability portion we have multiple things going for the F-150, and one going against. The truck has a little rust on the bumper, but overall is not that bad with everything else with a score of 7/10 pistons. Cost effectiveness is going to be lower due to the one fact that the amount of petrol that it eats is pretty high, so a score of 6/10 pistons for that one.

Teenager Sensibility is a factor that has been discussed on the most, but the panel give the ‘05 F-150 a score of 6/10 pistons because it is a safe choice for the winter, but rather large. Squad room for Madison’s friends is going to be a 9/10 pistons because of the fact that you have a truck bed to carry friends, as long as you go 25 mph or slower. Style is a 8/10 pistons because its a pickup truck, you can not get any more American than that. The final tally is 36/50 pistons, very respectable for a first vehicle and an impressive thing for any teenager to drive on the daily. Q: How do I become more popular and have more friends?

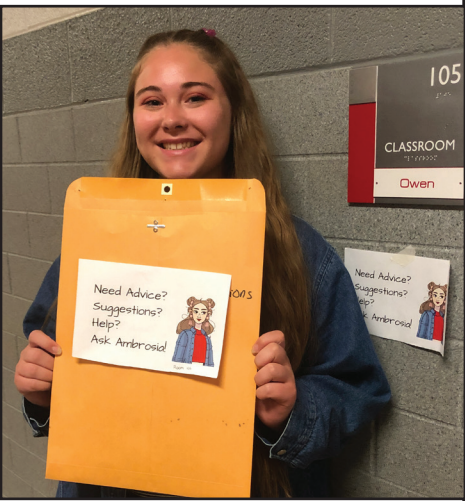

A: I would try to talk to your friends about it if you really like this person. If it can’t be worked out, maybe think about if that person is really worth losing your friends.

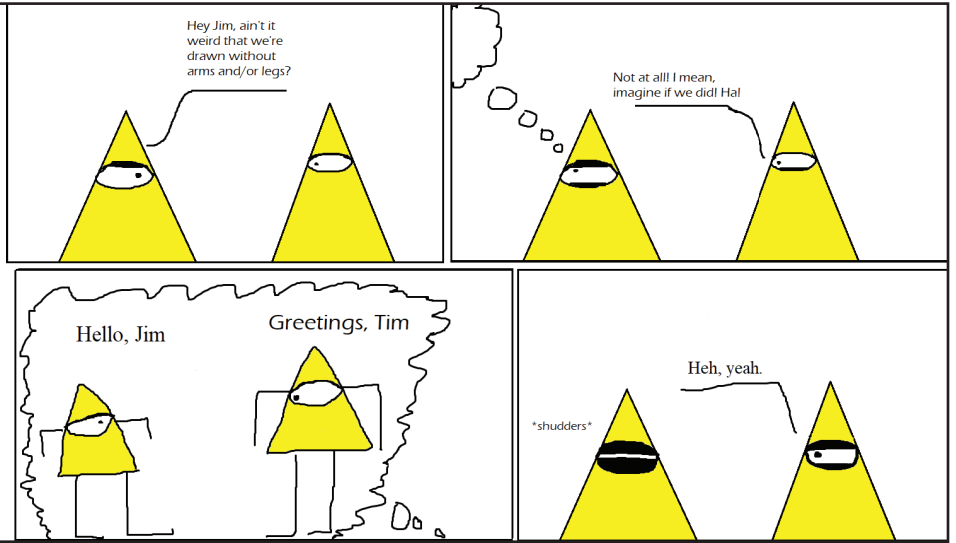


If your friends absolutely won’t accept your feelings, get new friends. Also if this person is causing so much stress between you and your friends try to work out the situation with them.

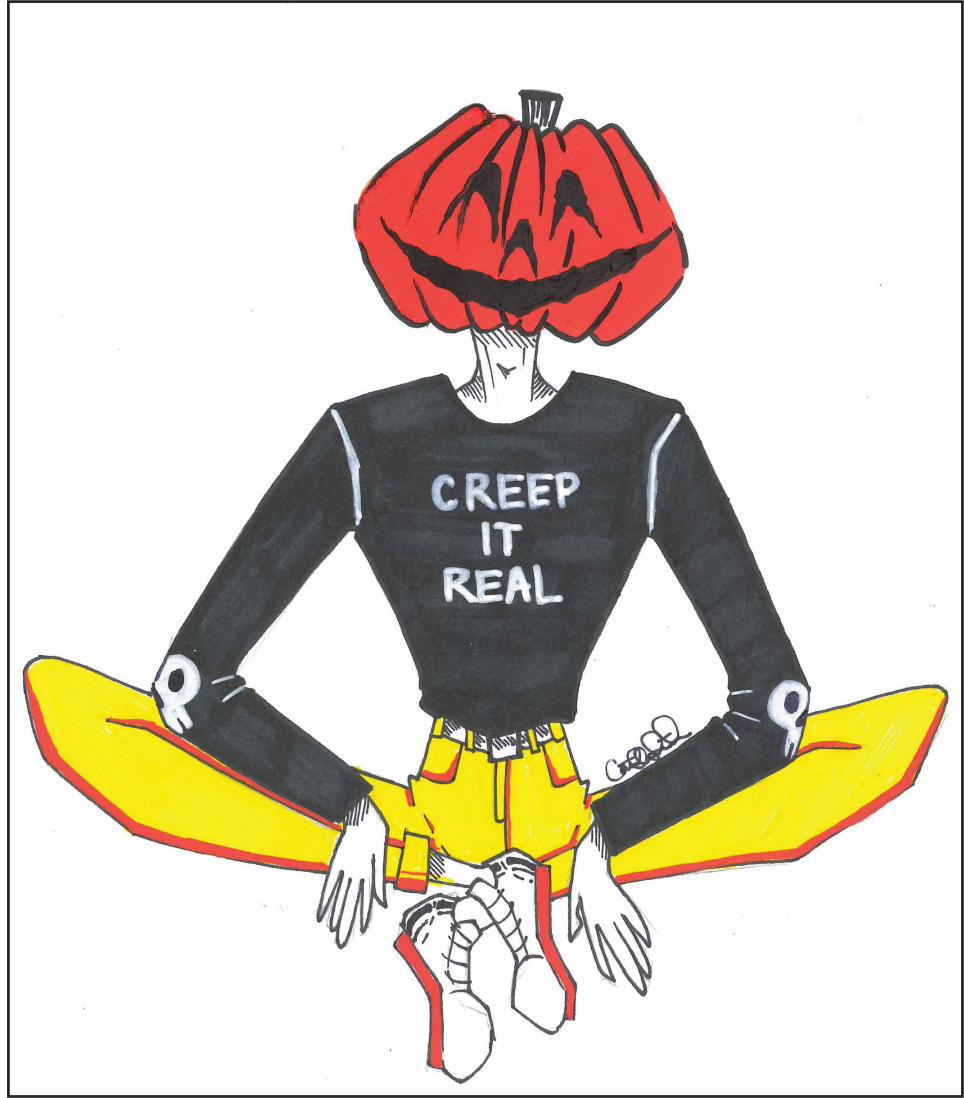
