Board approves \$17 per hour for bus drivers

With school districts competing heavily in the area for bus drivers, board members in July asked district administrators to propose an hourly pay increase that would make CISD hourly pay competitive. During the August regular board meeting, administrators proposed a \$3.16/hour pay increase for beginning drivers, a total hourly rate of \$17. Board members voted unanimously to approve the pay increase.

Last month, administrators agreed to pay all costs associated with testing, fingerprinting, licensing and physical exams for newly hired drivers.

Last year, 21 bus drivers were employed. At the beginning of this school year, only 12 drivers remained. Door-to-door pickup and dropoff and age appropriate buses have ceased. Some drivers have double routes and some students are picked up as early as 6:05 a.m.

Administrators continue to modify bus routes to make transportation more efficient and are optimistic that more drivers can be hired because of the increased pay.

In the Superintendent's report...

Superintendent Charlie Alderman reported that enrollment has increased 68 students from the first day of school. The 1474 tenth day total is 99 students down from the end of school last year, which equates to a loss of \$390,000 in funding for the year.

He stated that a housing shortage in the city as a potential cause of the drop in enrollment. A lack of affordable rental property also contributes to the drop in enrollment.

Alderman also shared a slide show featuring facility improvements made throughout the district during the last year. The Board voted to take \$1 million from fund balance to pay for the repairs and enhancements instead of borrowing the money.

Chief appraiser presents building proposal

Brent South, chief appraiser for the Hunt County Appraisal District, explained a plan to expand the appraisal office space, much needed , he said, due to the growing population of Hunt County. He proposed that the 34 entities making up the district purchase a former church building at 3301 Ridgecrest in Greenville to relocate the office.

If the purchase is approved by the entities, the appraisal district would sell its current building and contribute proceeds to the new building and its renovation. The annual cost per entity is expected to be from \$5000-\$6000.

If the Appraisal Board approves the proposal in October, South expects to present the proposal for the Board's consideration in November. The purchase would affect CISD's 2019 budget.

Board votes to release reverter for Children's Museum

The Northeast Texas Children's Museum Board asked the CISD Board to release the reverter on property once slated as the site of the museum. The property, which is north of Chicken Express, is not suited for the museum's current needs, according to museum board president Donna Tavener. Museum board members would like to sell the property and use the funds to build a new museum.

In 1996, the City of Commerce, the Commerce Water District, CISD, Hunt County and the Hunt Memorial Hospital District sold a tract of land to the Northeast Texas Children's Museum for \$50. The deed stated that the property would revert back to the taxing entities if the museum did not use it.

The CISD approved the measure to release the reverter. Other entities must also consider the proposal for approval.

ESL certification requirement delayed

The Board voted to change the requirement that all secondary teachers must acquire ESL certification. The newly approved DBA policy delays the requirement until 2017-2018 school year and limits the teaching areas subject to the requirement to science, math, English and social studies.

In other action...

The Board voted to approve:

- tax resale deed for property at S5090 Sunrise Addition Block 2 Lot 23-24 and
- certified values of \$396,153,942 for Hunt County and \$1,923,566 for Delta County
- The Board heard an update on the college and career readiness plan from Jenna O'Neal, CHS College and Career Coordinator, and CHS Principal Steve Drummond. O'Neal explained that she meets with seniors on Wednesdays to make sure they are on track with their post-graduation plans.
- Director of Finance John Walker held the annual review of the investment policy and the investment strategies.
