



## **RISK ASSESSMENT FOR COVID-19**

On Monday 21 February 2022, the Prime Minister set out the next phase of the Government’s COVID-19 response ‘[Living with COVID-19](#)’. COVID-19 continues to be a virus that we learn to live with and the imperative to reduce the disruption to children and young people’s education remains.

This Risk Assessment has been reviewed and updated to incorporate amendments to this Government guidance. It should be read in conjunction with and reference to the DfE’s document “Schools Coronavirus (COVID-19) Operational Guidance”, dated February 2022<sup>1</sup> and “Contingency Framework: Education and Childcare Settings”, dated February 2022<sup>2</sup>. The measures in this Risk Assessment are to take effect from 25 February 2022.

In response to this guidance, managing the risks of catching the disease at the College will focus in this new stage on clear control measures and good hygiene:

### **Control Measures**

- Ensuring good hygiene
- Maintaining cleaning regimes
- Keeping classrooms and shared spaces well ventilated
- Following public health advice on self-isolation and managing confirmed cases of COVID-19.

### **Hygiene**

Pupils and staff are to:

- Follow all guidance on washing their hands frequently and for the required 20 seconds with soap and water
- Clean their hands on arrival at school, before and after eating, and after sneezing or coughing
- Avoid touching their mouths, eyes, and nose
- Place tissue waste in the bins provided
- Use the hand sanitiser pumps around the College
- Follow the directions to ‘catch it, bin it, kill it.’

## Risk Assessment

This COVID-19 Risk Assessment identifies the current risks at Dulwich College and describes methods of controlling those risks. It is a dynamic process, updated when official advice is published and circumstances or any of the assessed risk factors have changed. Site, school and department-specific assessments and instructions will be completed with reference to this Risk Assessment and communicated to all relevant staff.

### Consultation & Communication

Representatives of the teaching and operational staff have been consulted in the process of compiling this Risk Assessment, which has been communicated to all staff. The core principles and essential relevant details will be communicated to parents and pupils.

### Risk Assessment – General Risks

This Risk Assessment takes into account these levels of risk and government advice, and seeks to achieve the practicable mitigating measures to balance the risks of contagion with the ability to function as a school, particularly in regard to the government imperative of delivering onsite high quality education to every child.. This assessment sets the general principles for the operation of the College with full attendance during the COVID-19 pandemic. Individual departments will make their own localised risk assessments and operational procedures based on the provision of this Assessment. DUCKS, Junior School and Boarding Houses will apply the relevant control measures and will develop their own localised arrangements consistent with the whole College Risk Assessment.

### Assessment of Mitigated Risk

Rather than seek to measure each item of inherent and mitigated risk line by line, a summary of the core risks to the College is below. The impact is assessed from a whole College perspective rather than for the individual, for whom the impact might be more significant.

Mitigated risks are those which exist after the control measures detailed in this document have been carried out.

Contagion from contact with others	Staff and pupils onsite and, those temporarily onsite	<p><b>GENERAL HYGIENE</b></p> <p>A full handwashing routine is to be carried out by every individual when coming on campus and before entering any building. This will require individuals to go to handwashing and sanitiser stations first <i>before</i> attempting to enter a building.</p> <p>Everyone entering any building from within the campus during the day is to use hand sanitiser or carry out handwashing.</p> <p>External handwashing stations for multiple use are to be established across the campus at key points.</p> <p>Hand-sanitising stations are to be in place at the entry to all buildings, with effective routines for replenishing sanitiser.</p> <p>Hand sanitiser is to be available in all classrooms and meeting rooms</p> <p>These routines are to be applied to all onsite: staff, pupils, parents, visitors, contractors etc.</p> <p>Anyone leaving the campus to go into public areas must repeat these sanitation procedures on return to campus.</p> <p>All individuals are to be educated in and must strictly follow respiratory hygiene rules ('catch it', 'bin it', 'kill it') including the risks and how to manage coughs and sneezes, and dispose of tissues etc. Suitable bins are to be provided around the campus and in every room.</p>
Contagion from contact with others	Staff and pupils onsite and those temporarily onsite	<p><b>Face Coverings</b></p> <p>The DfE no longer advise the use of face coverings in schools and we will follow this guidance. However, this may be revised if infection rates reach a certain threshold when face coverings may be one of the measures for stepping up the College's response, in consultation with and guided by public health authorities.</p> <p>The Foundation Schools Coach Service carries pupils from four schools and the risk of cross-contagion to pupils is therefore higher. For these reasons, the College strongly encourages pupils to wear face coverings on the Foundation Schools Coach Service, coach travel to and from sports fixtures or outings and on school minibuses.</p>

