Modular Tech Lab Teaches Middle **School Students Practical Math and** Science

Northwest Middle School is now offering a Modular Tech Lab for eighth-graders, and only three such labs currently serve students in Stark County. The lab is designed to teach students to become responsible learners and to work cooperatively with others. The semester class teaches students the practical application of the skills

and principles they have learned in their math and science classes.

The class, taught by Mr. Brian Ries, offers 15 different Modular Tech workstations, including Chemical Math, CNC Manufacturing, Engineering Bridges, Environmental Issues, and Rocketry and Space. Every student's learning style is accommodated in each of these modules. Whether a student is a kinesthetic or visual learner, or even a nonreader, he or she will be ensured success through a combination of text, graphics, video, and hands-on activities.

Middle School Gym Nears Completion

Work on the middle school gym is nearly 90 percent completed, and the results are amazing. Anyone who remembers the old gym as dark and crowded is in for quite a surprise. The duct work was upgraded and moved from the center of the gym to the sides. Windows were added and translucent shades cover the windows. T-5 high bay light fixtures were added to improve the lighting. Occupancy sensors were installed so the lights shut off after 20 minutes if no one is in the gym, serving as a cost-saving measure.

The old floor was pulled up and asbestos removed before a new competition-grade floor was installed. Bleachers were replaced and two new scoreboards were added. Both the proscenium and stage floor were sanded and refinished. Sound panels must still be hung around the ceiling, and these tiles will absorb sound and provide insulation. The locker room was also totally redone. The renovation includes new showers, lockers, lights, heating and ventilation.

Arts in Stark Grant funds New Music Program for Middle School Students

Northwest Middle School was recently awarded a grant from Arts in Stark that will provide music lessons to students. The terms of the grant allowed Program Coordinator Kim Good to purchase 13 guitars. Guitar lessons will be provided after school by a professor and a student from the music department at the University of Akron. Dr. Mike Shreffler says he hopes to make the program ongoing, "We hope to be able to sustain the program and even grow it in the future with a guitar club at the high school."

This five thousand dollar grant is a partnership grant between Arts in Stark, Northwest Local Schools and ORMACO (Ohio Regional Music Arts and Cultural Outreach).

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Martha Holden Jennings Grant awarded to Northwest District

Northwest Local School District has been awarded a Martha Holden Jennings Foundation Grant in the amount of \$17,620.00. The focus of the grant involves "Thinking and Learning for the 21st Century," emphasizing engaging, rigorous curriculum that is delivered through authentic differentiated instructional practices. A core team of teachers will be trained in differentiated instructional practices and 21st century skills. This team will host a summer institute for kindergarten through fifth-grade staff members. Participating staff members will analyze their instructional materials for 21st century attributes, apply principles of differentiation into their curriculum and scaffold their lessons to meet the needs of the diverse learners in their classrooms. The differentiated lessons and assessments will be implemented in the fall of 2013.

The projected outcomes for this grant include:

- · Classroom environments, which are student-centered, promoting a sense of satisfaction in the learner.
- An opportunity to meet the diverse learning needs of all our students, encouraging them to understand and practice life-long learning.
- Implementation of differentiated instructional practice in our classrooms.
- Embedded 21st century skills in classroom lessons providing students with the tools, skills and processes necessary for learning.
- Ongoing, embedded professional development for teachers as they implement differentiated instructional practices.

These five Northwest educators will attend an ASCD (formerly the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development) conference in Chicago in mid-March. Director of Instruction Debora Clark, the recipient of the Jennings Grant, believes, "The opportunity to attend the ASCD Differentiation Conference will enable a core team of teachers to be trained on the principles of differentiation. Their training will allow them to assist other Northwest teachers in developing student-centered classrooms, places where teachers meet individual student needs."

We wish to express our condolences to the family of Mr. Gary Dial, who passed away in December. For over 30 years, Mr. Dial was a beloved Northwest High School teacher, assistant principal and football coach. Northwest High School is a better place because of Mr. Dial. His family will continue his legacy with a scholarship to be given annually in his name. Retired high school principal Steve Jones, a colleague and close friend, said, "Gary's influence was far-reaching because he touched the lives of students from all backgrounds, and he consistently treated them with respect. In turn, they liked him but respected him more."

