



Athletic Hall of Fame: Class of 2018

Twenty one outstanding athletes, coaches, and contributors were inducted into the Northwest Athletic Hall of Fame on Saturday, January 13th. The inductees of 2018 comprise the second class inducted to honor the rich athletic heritage of the district. Each has preserved his or her name in Northwest athletic history and has set a standard of excellence for future Indian athletes. It is the hope of the Hall of Fame committee that this honor will continue to gain support within the Northwest community, ensuring that it will become an annual event. A special thanks to the Hall of Fame committee members: Chris Brady, Laura Distell, Jason Hathaway, John Hexamer, Steve Jones, Gary Woods, and committee chairman Rich Workman.

Gary Dial, Coach & Administrator

Gary received his Bachelor of Science degree from Ashland in 1972 and his Master in Education degree from The University of Akron in 1978. He taught at Fairless, Akron Hoban, and Canton McKinley high schools before coming to Northwest in the fall of 1981. As head football coach, his teams from 1981 to 1983 were an impressive 24-5-1. The 1983 All Ohio Conference team won the conference title with a 9-0-1 record—Northwest's first undefeated football team. Gary also coached



from 1986 to 1989 with continued success. He gave up his coaching duties to become a district administrator. Sadly, Gary was taken from us in December 2012 after 37 years in education. The road leading to the high school and middle school, Dial Way, has been named in his honor. (Bonnie Dial, pictured above, accepted the award for her late husband, Gary.)

Ben Easterling, Contributor

A 1968 graduate of Barberton High School, Ben was a 4-sport athlete and a leader on his teams and in his school. He earned a degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Kentucky. While employed at Babcock and Wilcox as a cost engineer, he was also employed by Campfield Hickman Collier Funeral Home in Barberton. He became a licensed funeral director and joined forces with Glen Swigart to found Swigart-Easterling Funeral Home in Canal Fulton in 1978. Ben has become one of the community's greatest philanthropists and leaders supporting local entities with his time, talents, and finances. During Northwest's financial crisis, he was a leader on the Independent Finance Committee that recommended financial strategy to save the district and put it on sound financial footing.

The Northwest Board of Education held its organizational meeting on Monday, January 10, 2018. The Honorable Judge Edward Elum led board members James Gindlesberger, Victor Colaianni, and Bob Schilling in the oath of office. James Gindlesberger was selected to serve as the Board President and John Hexamer was selected to serve as the Board Vice-President. The Board meets on the fourth Monday of each month at Northwest High School in Room 302. The Board of Education agendas, meeting minutes, and board member contact information is available on the district website under the Board of Education link.

Gifted Identification

While all children have gifts and talents, not all children are considered "gifted." Northwest Local understands the need for educational opportunities for students who demonstrate exceptional cognitive and academic skills. Gifted identification begins as young as kindergarten. Students who qualify for services in grades K-3 have access to enriched curriculum opportunities in reading and mathematics. Students in 4th and 5th grade who qualify for services have access to our gifted ELA and math courses. Students in middle school and high school have access to enriched courses, AP courses, and College Credit Plus courses. All students in kindergarten through eleventh grade participate in whole-grade academic screening. In addition, second and fifth grade students participate in whole-grade gifted screening in the area of superior cognitive abilities and creative thinking. Parents may refer their child for gifted testing by requesting a referral form from their building administrator and returning the form by May 1, 2018. Alumni of Distinction Dr. Brian H. Lower

Dr. Brian H. Lower, a 1990 graduate of Northwest High School, is currently an associate professor for the School of Environmental and Natural Resources at The Ohio State University. He earned his Bachelor Degree from Kent State University and holds a Ph. D. in chemistry from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. He has received numerous teaching



awards, including the North American Colleges and Teachers of Agriculture Education Award and the college's Rodney F. Plimpton Outstanding Teacher Award, which is the highest honor given to faculty by the college. Dr. Lower most recently received two awards this past year: The Association of Public and Land-Grant Universities (APLU) 2016 Excellence in College and University Teaching Award for Food and Agricultural Sciences and the 2017 Alumni Award for Distinguished Teaching. Dr. Lower continues to conduct research in the field of microbial biogeochemistry. He engages students and builds excitement in his field. Lower joined OSU in 2008 and within a year of teaching, his class sizes doubled! He has taught over 30 courses to almost 6,000 students. Even students who claim they don't like science list Brian H. 

Bryan Echols, Soccer

A 1999 graduate of Northwest High School, Bryan was a big part of Northwest's one-two punch (with teammate Jon Parfitt) in soccer over his 4-year career. For his efforts on the field, Bryan was selected All NBC for four consecutive years culminating with back-to-back First Team honors in 1997 and 1998. In 1998.



he was selected as a First Team member of the All Stark County soccer team. Bryan earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Business Administration from Mount Union College and played soccer for the Purple Raiders for four years. In 2002, he was selected Academic All Ohio Athletic Conference for his outstanding academic accomplishments. Bryan currently serves as operations manager for Echols Heating and Air Conditioning.

