

Our Year 6 children have been learning about different types of settlements as part of their current IPC unit of study, Building a Village. They have been learning about the different features of villages, towns, and cities by studying land use and amenities in these areas. Looking at the topic from a Religious Studies perspective, the children recently enjoyed a field trip out into our local area to become aware of the important role churches play in village life. We visited Barton St David Church and St Peter's Church in Lydford. We also visited the vantage point of Kingweston Road, where we were able see how the local villages had formed with churches as their hubs. From this point we were able to count one cathedral and 11 churches. In class the children were able to map out historic trade routes and uncover the importance of religious buildings in our local area.











BRILLIANCE DINNER & POLO

This year, Millfield held the first ever Millfield Brilliance Dinner, which took place in a marquee on Butleigh Fields. It was a fantastic occasion, which celebrated all of the amazing achievements within the Millfield community this year. The event was hosted by OM and commentator, Andrew Castle, and included the OM of the Year and Sports Awards. The celebrations also continued into the Platinum Jubilee weekend, with the return of the Polo event.













On Thursday 26 May, over 230 pupils took to the stage for the much-anticipated summer concert. The Sports Hall was packed with a supportive audience of family and friends and the atmosphere was electric. In terms of rehearsal time (and excluding the Easter holiday), it had only been six and a half weeks since the spring concert, so the fact that our choirs and ensembles were able to learn an entirely new set of repertoire in such a short space of time was hugely impressive! The evening began with a rousing performance from our Year 4 orchestra, who have been working hard throughout the year in their music lessons learning to play orchestral instruments. They have done exceptionally well, and they managed to master two pieces - the first, 'Dancing with Unicorns' began with a moving and poignant poem about the importance of inclusivity and kindness, and the second, 'Creeping Up on Grandma', showcased some extremely difficult passage work and rhythms as well as some impressive dynamic contrast! The pre-prep choir followed, making their debut in a large end of term concert and they left everyone feeling both uplifted and emotional by their heart rending and professional performance of 'A Thousand Years'. We then moved onto fantastic performances from the String Ensemble, who played 'Jam Session' with poise and musicality, followed by Wind Band, with an energetic, infectious, and technically challenging Sound of Music medley, and Acoustic Rock Band, a newly formed group who performed with an outstanding level of confidence having only rehearsed together for 2 weeks. Edgarley Voices then took to the stage with a beautiful three-part rendition of the much-loved Elton John classic 'Your Song'. Percussion Ensemble followed, performing 'Multitasker' with spirit and toe tapping tenacity. Wind Trio were hugely impressive in terms of their poise and musicality and Jazz and Blues Band demonstrated fantastic musicianship and courage on stage, giving the audience an insight into the world of jazz and improvisation. It was then the turn of the 115 strong senior choir, made up of pupils in Years 7&8, who performed two items. The first began with an introduction of 'Amazing Grace' (performed by brave soloists and the chamber choir) before moving into the well-known 'Where the Streets Have No Name' by U2, which had the audience singing along in appreciation. The choir followed this with a rendition of Sara Baraeilles' song 'Brave', performed with spirited singing and enthusiastic actions! Flute Ensemble then entertained us with a performance of 'The Drunken Sailor', before the orchestra regaled the audience with two works, the infamous 'Blue Danube Waltz' and the thrilling and dramatic 'William Tell Overture'.

The penultimate item was the Junior Choir who treated the audience to an infectiously memorable performance of 'The Rhythm of Life' before finally, after a very patient wait, members of the Young Voices Choir were left to round off the evening in style. Having just returned from an outstanding event in Birmingham, the choir were eager to showcase their Beatles medley, which was one of the many items that they performed at the Genting Arena. They were also keen to get all members of the audience involved at the end of the classic song 'Hey Jude'. The audience rose to the occasion beautifully and the concert closed with the Sports Hall united in jubilant song, amidst thunderous applause.

Seeing just how excited and engaged all the children were during the concert was exceptionally moving and it was clear that they enjoyed their performances every bit as much as the audience! Thanks must go to all the staff who helped make the event such a success, to the audience for their continued support (and incredible singing) and to all the pupils for their exemplary behaviour and wonderful performances. MUSIC LESSON TRIALS

Has your child ever wondered what it might be like to play an instrument or have singing lessons? Thought about trying harp or flute lessons but wasn't sure if it was for them? Fancied having a go on a trumpet or saxophone but wanted to meet the teacher first? Wanted to start a rock band but never picked up drumsticks or strummed a guitar? In the week commencing Monday 20th June, the Music Department will be presenting 'Music Lesson Trials' week for Pre-Prep and Junior pupils. If your child would like to have some completely FREE trial taster lessons on any number of different instruments, please email sturges.e@millfieldschool.com stating which instrument(s) they would like to try. Trials will be scheduled at a convenient time during the school day and teachers will collect and return pupils to their classrooms. There is no obligation to sign up for lessons following a trial, and the instrumental/vocal teacher will email you with information relating to the success of the session including whether your child demonstrated an aptitude for the instrument and whether they should consider pursuing lessons. If your child is in Year 6, 7 or 8 and involved in camps or Outdoor Week they can still have the opportunity to sign up for a trial lesson, but this will take place during the final week of term. This really is a fantastic opportunity to explore music and discover a hidden love and talent for something entirely new!

Trial Lessons can be offered on the following:

flute, clarinet, oboe, bassoon, saxophone, violin, viola, cello, double bass, harp, trumpet, French horn, trombone, tuba, guitar, bass guitar, drum kit, orchestral percussion, voice, and piano.
