Curriculum News

Third Grade Reading Guarantee Update

Reading is a critical academic skill for all students and the major focus of our K-3 curriculum. Northwest implemented new reading materials at all grade levels last year, and this year we began using a reading and mathematics progress-monitoring tool. The progress-monitoring tool is administered to students three times a year. The data gathered from this tool enables teachers to identify critical areas of need, adjust instructional practices and provide reading and mathematics interventions as needed.

Ohio's Third Grade Reading Guarantee requires that all third-grade students obtain a minimum score on the state reading test to move on to fourth grade. During the 2015-2016 school year, third-grade students took the ELA assessment in December, and the scores will arrive in the district in February. Students will have a second opportunity to attain a passing score during the spring administration of the Grade 3 ELA test in April. The results of the spring test will be released by June 30, 2016.

The Third Grade Reading Guarantee legislation also permits districts to administer an alternate assessment, selected by the Ohio Department of Education (ODE), to third-graders. The progress-monitoring tool that Northwest uses is one of the alternate assessments on ODE's approved list. Northwest administers the progress-monitoring tool three times per year (Fall, Winter and Spring). Any third-grader who



does not pass the state's ELA assessment but obtains a passing score on the alternate assessment will be promoted to fourth grade.

While the district ensures that we meet all of the requirements of the Third Grade Reading Guarantee legislation, our main focus is to ensure that our students develop strong reading skills and are able to apply those skills to all academic content areas. If you have any questions regarding your child's progress, please contact their classroom teacher or building principal.

District State Report Card Information

The Ohio Department of Education (ODE) released the first round of the 2015 state report card data for all school districts in the state. The second round of data will be released in mid-to-late February. While Ohio is transitioning to new state assessments for a second year in a row, the data from last year's assessments will be analyzed to provide insight on how our students are progressing academically in comparison to their peers across the state as well as identifying any instructional gaps that may exist in our current academic curriculum.

School Bus Driver Academy

The Stark County Educational Service Center is sponsoring a **School Bus Driver Academy** county-wide initiative to attract individuals to a career in bus driving. The Academy will begin June 20, 2016 and run through July 8, 2016. The academy will walk applicants through the process of becoming a school bus driver. Applicants will complete BCI / FBI background checks, pre-employment drug screen, physical, school bus driver training, facilitation of commercial driver's license (CDL), and 12 hours or more of on-bus instruction.

RENEWALLEVY

At its November 2015 meeting, the Northwest Local School District Board of Education voted to place a renewal levy on the March 15, 2016, ballot.

Key Points to Remember

1. This is the Renewal of an Existing Levy.

- a. This is a renewal of a levy that will simply maintain the \$1.5 million that is currently being collected from a property tax levy that was passed in 1992.
- b. This levy has been renewed every five years and the millage reduced every year since that time.
- c. This levy would last ten years.
- d. This is simply a continuation of the financial plan that has already been put in place and endorsed by the Independent Financial Oversight Committee.

2. The Renewal Levy Maintains What We Have.

- a. Passing this renewal levy will keep the Northwest Local Schools out of debt, according to the five year forecast.
- b. It would also allow the district to maintain its current operations and programs.
- c. State deficits and cuts are looming.

3. This Renewal Levy is for Operating Money.

- a. This renewal has nothing to do with building construction.
- b. This money is used to maintain day to day operations.

Renewal: A renewal is a continuation of an existing tax. This March 15th renewal levy has passed every (5) years since 1992. It is a renewal, not a new tax.



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Prequently Asked Questions



- 2. What is the millage? The original millage in 1992 was 12.8 mills. Thanks to the growth of our community, the millage is now only 6.1 mills.
- **3. Why is it called an emergency levy?** Because the levy is a renewal, it must by law carry the original wording used in 1992. Longtime residents of the community who remember the school district's financial situation at that time will agree that the passage of the levy was truly an emergency 24 years ago.
- **4.** How much money is raised by the levy renewal? \$1.5 million, which is 7.9 percent of our general fund.
- **5. Is this a property tax or an income tax?** This is a renewal of an existing <u>property</u> tax.
- 6. Why does the school district need this levy? It allows us to maintain our current operations and programs.
- 7. Is the levy endorsed by The Independent Finance Committee?

Yes, the Independent Finance Committee has reviewed the five-year forecast and determined that renewing the 1992 operating levy is important to the district's financial stability.

8. Class sizes were not to be reduced following the renewal of the operating levy, but I know there are smaller classes.

We did not reduce class size because of finances, we did alter the number of classes at certain grade levels but it was based on enrollment numbers rather than finances. The average number of students in classes has remained in the 26 - 32 range.

- 9. How does Northwest compare to other school districts in **Stark County** in relation to per pupil expenditures? Northwest is third from the bottom. Only Tuslaw and Minerva spend less. (see chart to the right)
- **10.Is the operating levy renewal a permanent levy?** No, the operating levy is a ten-year

renewal.



Participating in trivia nights in a pub in Chicago led to Joyce's journey to be on "Jeopardy!" "What's strange is that I was a relatively new fan of the show. I think being good at Jeopardy was an unexpected byproduct of me generally being a curious person. I love to learn, and I read a lot. I started watching "Jeopardy!" on a regular basis because I had been going to a pub trivia night with some friends, and I thought it would help improve my game. I quickly fell in love with the show, and when it came time for "Jeopardy!" to look for new contestants, I took their online test, more for fun than anything. Several months later I was surprised to see an email inviting me to an audition. At the audition, I and a group of other potential contestants took another test, played a mock game, and did

I practiced with a pen to get the timing down. I also had to learn wagering strategies for Final Jeopardy. Preparation took a lot out of me!"

Joyce describes the experience of appearing on the show as incredibly surreal: "You're on that podium and Alex Trebek comes out to the stage, and you just think you've got to be dreaming. But then the games go by so fast. It's all over in a blur." Joyce's preparation paid off as she won three games, amassing an impressive total of \$39,403 in winnings.

If you watched Joyce Hshieh on "Jeopardy!" you know that she identified herself as being from Chicago, Illinois. She may say she is from Chicago, but for us she will always be Joyce Hshieh of Canal Fulton. And we suspect her mother, a resident of Canal Fulton, will agree with us.


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


Multicultural Day