Rachel Green, Volleyball & Basketball

A 2005 graduate of Northwest High School, Rachel was a standout in both volleyball and basketball. An outside hitter for Coach John Rafailedes' teams, she helped the 2004 team carry their NBC title to the Regional Finals. In basketball, she



currently ranks 5th in scoring (958 points) and 2nd in rebounding (690 boards) in the annals of Northwest Girls Basketball history. She was a 3-time All NBC selection, 2-time District IV and NE Inland District selection, and a Second Team All Ohio player in her senior season. Her "Player of the Year" status is a tribute to her hard work. Rachel received a full basketball scholarship to The University of Akron where she earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in Social Work, and she recently completed her Master of Health Administration degree at Ohio University.

Dakota Harkins, Volleyball & Basketball

A 2010 graduate of Northwest High School, Dakota was class valedictorian. She set and still holds many records for the Lady Indians, including career kills (1201), block kills (245), and spike attempts (2472). The Lady Indians dominated the NBC over her 4-year career with a 53-3 record and three undefeated first place



finishes. Her honors include three Division II All State selections and First Team honors her junior and senior year. Dakota received an athletic scholarship to the University of Toledo where she earned four letters for the Lady Rockets and was team captain for three years. She was a 3-time All MAC selection and received the prestigious Randolph C. Downes and Mid American Conference's Academic Presidential Award. Dakota earned a degree in anthropology and history, and she earned her Master's degree from Appalachian State University.

Dave Howard, Cross Country & Track

A 2002 graduate of Northwest High School, David distinguished himself in both cross country and track. He was NBC "Runner of the Year" in 2000. He was the Stark County Champion in both 2000 and 2001 and was a District Champion in 2001. His senior year, he was the NBC Champion at 1600M, 3200M, and 4x800M



relay. A three-time All Ohioan, he placed second in the 1600M in 2001 and fifth in 2002. He was also a State Medalist in the 3200M run in 2001 and 2002. He currently holds school records in the 3200M and 4X800 relay. David received an athletic scholarship to The University of Akron where he earned four letters in both cross country and track. He was the cross country team's MVP each year and was selected as the MAC's "Newcomer of the Year" in 2002. He became

only the second male in Zip's history to earn Cross Country All MAC Second Team honors in 2004 & 2005. In track, he still holds the school record in the 3000M and the 5000M. David works for MK Morse as an Edge Prep Operator.

Tyler Krzynowek, Golf & Basketball

A 2008 graduate of Northwest High School, Tyler distinguished himself in both golf and basketball, earning four letters in each sport. He was a member of the 2006 State Qualifying golf team that finished seventh at the State Tournament. He was named All NBC three times. In basketball, the Indians were NBC Champs



in both 2006 and 2008. He was named All NBC in 2006, 2007, and 2008, All District IV in 2007 and 2008, and NE Inland District in 2006, 2007, and 2008. He captained the 2008 basketball team that finished in a three-way tie for first in the NBC. He finished his career as a member of the program's 1000 Point Club amassing 1070 points. This total currently ranks him fifth on the Tribe's all-time scoring list. After high school, Tyler earned his degree in Business Administration from The University of Akron.

Kim Kumer, Volleyball, Basketball, & Softball

A 1989 graduate of Northwest High School, Kim was class valedictorian and a three-sport athlete. She earned seven varsity letters: three in volleyball and four in softball. On the volleyball court, she was named First Team All Ohio League her sophomore, junior, and senior years. She helped Northwest win three consecutive AOL championships. As a Lady Indian softball player, she helped to guide Coach Russ Sherhag's teams to three straight AOL and Sectional Championships. She was selected to the First Team AOL and Stark County for her efforts. Kim received a softball scholarship to Kent State University and was a catcher for the Lady Golden Flashes. Today, Dr. Kim Kumer is a Lt. Colonel in the United States Air Force where she is medical director of the Mental Health Flight division. She is stationed at Ramstein Air Force base in Germany.

Paul Kunkle, Basketball, Track, & Club Volleyball

A 1989 graduate of Northwest High School, Paul distinguished himself in two varsity sports and one club sport for the Tribe. As team MVP in basketball, he led the team in scoring, rebounding, and free-throw shooting in both his junior and senior seasons. These efforts earned him league and district honors as a First Team selection in the AOL and District IV both seasons. In 1989, he represented

Northwest in both the Rotary All Star and the CYC All Star games. In the late eighties and early nineties, Northwest fielded a Club Men's Volleyball program. Paul was recognized as a First Team All Ohio Club Volleyball selection his senior year. He earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Sports Medicine and Secondary Education from Heidelberg College. After a brief teaching and coaching career, he became a Special Agent for the FBI.

