Northwest Student Athletes Begin League Play This Fall

After six years of being an Independent, the Northwest Local School District will enter the Principals' Athletic Conference (PAC) this fall. The PAC consists of Cuyahoga Valley Christian Academy, Fairless, Manchester, Orrville, Triway, Tuslaw and Loudonville (who will be a member for football only). Longtime residents will see this new league as a return to the All Ohio Conference, or as some may have called it, the "Route 93 League."

Welcome Back to School

As the long days of summer begin to fade, students begin to anticipate their return to school. While some students are excited to return with new school supplies and outfits others are sad to see the carefree days of summer coming to an end. The transition back to the structured routines of a school year may cause anxiety or apprehension for some students as they anticipate the changes that accompany a new school year. As the district eagerly anticipates the return of students, staff members are preparing their classrooms, school buildings, and schedules for the upcoming school year. NW Primary, W.S. Stinson and NW Middle School will host a Back-to-School Night on August 21st so students can meet their teachers and tour their classrooms and buildings with school resuming on Wednesday, August 23rd. We hope our students have the opportunity to enjoy a few more leisurely summer days and family activities. We will see you soon!

K-5 Science/6-12 Social Studies **Curriculum Changes**

The district has adopted and will implement the Delta Education's Full Option Science System (FOSS) in first through fifth grades. The FOSS philosophy is to engage students in science through active learning. Students will be exposed to science concepts through active investigations, recording in science notebooks to answer focused questions, reading FOSS science resources, and completing assessments that will monitor their progress and promote reflection on learning. The FOSS science kits are aligned with Ohio's Science Learning standards and state assessments. The district selected Science Companion's Early Science Explorations kit for use in kindergarten. Students will explore science concepts throughout the year in the areas of growing and changing; class pets; collections from nature; constructions; dirt, sand and water; senses; and sky and weather. The explorations will be integrated into language arts and mathematics lessons to enable students to explore science concepts while strengthening their reading and mathematics skills. Science Companion uses the "I Wonder" Circle to help students reflect on how they and scientists do science.

The district also purchased new social studies materials for students in grades 6-12. The middle school students will be using the TCI's online History Alive! Program. The 6th grade Ohio Edition explores the geography, history, and culture of the great civilizations of Mesopotamia, Egypt, and the Near East,

India, and China. The 7th grade Ohio Edition explores the civilization from Europe, Africa, the Middle East and Asia as well as their continuing legacies and connections to the foundations of our modern world. The 8th grade Ohio Edition explores the history of the United States through Industrialism.

New social studies textbooks were reviewed and selected for use in our high school courses as well. The texts selected included Magruder's American Government and United States History (Pearson Publishing); American Pageant AP US History (Cengage Publishing); Psychology (Prentice-Hall Publishing); Sociology (Houghton Mifflin Harcourt Publishing); and World Geography (McGraw-Hill Publishing). Samples of the K-5 science materials and 6-12 social studies materials are available at the Central Office. Individuals who wish to schedule an appointment to review sample materials should contact Debora Clark, Director of Instruction at (330) 854-2292. During the 2017-18 school year, the district will review and select K-5 social studies materials as well as instructional materials for elective courses offered at the middle school and high school.

Required Summer Reading

While students enjoy the sunshine and the relaxed pace of summer break, it's important that their minds stay active. Often referred to as the "summer slide," a break from critical thinking can result in an achievement gap. Aligned with new state standards of increased rigor and independent learning, Northwest middle school and high school students have a summer reading assignment due the second day of school. Students are required to purchase, high-light, and annotate their assigned books. Please see the student resources Quick link for all assignment details. District Updates Student Attendance Policies

It is important for every student in the Northwest School District to attend school every day. Excessive absences interfere with a student's progress in mastering academic content and skills and has long-term impact on students being prepared for graduation and attending higher education or entering the workforce. In December 2016, the Ohio General Assembly passed House Bill 410 to encourage and support a preventative approach to excessive absences and truancy.

HS 410 calculates a student's absences in hours rather than days. Student absences are defined as excused, excessive, and habitual truancy (unexcused absences).

- **Excessive absences** occur when a student is absent 38 or more hours in one school month with or without a legitimate excuse; or 65 or more hours in a school year with or without a legitimate excuse.
- **Habitual truancy** occurs when a student is absent for 30 or more consecutive hours without a legitimate excuse; absent 42 or more hours in one school month without a legitimate excuse; or absent 72 or more hours in one school year without a legitimate excuse.

The district has updated the Board Policy on student absences and these changes will go into effect at the start of the 2017-18 school year.

- Students will receive an excused absence letter when they have missed 30 hours (5 days), 60 hours (10 days) and 90 hours (15 days)
 - After a student reaches 90 hours (15 days) of excused absences, a physician's note will be required for medical verification in order for the absence to be excused. Medical verification means that a physician has treated an illness or injury and has verified to the attendance office that because of the illness or injury, the student was unable to attend school. Official medical notification (which includes the physician's name, phone number, and specific dates of illness to be excused from school) must be submitted to the attendance office upon the student's return to school within two (2) days following the absence. Illness or injury that has not been treated by a physician is not verified.
- Students who have excessive absences of 38 hours in a month, excused or unexcused, will be referred to the district's absence intervention team. The team will meet with parents and develop an absence intervention plan for students.
- Students who have excessive absences of 65 hours in a year, excused or unexcused, will be referred to the
 district's absence intervention team for further assistance including Coleman Mediation and/or Juvenile
 Court.