Contagion from contact with others onsite	Staff and pupils onsite and, those temporarily onsite	<p><b>Distancing</b></p> <p>Government advice is that social distancing is no longer required. However, whilst the risk from Copvid-19 remains, it is sensible that staff and pupils should avoid excessive close contact, consistent with carrying out their tasks and that everyone should be respectful of others’ space and possibility sensitives and vulnerability.</p> <p>Pupil bubbles are no longer required. However, should infection rates rise in the College and thresholds are reached, it may be necessary to revert to bubbles for specified groups, as directed by the Outbreak Management Plan.</p> <p>Classroom teachers may choose to arrange rooms to provide space where possible, but this is not a requirement.</p>
Contagion from contact with others onsite	Staff and pupils onsite and, those temporarily onsite	<p><b>Hygiene Materials</b></p> <p>Hygiene materials are to be provided in every room, including sanitiser, anti- bacterial wipes, waste bins etc. Hand sanitiser must have suitable non-alcoholic ingredients where there is the possibility of naked flame during lessons e.g. science laboratories, DT, kitchens, smoking areas, Government advice states that he risk of transmission from touching shared surfaces and materials lasts for 48 hours, and 72 hours for hard plastics. Cleaning regimes and use of spaces will take account of this guidance.</p>
Contagion; inadequate wellbeing	Pupils	<p><b>PUPIL ARRANGEMENTS</b></p> <p><b>Co-Curricular, Assemblies, Games</b></p> <p>Assemblies and large gatherings indoors are now permitted and we will introduce regular year group assemblies. For mixed year group gathering permission will be needed from Iain Scarisbrick, Deputy Master.</p> <p>Co-curricular engagement and sport is an integral part of education at Dulwich and will revert to pre-pandemic arrangements.</p>

		<p>Competitive sport is now permitted, and spectators allowed.</p> <p>PE lessons may take place indoors. Spaces should be well ventilated for exercise indoors. Recommended space for exercising pupils and staff indoors is 100sq ft per person.</p> <p>UK and international education trips are permitted, subject to national travel rules and FCDO advice but the College will not be undertaking these until at least summer 2022. Cancellation insurance should be reviewed for every individual trip and the risks of financial loss from a Covid-19 event be taken into account.</p> <p>Patball is also now permitted without restrictions.</p> <p>Changing rooms for pupils will be available, although staff should be aware of the risk of over-crowding and reduce numbers in rooms.</p>
Contagion; poor nutrition	pupils	<p><b>Breaks, Eating and Drinking – Pupils</b></p> <p>The timing of lunches will be reset to ensure no detriment to lesson time. Meals will not be confined to bubbles groups and face to face seating is permitted.</p> <p>Drinking water will be available onsite in the usual locations. All drinking fountains have been converted to spout fill and must not be used to drink from directly. All pupils are to carry their own water bottles which can be filled at fountains and drinking stations.</p> <p>Ned’s Place will provide a click and collect service for Year 12 and 13 pupils.</p> <p>Boarders will eat under their own specified arrangements. DUCKS will maintain their own eating arrangements on their site.</p>
Contagion via clothing & equipment; theft	Pupils	<p><b>Pupil Administration – Uniform, Equipment &amp; Security</b></p> <p>All pupils will be required to wear and maintain standards of school uniform.</p> <p>Pupils and teachers can take books and other shared resources home, although unnecessary sharing should be avoided. Similar rules on hand cleaning, cleaning of the resources and rotation should apply to these resources.</p>
Contagion onsite	Staff and pupils	<p><b>Boarders</b></p> <p>The boarding community has particular risks associated with living onsite and within proximity to each other.</p> <p>A separate assessment of risks and detailed arrangements for boarders will be issued to ensure their safety and wellbeing.</p> <p>Particular attention will be paid to the crossover of boarders into year group bubbles, socialising, washing and dining arrangements.</p>

