Overview

The Calloway County Day Treatment Center located at 2003 College Farm Road is a specialized treatment and educational program for both male and female youths, ages 12-17 who present problems of pre-delinquent or delinquent behavior, family dysfunction, and are having difficulty in school. The DTC is a minimum 120 day placement primarily referred by board of education, district committee, or court-ordered in collaboration with residing school district for discipline. CCDTC serves students from Calloway County and Graves County. DTC provides 210 instructional days based on a 230 day educational calendar. This program works in collaboration with KECSAC and the Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ).

The mission of the Calloway County Day Treatment Program is to involve students in unique learning and instructional



tional experiences in conjunction with specific treatment options. This multidisciplinary approach to treating delinquent or "at-risk" juveniles between the ages of 12 through 17 while they reside in their home community provides a comprehensive array of community based services directed toward promoting rehabilitation and stabilization within the family and to provide opportunities for growth and development to achieve one's human potential. Students will grow academically, be capable of making responsible decisions, and become a contributing member of their school, community, and society.

We, of the Calloway County Day Treatment Center see our mission as empowerment for all students academically, socially, and personally; enabling them to be lifelong learners capable of thinking and solving problems and serving as responsible citizens ready to meet the challenges of tomorrow

Treatment Philosophy

The treatment philosophy of Day Treatment Center shall be anchored in the belief that comprehensive strategies are needed to combat youth delinquency. These strategies begin with strengthening the family in its primary role of instilling moral values, providing guidance and support to children. The supporting core social institutions, such as schools, religious and community organizations, are utilized in developing capable, mature, and responsible citizens.

The program provides individualized treatment services utilizing a multidisciplinary team comprised of the youth, day treatment staff, education staff, youth's family community worker, and other relevant service providers. The family's involvement is of extreme importance, thus the youth's family is expected to participate in the treatment team process.

The Day Treatment program is comprised of an array of treatment options. These options may include: group, individual and family counseling; psychological services; social services; health services; recreation, academic and/or vocational training; and work experiences. This treatment may be provided directly by the Day Treatment staff and through the utilization of community resources for the provisions of needed services.

The curriculum at the Day Treatment Center is interdisciplinary. Students are exposed to various academic disciplines with a strong emphasis on real world applications. Academic strategies are developed by emphasizing outcome based goals that focus on issues, problems, topics, or concepts that are relevant



to the needs of students. Students participate in a No Child Left Behind school wide reading program. Students are provided reading instruction in the areas of word attack skills, reading comprehension, and vocabulary. A library media center will

be used to help deliver on-line curriculum to students. Not only are academic courses presented through the computers, but vocational guidance is also available.



Calloway County Day Treatment has a responsibility to its students beyond that of teaching academic substance. Our facility has the responsibility to teach our students to become responsible citizens. Therefore, grades assigned to students reflect more than academic achievement. Staff assigned by Calloway County Day Treatment are intended to reflect students progress toward high standards of productivity and behavior as well as academic achievement. In conjunction with our reading program, DTC uses A+, BrainPOP, and Achieve 3000 web-based curriculum programs.