State Mandates Curriculum Changes

The math department of Northwest High School has implemented some changes as a result of mandates from the Ohio Department of Education and the Ohio Core. One change means that this year's freshman class will be the last to take the Ohio Graduation Test, which will be administered in the spring of 2014. End of course exams will be administered in its place. In addition, beginning in 2014, high school students will be required to take four years of math. Also, all high school students are required to pass Algebra II.

At Northwest High School students will be able to follow one of three tracks in the math department:

- · Algebra I—Geometry—Algebra II—Advanced Math
- · Integrated Math I—Integrated Math II—Integrated Math III—Integrated Math IV
- · Eighth Grade Algebra I—Geometry—Algebra II—Advanced Math—AP Calculus

Northwest High School Principal Eric Bornstine explains, "To compete in today's global economy, having basic algebra and geometry skills are not enough. Students need to be able to use algebraic skills and reasoning to solve complex, real-world problems, which is why the Ohio Department of Education added a fourth year mathematics graduation requirement for the Class of 2014 and beyond to ensure students complete Algebra II or an equivalent course.

Race to the Top Update

Northwest Local is currently focusing on the work outlined in year three of its Race to the Top Grant. The Student Learning Objectives (SLO) Committee has created a district plan for assisting teachers in developing student growth measures. The growth measures will be utilized to monitor the academic progress of our students, and the data gathered from the SLO's will be used as part of the teacher evaluation system beginning with the 2013-2014 school year. The district is piloting Ohio's teacher and principal evaluation systems with a focus on full implementation during the 2013-2014 school year. The district continues to focus on implementing the Formative Instructional Practices (FIP) initiative. Grade level and department level teams are working collaboratively to identifying clear learning targets for each content area, and developing and deploying common assessment practices that promote student engagement and learning.

The Race to the Top (RttT) transformation team met recently to focus on the upcoming StockTake meeting, which will be held with the RttT Regional Coordinator. The StockTake meeting will examine the district's progress towards meeting the district's identified goals and performance measures. The team also worked on the district's implementation procedures for the new teacher and principal evaluation system and student growth measures. The district is currently on track to meet its identified RttT goals and performance measures. What is Bullying?

"Bullying is when someone repeatedly and on purpose says or does mean or hurtful things to another person who has a hard time defending himself or herself."

Olweus Anti-Bullying Program

The district-wide campaign to end bullying in our schools was kicked off in January as each building taught students about the dangers of bullying, stressing the theme of "Count on Me."

Northwest Primary School held an assembly that featured a story about Chester Raccoon and his efforts to end bullying in his school. The primary school students were delighted with a special guest appearance by Chester who greeted the students and encouraged them to be kind to other students. Students sang "Count on Me" to end the assembly.

Stop. Walk. Stand Up. Talk.

Stinson Elementary held an assembly entitled "Stop. Walk. Stand Up.Talk." Colleen Clark, a choreographer, performer and teacher of dance and movement, presented a program using dance to explore four strategies for dealing with bullies and other conflicts at school. The movement-based assembly demonstrates the power of posture, attitude and speaking up when students themselves are a target of bullying or when they see others being bullied. The assembly was funded by a SmARTS grant received through Arts in Stark.

Northwest High School kicked off its anti-bullying campaign with a week devoted to defining bullying and offering four pledges over the week to deter the problem.

Pledge #3: We will include students who are left out.

Pledge #4: If we know that somebody is being bullied, we will tell an adult at school and an adult at home.

The anti-bullying campaign at the high school will continue on through class meetings in the next few weeks.

Guidance Counselor Jessica Cogar shared the results of a survey about bullying taken by middle school students. Canal Fulton Patrolman John Barabasch discussed cyber-bullying, and Junior Teen Institute members presented a short play about bullying. Principal Larry Tausch spoke about personal responsibility, and middle school choir students ended the program by singing "Count on Me." Other activities included "Mix it Up" during lunch and an anti-bullying poster contest.

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