		Procedures will be in place for managing any boarder who becomes symptomatic and for those who test positive for COVID-19.
Contagion onsite	Staff	<p><b>STAFF ARRANGEMENTS</b></p> <p><b>Working Practices - Classrooms</b></p> <p>Teachers in classrooms are no longer required to maintain 2m distance from pupils but may wish to adjust room layouts to provide space between desks.</p>
Contagion onsite	Staff	<p><b>Working Practices – Operational Departments</b></p> <p>There is a particular risk of an operational department having to close down through transmission of the disease between work colleagues who may be in close proximity. The risk of whole departments closing and important support services no longer being available needs to be taken into account.</p> <p>Operational departments are therefore required to continue to maintain distancing between teams as far as possible and wear face coverings where areas are congested.</p> <p>Staff should continue to wipe down and clean workstations before and after use, especially hot desks.</p> <p>Hygiene equipment/anti-bacterial wipes etc will be provided in all rooms for this purpose.</p>
Contagion	Staff	<p><b>Printing and Photocopying</b></p> <p>The risk of contagion from shared use of equipment such as copiers should be taken into account.</p> <p>Hand sanitiser is to be available and used before and after using the printer/copier.</p> <p>Antibacterial wipes are available in printing and copying areas for wiping down surfaces and touch points after each use.</p>
Inadequate wellbeing; contagion	Staff	<p><b>Eating, Drinking, Rest Areas and Refreshments – Staff</b></p> <p>Staff may take their lunches in the Christison Hall during the lunch break time to suit their convenience.</p> <p>However, unless there are specific exceptions and meals have been pre-booked with the Head of Catering, no meals other than lunches will be provided to staff, except those directly supervising boarders. Boarders will take breakfast in the Christison Hall, within their houses. Breakfast is not available in the dining halls to staff.</p> <p>Arrangements for teas and coffees should be made within departments which conform to hygiene rules. Tea and coffee will be provided by counter service in the Common Room. All staff are expected to bring and be responsible for their own water bottles and cups. Shared cups and utensils are not permitted.</p>

		<p>All persons are to wash hands or, failing handwashing facilities being available, to use hand sanitiser before using rest and breakout areas.</p> <p>Antibacterial wipes to be available in rest and breakout areas. After using the rest and breakout areas persons are to wipe down surfaces and touch points with antibacterial wipes.</p> <p>The Catering Department will have a risk assessment in place to cover the preparation and service of food, hygienic provision of utensils, cleaning.</p>
Contagion onsite	Staff	<p><b>Meetings and Gatherings - All</b></p> <p>Restrictions on face to face meetings have been lifted, although staff should be aware of the risks of close company and consider if face to face meetings are essential. The importance of social interaction is recognised and for the benefit of staff wellbeing a balance needs to be struck between online and face to face meetings. The format of regular meetings will be kept under review, to assess the relative value of both forms.</p>
Ill Health of staff	Clinically vulnerable staff	<p><b>Clinically Vulnerable and Clinically Extremely Vulnerable Staff and Pupils</b></p> <p>The DfE advise that all clinically extremely vulnerable pupils and staff should attend their education setting unless there is specific and individual medical advice to the contrary.</p> <p>Clinically extremely vulnerable and clinically vulnerable staff should attend work at the College and follow the same guidance as everyone else. Clinically extremely vulnerable staff may wish to think about additional precautions they can continue to take, in discussion with their line manager.</p> <p>Staff who live with someone who is clinically vulnerable or clinically extremely vulnerable can attend the workplace but should ensure they maintain good prevention practice in the workplace and at home.</p>
Contagion	Staff and pupils	<p><b>WHOLE SCHOOL ARRANGEMENTS</b></p> <p><b>Transport and Travel</b></p> <p>Staff, parents and pupils are to be encouraged to use healthy means of travel to school as far as possible. Walking and cycling are to be encouraged.</p> <p>Staff and pupils are to follow government and TfL requirements in relation to face coverings on public transport.</p> <p><b>The Foundation Schools Coach Service (FSCS)</b> continues to operate under arrangements with the Foundation Schools. Many routes involve mixing of pupils from different schools and it is not possible to operate coaches by year or school groups alone. Designated seating areas for the different schools will be maintained on board coaches and pupils should be instructed to sit in these areas. All pupils using the coach service are strongly encouraged to wear face coverings and use hand sanitiser when getting on and off the coaches.</p>

