# **District Literacy Plan, Phase I**

Literacy is a fundamental skill that opens the doors of learning and provides students with the ability to pursue knowledge and opportunities. A child's literacy skills develop and grow over time at varied intervals. By fourth grade, all students need to have developed the reading, writing, and critical thinking skills needed for academic success. Northwest Local has examined our K-3 Literacy Data, our State Third Grade English Language Arts Assessment Data, and we have developed a literacy plan to ensure that our students are on-track with their literacy development and reading skills.

This fall, Northwest Primary will implement the Wilson Fundations Reading program in grades K-1. The Fundations program lays the groundwork for lifelong literacy using a systematic program that emphasizes critical foundational reading skills including: phonemic awareness, phonics/word study, high frequency word study, vocabulary development, comprehension strategies, handwriting, and spelling. Teachers will implement the 30-minute, whole-class lessons daily and will receive ongoing professional development and support through the implementation. The following year, the Fundations program will be implemented in second grade as well.

Parent involvement in developing literacy skill is encouraged. Teachers will provide home support packs that will inform parents about the concepts the students are currently learning and activities that should be done to reinforce instruction. For every child, home activities that encourage the development of vocabulary and comprehension skills are important. When parents read aloud to their children and have discussions about the text, children are exposed to more advanced concepts, even though they may not yet be able to read the materials themselves. Fostering the love of reading might just be one of the greatest gifts you could ever give to your child. "Reading is to the mind what exercise is to the body." -Joseph Addison

## 2018 District State Report Card

The Ohio Department of Education (ODE) released the 2018 Ohio School Report Cards for districts and schools in September. The state report card provides the district and community with a snapshot of the progress our students are making in mastering the state academic content standards as well as a comparison to their peers across the state. There are six broad categories that are reported on the state report card including:

- Achievement Component How many students earned a score of proficient or higher on the annual state assessments in English language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies?
- **Gap Closing Component** How well is the district closing the achievement gap in certain groups, based on socio-economic status, ethnicity, and disabilities?
- **Progress Component** How much academic progress did our students make over the course of a school year?
- **Graduation Rate Component** What is the percentage of students who graduate from high school within four or five years of starting high school?
- **Prepared for Success Component** How well are we preparing our high school students for college and/or careers?
- **K-3 Literacy Component** How successful is the district in getting struggling readers back on track by the end of third grade?

Letter grades are assigned to each component as well as subsections in each component area. An "A" reflects that the students exceeded the expectations for the component while a "C" indicates students **have met** the expectations for the component.

# The Northwest 2018 State Report Card reflects the following grades for each component:

- Achievement Component C
- Gap Closing Component A
- Progress Component A
- Graduation Rate Component A
- Prepared for Success Component D
- K-3 Literacy Component C

While the majority of the district component grades indicated our students were meeting the state standards, there are areas that we need to continue to focus on improving. The administrative team and staff members are working to address any areas of concern. A link to the district report card is available on the district website under the academic pull-down menu. ## NHS Alumnus named CSU Softball Coach

**Amy Kyler**, a graduate of Northwest High School class of 1992, has once again distinguished herself in the softball world. The former standout pitcher at Cleveland State University and 2008 CSU Athletics Hall of Fame inductee, Amy has been named the head softball coach at CSU. The top pitcher to come through the Cleveland State program, she still holds many records. She ranks first in school history in career ERA (1.35), shutouts (37), nohitters (6) and WHIP (0.93), while also ranking second in wins (68), innings pitched (728.1), win percentage (.624), strikeouts (909), games started (103) and complete games (92).During her senior



year in 1997, Kyler was named the Midwestern Collegiate Conference Pitcher of the Year after setting CSU single season records for wins (24), ERA (0.56), games started (27), appearances (33), shutouts (15), strikeouts (325) and innings pitched (210.2). The ERA and strikeout marks are still tops in CSU history today. Following her playing days at CSU, she played professional softball with the Carolina Diamonds, the Akron Racers, and the Sacramento Sunbirds. The head coach at Notre Dame OH for the past 11 seasons is now ready to take on a new chapter as CSU head softball coach. We are certainly proud of this alumnus and wish her much success!

## Stinson Students Display Kindness, Respect, and a Growth Mindset

Have you ever asked yourself what makes someone more successful than another? What characteristics or behaviors are they embracing that drives them to succeed?

When working with children, we want success for all. According to researcher, Carol Dweck, how a person approaches a situation significantly influences the outcome. She studied students and how they coped with failure, realizing that some students thrive in the face of adversity while others shut down. She observed that students who embraced challenges and saw failure as an opportunity to grow had better outcomes than students who avoided, made excuses and blamed when they encountered struggles. The name she came up with to describe these behaviors is MINDSET. She identified two separate mindsets: growth or fixed. Those with a fixed mindset believe that a person has a predetermined amount of intelligence, skills, or talents. Those with a growth mindset believe that one's intelligence, skills, and talents can be grown or developed with perseverance, resiliency, and application of appropriate strategies. Growth mindset research suggests that teaching mindset can make a difference, especially for students who struggle in school. Once a person understands they have the power to guide their future through perseverance, practice, hard work, and effort, the sky is the limit for them.

Stinson Elementary has embodied Growth Mindset and combined it with our COUNT ON ME school mantra. We want students to know that we not only count on them to treat others with kindness and respect, but we count on them to grow their mindset.
