Yearlong effort to enhance college readiness wins recognition for TAMUC

Superintendent Blake Cooper thanked Dr. Ricky Dobbs, Wendy Gruver and Jody Todhunter of Texas A&M University-Commerce for their work to ensure CHS students have all the information needed to apply and enter the university. What began in September as a concerted effort by CISD and TAMUC to familiarize students with opportunities available "just across the street" at Texas A&M University-Commerce has blossomed into a full-fledged program that informs parents and students about the ins and outs of post-secondary admissions and expectations.

Wendy Gruver, director of Student Assessment, College Readiness and Retention, led parent and student informational meetings to discuss financial aid options and then arranged for seniors to apply using the Apply Texas app. Juniors worked on writing scholarship letters. Freshmen were introduced to post-secondary options and the emphasis for sophomores was on the importance of rigorous academic preparation.

CHS students toured the university campus to eat in the cafeteria and visit the library to become familiar with the campus.

Gruver said the cooperation between the university and CISD administrators has resulted in a line up of 32 semester hours credit possible for next year's juniors before the graduate high school.

Julia Robinson, CISD director of Curriculum, Special Programs and Grants, said Gruver had arranged to provide GED testing in Spanish for students enrolled in the Commerce Community Plaza, avoiding the long lines and full testing venues in the metroplex. A total of 20 to 26 graduates are expected in the Plaza's first graduation class next fall.