		<p>Parents are to be asked to ensure that their children are equipped with re-useable face masks and sanitiser. Coach operators are to provide hand sanitisers on board and have a supply of spare masks on each coach.</p> <p>Travel arrangements to games fixtures and educational trips are to follow the same direction for public transport and coach travel as above. In single school transport, however, primary age children are not required to wear face coverings.</p>
Contagion offsite	Staff and Pupils	<p><b>School Minibuses</b></p> <p>Seating restrictions on minibuses are no longer required. Minibuses should be cleaned between trips. Face coverings are strongly encouraged to be worn by all when using minibuses and windows kept open as far as possible.</p>
Contagion within buildings	Staff and Pupils	<p><b>Ventilation</b></p> <p>Public health and industry advice is that good ventilation is more important than ever to help minimise the spread of the virus. Classrooms are to be well ventilated and windows kept open, as far as possible. In cooler weather windows should be opened enough to provide constant background ventilation, and opened more fully during breaks to purge the air in the space. Heating will be used as necessary to ensure comfort levels are maintained in occupied spaces.</p> <p>Some windows are equipped with window restrictors as a safety measure; although these may limit the available amount of ventilation, they must remain in place because the risk of harm from falling is greater than the risk of catching Covid-19 from an asymptomatic individual.</p> <p>Rooms with limited or no windows or ventilation from the outside have been individually assessed and HEAP air cleaning and filtration units installed in identified locations. These units are to be in use whenever rooms are occupied by more than one person.</p> <p>HSE advice is that CO<sup>2</sup> readings above 1500ppm indicates poor ventilation. Fixed CO<sup>2</sup> monitors are installed in the Barry Buildings and the Laboratory classrooms and should be monitored by staff using the rooms. These monitors have traffic light warning systems. When the monitor shows Amber (1000-1500ppm), windows should be opened to improve ventilation; when Red (above 1500ppm), Maintenance should be called.</p> <p>Portable CO<sub>2</sub> monitors are available to check readings in classrooms where poor ventilation levels are suspected; they will be deployed by Maintenance as required, to determine whether further intervention is needed.</p> <p>To ensure a continuous supply of fresh, air mechanical ventilation systems</p>