Reasons for which a student may be excused include, but are not limited to:

- . personal illness of the student,
- 2. illness in the student's family,
- 3. needed at home to perform necessary work directly and exclusively for the parents or legal guardians (applies to students over 14 years of age only),
- 4. death in the family,
- 5. quarantine for contagious disease,
- 6. religious reasons,
- 7. traveling out of state to attend a Board-approved enrichment activity or extracurricular activity (applies to absences of up to 24 school hours) or,
- 8. as determined by the Superintendent.

Any questions or concerns regarding the district's student attendance policy should be directed to building principals or district-level administrators. It is critically important for every student in the Northwest School District to attend school every day. The administrative team and staff members will work with families to promote attendance and academic and extra-curricular successes for all students.

Under Construction

The past few summers have seen a lot of work being done to the exterior of our Northwest Campus. We have installed artificial turf in the stadium, cut a cross country course into our wooded property and last year we built a new softball field. This summer, First

Energy trucks, orange cones, piles of dirt, and new wires in the sky caught the attention of many passersby.



When the campus was built, each building, including the annex and the stadium, was given an electric meter. After some research, we determined that we could ultimately save the district thousands of dollars for years to come if we combined all of the meters into one main meter. There was a cost to the project, but in time we will see substantial savings. The project is nearly complete at this time.

Child Find

In an effort to serve young people with disabilities, Northwest Local is continually in the process of locating and evaluating children from 3 to 21 years of age who are suspected as having a disability. Disabilities may include developmental delays, health impairments, autism, and traumatic brain injury. Individuals may contact the building Principals or Director of Special Services about children suspected as having a disability that may qualify for special education services. Information is available about special education policies and procedures in each building by contacting the building Principal.

Northwest has a child identification process that includes the location, identification and evaluation of a child suspected of having a disability within and outside of district buildings. The Department of Special Services coordinates the child identification process. The Northwest evaluation staff use a variety of community resources and systematic activities in order to identify children requiring special services. Included in this effort is consultation with appropriate representatives of private school students attending private schools located within the boundaries of the Northwest Local district to carry out this process. Northwest ensures that this process for students attending private or religious schools located in the Northwest is comparable to activities undertaken for students with disabilities served in the public school setting.

Bus Route Information for 2017-2018

Northwest Schools will resume on Wednesday, August 23, 2017. New bus schedules will be mailed to parents approximately Friday, August 11, 2017.

The district has recently purchased new routing software called *Traversa*. We are one of two Stark County schools using this new product. Traversa should be fully implemented by the start of the school year. It is totally web based, providing transportation information efficiently and effectively. The change has been complex and time consuming. We ask that parents remain patient with our estimated target dates. Now, more than ever, it is critical that parents inform the transportation department of any changes in address, pick/up and drop/off, etc.

Parents are reminded to have their children at their designated bus stop approximately 10 minutes before the posted time for at least the first seven to ten days of school until the route times are more established. Students are expected to be outside waiting at their bus stop for the bus. Please dress your children accordingly. If you have any concerns or questions, please call the bus garage at 330-854-3301 or e-mail birone.s@northwest.sparcc.org. Please be sure to include your child's name, grade, school, daytime phone number, and change request.

Children are encouraged to leave all personal articles in their backpack while riding the school bus. All articles your child takes to school that you want to return home should be clearly labeled with your child's name. All found labeled articles are returned to the child as soon as possible. Any unlabeled articles that are found on the buses will be placed in the lost and found at the bus garage and kept until the end of the school year.

Please make sure any loose or long strings are cut off. This is very important for your child's safety so that long dangling strings do not get caught on the bus or in the bus door.

Please make sure an adult meets your kindergarten child at their PM bus stop every day. You must be visible to the bus driver. Be in the doorway or wave at the bus driver so they know someone is at home. Kindergarten children may walk home with an older sibling who is also on the bus route. Should you not make it home before your child, we will automatically return your child to their school or the bus garage where you will need to pick them up.

Immunization

All students who will be entering 12th grade are required to have Meningitis vaccine given on or after the age of 16 years of age.



All students who will be entering 7th grade are required to have TDaP and Meningitis vaccines

All students who will be entering Kindergarten must show complete immunization for DTaP, Polio, Hepatitis B, MMR and Varicella. Your child will be due for many of these immunizations after the age of 4 years.

Please make arrangements with your child's health care provider or the Stark County Health Department 330-493-9914 extension 111 to receive the required immunizations.

Written proof of these vaccines must be turned in to the school office BEFORE the start of next school year, or your child will be excluded from attending school and all school-related activities until received.
