## **MUSIC LESSON TRIALS**

Has your child ever wondered what it might be like to play an instrument or have singing lessons? Thought about trying harp or flute lessons but wasn't sure if it was for them? In the week commencing Monday 20 June, the Music Department will be presenting 'Music Lesson Trials' week for Pre-Prep and Junior pupils. If your child would like to have some completely FREE trial taster lessons on any number of different instruments, please email sturges.e@millfieldschool.com stating which instrument(s) they would like to try. Trials will be scheduled at a convenient time during the school day and teachers will collect and return pupils to their classrooms. There is no obligation to sign up for lessons following a trial, and the instrumental/vocal teacher will email you with information relating to the success of the session including whether your child demonstrated an aptitude for the instrument and whether they should consider pursuing lessons. If your child is in Year 6, 7 or 8 and involved in camps or Outdoor Week they can still have the opportunity to sign up for a trial lesson, but this will take place during the final week of term. This really is a fantastic opportunity to explore music and discover a hidden love and talent for something entirely new!

## **CHAPLAIN'S THOUGHT OF THE WEEK**

What aren't you talking about?

The murders at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas, have sparked further debate across the USA about gun laws revealing, once again, very polarised voices. The Church of England at the moment is encouraging people to engage with difficult conversations, including talking about human sexuality and relationships through 'Living in Love and Faith' as well as inclusion, diversity, and equality, in response to 'From Lament to Action'. These are incredibly important, and challenging themes for us all and especially identified as important by young voices. The key thing is that we do talk, in schools, families, communities, about these and many other issues. We can always benefit from learning together, understanding one another better, understanding ourselves more deeply. We may continue to disagree, yet we will be more informed, more aware, and more empowered to disagree well.

To enable constructive conversations about anything from relationships and race to vegetarianism, war and politics, the Church of England suggests applying six pastoral principles. They are great strategies for tough conversations, the pastoral principles encourage us to build a culture where we may engage openly, inclusively, and constructively with those challenging themes and tough conversations in the first place.

Speak into silence. Acknowledge prejudice. Address ignorance. Pay attention to power. Cast out fear. Admit hypocrisy.

If you add 'do we' or 'do I' at the start, they also make great questions for reflection, organisationally and personally. In the four gospels of the New Testament, we are told many stories of how Jesus spoke into circumstances where others were silent; of challenging hypocrisy; encouraging reflection on personal views; teaching from fresh perspectives; seeking to offer hope and always being conscious of how power was being used. Einstein said the most important question facing humanity is...is the universe a friendly place? What aren't you talking about – yet?

Thank you for differences that add richness and vibrancy to our world,

that enable us to flourish as individuals and in community.

Sorry that sometimes we allow differences to become problems,

through lack of understanding, love or care.

Please help us, as Jesus taught, to love God and love our neighbour as ourselves even if we don't always agree.

Once the racing had finished it was time to wait for the overall points to be announced, we are thrilled to say that Millfield School Boys Team won the IAPS National Finals with an amazing 106 points. The girls had a more leisurely start to their day with a lie in and breakfast at the hotel before wandering over to the aquatics centre stopping at Waitrose for lunch. They made it to the pool in time to watch and support the boys in their finals. After an awesome relay session, it was time for the girls to have their chance to perform individually. 10 girls qualified for the individual finals giving them the opportunity to win points for the team overall. We had another nervous wait for the results to be published but we were yet again thrilled to hear that the Millfield School Girls team also won the IAPS National Finals with a staggering 130 points, another fantastic achievement in the pool. And finally, it was time for the overall points to be counted.... Millfield School were crowned IAPS National Champions 2022 with an amazing 236 points! This is the 35th year in a row that Millfield School have been crowned champions - what an outstanding sporting achievement! A special mention to the the U12 4 x 25m Freestyle Relay team, consisting of **Keeleigh Cooke, Tumi Makinde, Iona Murray** and **Maisie Fisher** who broke an IAPS relay record. And to **Tumi Makinde** who also broke a IAPS record in the U12 50m butterfly. We are so proud of every swimmer who took part in both the regional and national rounds, it shows all the hard work throughout the year really does pay off.