		<p>are to be set on the highest appropriate setting, with air circulation disengaged.</p> <p>To balance the need for increased ventilation while maintaining a comfortable temperature, the following measures should also be used as appropriate:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- opening high level windows in preference to low level to reduce draughts</li> <li>- increasing ventilation while spaces are unoccupied (e.g. between classes, during break and lunch, when a room is unused</li> <li>- providing flexibility to allow additional, suitable indoor clothing</li> <li>- rearranging furniture where possible to avoid direct drafts</li> </ul> <p>To improve ventilation and minimise touching of surfaces, doors in corridors and classrooms will be kept open where fire procedures permit. Doors with hold-opens will be kept open at all times. Doors into classrooms may be wedged open by the individual teaching staff at the start of their lesson but <b>MUST</b> be closed at the end of their lesson; this is to comply with fire management procedures. <b><u>No fire door may be left wedged open without direct supervision by responsible staff.</u></b></p> <p>Advice on managing ventilation during the pandemic can be found in HSE guidance at <a href="https://www.hse.gov.uk/coronavirus/equipment-and-machinery/air-conditioning-and-ventilation/index.htm">https://www.hse.gov.uk/coronavirus/equipment-and-machinery/air-conditioning-and-ventilation/index.htm</a></p>
Contagion onsite	Staff and Pupils	<p><b>Toilet Facilities</b></p> <p>Toilet facilities are to be regularly cleaned each day, focusing particularly on door handles, locks and the toilet flush.</p> <p>Pupils and staff are to wash hands thoroughly (using soap and water) before and after using toilet facilities. Form Tutors are to reinforce basic hygiene messages to boys regularly, tailoring the message according to emerging issues, as advised.</p> <p>Hand dryers are to be used to dry hands, or paper towels, which are to be properly disposed of in open bins.</p> <p>Hand soap is to be regularly checked and replenished to ensure that it does not run out.</p> <p>Staff are to notify Maintenance Helpdesk if soap levels are low. Handwashing signage is to be prominently displayed to show how hand washing at basins is to be carried out and at a safe distance.</p> <p>Particular attention is to be taken of narrow access routes to toilets facilities that may be in use by different categories of staff and pupils (e.g. in South Cloister), with signage in place to ensure that staff and pupils keep their distance.</p>

Contagion onsite	All	<p><b>Cleaning Regimes</b></p> <p>Regular cleaning regimes are an important measure to help prevent the transmission of the virus. A cleaning regime will be in place for every building:</p> <p>All rooms are to be cleaned at the end of each day</p> <p>The cleaning teams will be in high demand and it will not be possible to clean rooms between use by different groups. Staff support for cleaners in fulfilling their duties will be appreciated.</p> <p>Cleaning materials effective in defeating the virus will be readily available; self-help with localised cleaning will support the work of the professional teams.</p> <p>Self-help is especially important with IT devices and hot desks; it will be assumed that this is being carried out by staff: cleaning during the day of these facilities will not take place. Pupils are to be instructed to wipe keyboards after each use. Computer equipment and desks is to be regularly wiped clean.</p> <p>Anti-bacterial wipes will be available in classrooms and break- out rooms for staff and pupils to use in wiping down equipment and surfaces as appropriate.</p> <p>COSHH regulations for cleaning materials are to be followed and monitored.</p> <p>Cleaning substances are to be stored in designated secure cupboards when not in use.</p>
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Contagion onsite	All	<p><b>Visitors</b></p> <p>Visitors are welcome to the College and there is no longer an expectation for them to return a negative LFD test result or wear a face covering. This will be kept under review.</p> <p>Parent spectators are permitted to watch games; face coverings are not necessary when outdoors.</p> <p>Visitors will be required to sign in at Reception</p> <p>Contractors will be managed through the Maintenance department and will be required to follow the same visitor procedures. Contractors are to be issued with COVID-19 Safe Systems of Work documentation as part of site induction or pre-construction information and to include COVID-safe methods in all RAMS and Construction Phase Plans.</p>
Lack of contact information for tracing outbreaks	Staff, pupils, visitors	<p><b>Test and Trace</b></p> <p>There will no longer be a requirement to record details of staff, pupils or visitors on Test and Trace.</p>
Medical. Testing & First Aid	Staff and Pupils	<p><b>Medical</b></p> <p>The Medical Centre will be available for staff consultation by appointment and will provide support to pupils and staff in the usual way, ensuring appropriate PPE and preventative measures.</p>

