Healthy Eating - the impacts on learning

As parents, we tell our children that breakfast is the most important meal of the day; we implore them to eat something before they race out the door to meet their friends ahead of the school bell. The science behind our parental guidance has been proven time and again that a nutritious start to the day will help learning.

The Professors in Leeds University conducted a research showing the relationship between habitual school-day breakfast consumption and GCSE attainment. GCSE attainment was assessed by three different measures using the Department for Education's point score system and by grades achieved in Maths and English.

It was found that school-day breakfast consumption was positively associated with overall GCSE performance. Interestingly, they found that school-day breakfast skipping was significantly associated with poorer Maths attainment in adolescents.

To support our students, regardless of their reason for skipping out the door without any food, the school provides nutritious breakfast choices for all the students before the start of their school day. We are actively encouraging our students to start their school day in the dining hall availing of healthy breakfast choices while catching up with friends and fellow students.

Breakfast consumption in children has been found to:

- Improve cognitive function, particularly memory, attention, and executive function
- Improve academic performance, including school grades and achievement test scores
- Increase on-task behaviour in the class

A switch to a balanced diet should improve not only learning and behaviour but also protect against chronic diseases, such as obesity, diabetes, heart disease, and others. In contrast, the consumption of foods rich in refined sugars and starches as well as high levels of another class of HUFAs (omega-6 fatty acids, high levels of which are found in sweet drinks and sugary bars) should be limited.

Many commercially available snacks and cookies are extremely high in all of these. Yet, many of our students consume these types of snacks on a daily basis, instead of fruits, vegetables, and grains. Throughout the school year, we endeavour to impart life skills and enhanced decision making to help the students make the best decisions for themselves in what they eat and drink. We teach the students to understand what constitutes nutritious food, how to read food labels alongside exercise being good for the soul as well as the mind and body.

In conclusion, meeting nutritional requirements throughout a student's life is essential for full intellectual and behavioural development. An inadequate diet, in turn, negatively impacts student learning and behaviour in multiple ways.


There is also a drop-in on Thursdays from 10am-12.15pm at the Chalvey Community Hub, Ladbrooke Road, Slough, SL1 2SR.

Citizens Advice national helpline

Slough residents can also access Citizens Advice national Help to Claim helpline for advice on Universal Benefits. Help to Claim advisers can help with the early stages of Universal Credit claims. They can be contacted over the phone, online over chat or face-to-face. Advisers can help:

- work out if you can get Universal Credit
- fill in the Universal Credit application
- prepare for your first Jobcentre appointment
- check your first payment is correct.

Uniform reminder

- Hoodies are not allowed at any point during the school day. This includes for PE lessons.
 They should be removed on arrival

PE Kit

Wearing PE kit to school on PE days has been a huge success in extending teaching time for PE but too many students are choosing not to wear the correct PE kit.

The school has a set PE kit with plain black tracksuit trousers or sport leggings as the only alternative. Branded tracksuits are not permitted and any girl choosing to wear leggings must wear a pair of shorts or a skort over the top.

Jewellery

Jewellery guidelines are clear - Nose studs and nose rings are not allowed. Clear retainers can be worn instead and will be given to students as an alternative as may a plaster. The expectation is that the piercing will be removed or covered whilst in school

Mobile Phones

Students are not allowed to use their mobile phones at any point during the school day. Any contact with home should be through the school reception.

Parking at the end of the day

Can I please request that you park in a considerate manner at the end of the school day. There is ample parking available next to the school in the football ground car park. Parking on the grass verges, pavements etc. creates a serious safety risk to the students as they leave school.
