A Message from Dennis Lambes, Interim Superintendent

Northwest 2019 District State Report Card

The Ohio Department of Education (ODE) released the 2019 Ohio School Report Cards for districts and schools in September. Report Cards are designed to give parents, communities, educators, and policy makers information about the performance of their school district and schools – to celebrate success and to identify areas for improvement.

Districts and schools are assigned an overall letter grade. The overall grade is calculated using results in six components: Achievement, Progress, Gap Closing, Improving At-Risk K-3 Readers, Graduation Rate, and Prepared for Success.

We are proud of our 2019 Report Card results! We will examine the district report card data and identify those areas in need of improvement. Report Cards are only one part of the story in our district. To get a fuller picture, we encourage

you to visit our schools; talk to educators, parents, and students; and review the school's or district's web page. A lot of great things are happening every day in Northwest schools!

The School District Income Tax Northwest High School **Frequently Ask Questions**

What has the school district done with the money collected from the income tax?

The first issue addressed with the income tax proceeds was to become current with our bills. When the district was placed in Fiscal Caution by the Department of Education, we worked with some vendors to schedule necessary payments over a longer period of time. We were able to do this with some amounts due without incurring any interest charges that may have added to our problem. Recently we have been able to purchase new curriculum and textbooks for our students, purchase chromebook computers for all grades, improve student and staff safety in the district, replace old busses that were beginning to be unreliable, and complete some needed building repairs and renovations.

Why are you asking for more money when students are going hungry because they cannot charge a lunch?

The school district income tax is General Fund revenue, which means the tax collections are used for the operating of the school on a day to day basis. The day to day basis includes paying for utilities, transportation, textbooks and other instructional materials, salaries and benefits, basic building upkeep, technology needs, and other services provided to our students. The cafeteria operations are kept separate in its own fund as established under state law. Revenues from meal sales and federal and state reimbursements for Free/Reduced meals are the only recognized forms of income that we have. All food service costs are paid from these revenues. Per state law the cafeteria fund must have a positive cash balance at the end of the school year or we are in violation of the law.

I thought the school district tax was a temporary tax?

There has never been any consideration of this tax being a temporary tax. When the Independent Finance Committee first proposed a school district tax be placed on the ballot, there was a recommendation that the tax be a permanent tax. When the issue was placed on the ballot, the decision was made for it to be for a five-year period and ask for renewals as time went by. The school district has exercised financial responsibility in all cases to earn your support for its renewal.

Why is the tax still required?

It has been almost ten years since the school district income tax was first passed. In this time our school funding from the state has remained relatively stagnant while our operating costs have risen. The income tax provides a funding base that can change with the economic climate of our community and the students' needs. Without the tax, we would not have been able to stay current with our students' present day requirements and opportunities.




Senior Sunrise

Child Find

In an effort to serve young people with disabilities, Northwest Local is continually in the process of locating and evaluating children from 3 to 21 years of age who are suspected as having a disability. Disabilities may include developmental delays, health impairments, autism, and traumatic brain injury. Individuals may contact the building Principals or Director of Special Services about children suspected as having a disability that may qualify for special education services. Information is available about special education policies and procedures in each building by contacting the building Principal. Northwest has a child identification process that includes the location, identification and evaluation of a child suspected of having a disability within and outside of district buildings. The Department of Special Services coordinates the child identification process. The Northwest evaluation staff uses a variety of community resources and systematic activities in order to identify children requiring special services. Included in this effort is consultation with appropriate representatives of private school students attending private schools located within the boundaries of the Northwest Local District to carry out this process. Northwest ensures that this process for students attending private or religious schools located in the Northwest is comparable to activities undertaken for students with disabilities served in the public school setting.