		<p><b>Covid-19 Asymptomatic Testing (AST)</b></p> <p>Following Government advice, the College will no longer ask for regular LFD testing of staff and secondary pupils to identify asymptomatic individuals.</p> <p>A facility for onsite AST will be maintained in the Medical Centre, with back-up facilities using College staff trained in testing.</p> <p><b>First Aid</b></p> <p>Trained first aiders/medical staff will be on site during school and working hours.</p> <p>The Medical Centre will to be open and available to staff and children during school hours.</p> <p>If an accident occurs, care of the casualty may override the need for social distancing but the numbers attending the patient should be kept to the necessary minimum.</p> <p>People involved in assisting those receiving first aid to others should pay particular attention to sanitation measures immediately afterwards, including washing hands. Where possible first aid should be administered by Medical Centre staff wearing appropriate PPE, however, the need for immediate first aid may override this provision and the casualty's needs must take priority.</p> <p>First aid boxes are to, where practical, contain a face mask and disposable gloves.</p> <p>First aid boxes are to be regularly checked and maintained.</p> <p>Contact details of first aiders are to be communicated and displayed as appropriate.</p>
Self-Isolation	Staff and Pupils	<p><b>If Symptoms Appear:</b></p> <p>Staff and pupils with a high temperature and Covid-19 symptoms should not be in school. They can return to school when they are no longer unwell. Should staff take a COVID test and return a positive result, they should not return to school for five full days from the onset of symptoms, providing they are well enough to do so. For children aged 18 or under testing positive, they should not return to school for three full days, providing they are well enough to do so.</p> <p>If a pupil or staff member presents with a high temperature and Covid-19 symptoms whilst at school, they should be assessed by the Medical Centre.</p>

Fire	All	<p><b>Fire Safety</b></p> <p>All staff are to be trained in fire and emergency procedures, and where alterations to standard procedures have been put in place because of COVID-19 risks, especially keeping doors and windows open, these must be expressly communicated to all relevant staff. The risk of fire must not be overridden by COVID-19 control measures; where there is conflict between different measures for fire safety and contagion avoidance, guidance is to be sought from the COO.</p> <p>If a fire occurs, people's safety and the need to evacuate rapidly may override distancing rules where safety is at risk.</p> <p>People involved in assistance to others should pay particular attention to sanitation measures immediately afterwards, including washing hands.</p> <p>Doors will be kept open where possible, using fire-alarm activated door stops. Clear rules and procedures for closing doors in the event of a fire alarm activation are to be communicated and enforced.</p> <p>Escape routes and exits are to be kept clear and easily openable at all times.</p>
Contagion	Staff	<p><b>Smoking Area</b></p> <p>All smokers should wash hands thoroughly or use hand sanitiser before smoking.</p> <p>Smokers must not share cigarettes and lighters/matches.</p> <p>Hand sanitiser within Smoking Areas must be of a non-flammable variety.</p>
Contagion	Staff, Pupils and Visitors	<p><b>Other College Buildings</b></p> <p>The principles and provisions of this Risk Assessment are to be applied to all College locations, including the Sports Centre, DUCKS, the Boathouse and the Outdoor Centre, with local risk assessments and arrangements recorded and in place as appropriate.</p> <p>The Sports Centre will reopen fully, although a booking system for facilities will be maintained for members to avoid over-crowding.</p>
Inadequate information and planning	All staff	<p><b>Contingency Planning &amp; Review</b></p> <p>This Risk Assessment will be regularly reviewed in line with government guidance.</p>

		Levels of infection within the College will be kept under review, inkeeping with government guidance for “Stepping Up” measures if infection threshold numbers are reached. An <b>Outbreak Management Plan</b> has been compiled to specify actions to be take in the event of additional measures being required, which will be determined when certain thresholds of infection are reached (details are in the Outbreak Management Plan. There are three Tiers of extra measures, with increasing levels of restriction. These Tiers and measures will be implemented on PHE advice to contain infection, consistent at all times with the need to ensure continuing high quality educational provision.
Lack of Information	Staff	<p><b>Communication</b></p> <p>This Risk Assessment is to be shared with all staff as part of a consultation process for returning to school, communicated to all staff and made available on the College website. It is to be used in conjunction with supporting documents, additional specific instructions to individual departments and managers with responsibility for particular aspects of implementation.</p> <p>Relevant government guidance and advice is to be incorporated into all documentation.</p> <p>HoDs are responsible for ensuring that all relevant measures are communicated to the schools, pupils, staff and departments.</p> <p>All staff are to be clearly briefed and acquainted with COVID-19 risk mitigation measures and relevant procedures.</p> <p>Suitable signage advising of handwashing and COVID-19 awareness information is to be displayed in strategic locations around the school.</p>
