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

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

Northwest Local School District Receives Clean Audit from Auditor of State's Office

Northwest Local School District received a clean audit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009. The Ohio Auditor of State's office found no errors in the way the district is conducting school business. This means the district is in good standing with guidelines put in place with the state of Ohio and that it operates under the fiscal guidelines of the Auditor of State.

The yearly audit looks at cash handling procedures in the following areas:

- Revenue and expenditures
- Payroll
- Fixed assets
- Federal grants
- Student activities

The auditor makes sure the proper procedures are being followed and that all transactions are recorded correctly.

Regardless of the standing given, the Auditor of State's office always provides best practices and recommendations for how the district can improve its fiscal responsibility.

Summer Programs for Northwest Students

Northwest students will enjoy special summer programs

this year, thanks to efforts by the Paul and Carol David YMCA and the United Way. High school students will have an opportunity to participate in summer gym during two sessions: June 7-24 and July 5-22. Both sessions run from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m. on Monday through Thursday. One exception is the week of July 5 when the program will run from Tuesday through Friday.

The activities will include a variety of group exercises, such as cardio boxing, yoga, Pilates and total body toning; physical activities from "Minute to Win It" and "The Amazing Race"; and lessons in the principles of exercise, wellness and nutrition.