Laura Lybarger Amison, Volleyball, Basketball, & Softball

A 1989 graduate of Northwest High School, Laura distinguished herself in three sports for the Lady Indians. Her volleyball prowess earned her First Team Honors in the AOL, Stark County, and District IV. She was selected as the team's MVP in 1988. Her basketball teams went 52-15 over the course of her varsity career and were

ranked second in the final AP Girls Basketball poll. In softball, she earned Second Team All District and First Team All Stark County honors her senior season. Laura received her Bachelor of Science degree from Bowling Green State University majoring in physical therapy. She continued her education at Shenandoah University in Winchester, Virginia and earned a Doctorate of Physical Therapy.

Jerry May, Football, Basketball, Baseball, & Track

A 1961 graduate of Northwest High School, Jerry earned a total of twelve varsity letters. He was an outstanding two-way football player, playing quarterback and safety and handling the kicking chores as the team's punter and placekicker. He was selected First Team All County in 1958, 1959, and 1960 on the Stark County



Class "A" League Champion Northwest Indians. His play in his senior year earned him Honorable Mention All State honors. In basketball, he was a fouryear starter, and the 1960 and 1961 teams were Stark County Class "A" league champions. The 1961 team earned a District championship. His play that season earned him Third Team All State honors. Jerry attended Ohio University and The University of Akron earning a degree in finance. Today, he is a retired mortgage banker.

Bob McFarland, Football, Basketball, & Track

A 1959 graduate of Northwest High School, Bob was an outstanding three-sport athlete for the Indians in their first years of existence. In football, he was selected All Stark County from Northwest's league championship teams of 1957 and 1958. His senior year, he became Northwest's first All Ohio



Football honoree with a First Team selection as tackle. In basketball, the Indians competed in the county's Class A league. The 1958-59 team advanced to the OHSAA Class "AA" tournament. Bob received a football scholarship to the University of Cincinnati where he earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in education. He turned his talents to coaching and became a legendary football coach at Medina Highland High School compiling an impressive 34-9-2 record for the Hornets. He later became the winningest coach in his seventeen-year career coaching Wooster High School Generals.

Mark Musleve, Football, Wrestling, & Baseball

A 1977 graduate of Northwest High School, Mark earned ten varsity letters for the Tribe. He earned three football letters and was selected First Team Senate League in both 1975 and 1976. He co-captained the 1976 team and earned the prestigious Tom Culp Award given annually to Northwest's Best Offensive



Lineman. In wrestling, he was a two-time Senate League Champion and a District Qualifier. He was an integral part of the wrestling program that dominated the Senate League from 1974 to 1977 winning three league titles. He was named Most Valuable Wrestler at the 1977 Northwest Invitational. On the diamond, he earned four varsity letters in baseball as a pitcher, a first baseman, and an outfielder. Mark is a thirty-eight year employee of Ohio Edison.

Jon Parfitt, Soccer

A 1999 graduate of Northwest High School, Jon distinguished himself on the soccer field as a forward. He was the leading scorer on the school's 1998 State Runner-up team. In 1997 and 1998, he was selected NBC, Stark County, and District IV First Team. He was awarded "Player of the Year" both years for all



three aforementioned groups. He was selected Second Team All State as a junior and First Team All State as a senior. He finished his career with two school

records: goals scored in a season (30) and in a career (64). Both of these records still stand today. John earned an Associate Degree in Sound Engineering from Ontario Institute of Recording Technology. He is currently a sound and music producer for games and interactive media.

John Rafailedes, Coach

In his twenty-eight years of coaching the Northwest Lady Indians volleyball team, John compiled an amazing 470-205 record. His teams won eleven NBC championships, eight District championships, and made eight Regional with four Regional Finalist appearances. John was a ten-time NBC "Coach of the



Year," eight-time Stark County "Coach of the Year," and twelve-time District IV "Coach of the Year." In 2004, he received the State Volleyball Coaching Achievement Award. Destined for the OHSVCA Hall of Fame, he amassed over 500 victories with a winning percentage of 65.8 in his thirty-one year volleyball coaching career. John earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in education from The University of Akron and his Master of Administration degree from the University of Dayton. He is currently coaching at Massillon Washington High School.

Dan Ritzman, Basketball & Baseball

A 1995 graduate of Northwest High School, Dan was an outstanding two-sport athlete for the Indians earning varsity letters in both basketball and baseball. He earned District IV honors basketball in 1993, 1994, and 1995. He represented Northwest at both the Rotary and CYC All Star Classics in his senior season. He ended his career with 1148 points, currently ranking him fourth on the All Time Career scoring record for the Tribe. He was part of the World Sports Exchange Basketball program and took his talent to both Spain and France. As a baseball pitcher, his outstanding performance in the 1995 Stark County East-West All Star game earned him MVP honors for his team. Dan earned his degree in Business Marketing and Management from the University of Toledo.


Don Shalmo, Contributor




