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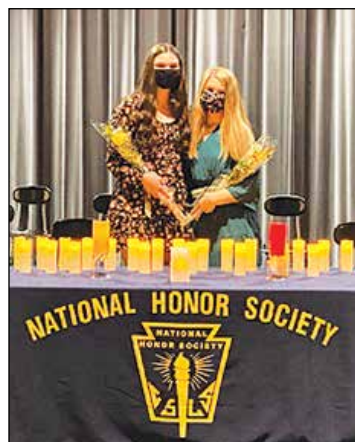
National Honor Society Inducts 29 Members

Third Nine Weeks Learning Option

The district's Responsible Restart plan provides families with the opportunity to choose traditional instruction (in-person five days a week) or an online learning option each grading period. As the district begins to prepare for the next grading period, **we are asking families to notify the district if they plan to make a change to their child(ren)'s learning option for the third grading period.**

Parents who **do not plan to make a change** in their child(ren)'s current learning option **do not need to take any further action.** Your child(ren) will remain in their currently assigned classes/courses for the third nine weeks.

Parents who **plan to make a change** in their child's current learning option will need to complete the **district's third nine-weeks learning option form** by Tuesday, January 5, 2021 at 11:59 p.m. The link to the third nine-weeks learning option form will be available on the district website on Monday, December 14. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact your child's building principal.

Kindergarten Registration

To be eligible for kindergarten in the fall of 2021, your child must be five on or before August 1, 2021.

The **online registration** link will be available **Monday, January 11, 2021 through Friday, April 9, 2021 on the district website.**

A computer station will be available at the Central Office for those individuals who do not have online access in their homes.

The nominee must have been engaged in a volunteer activity that occurred at least partly during the 12 months prior to the date of nomination; be a resident of Carroll or Stark County; 18 and under.

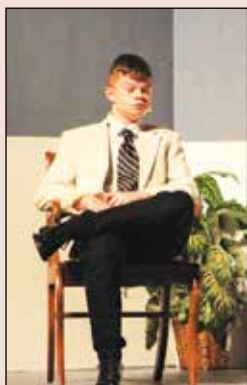
2020 Fall Play

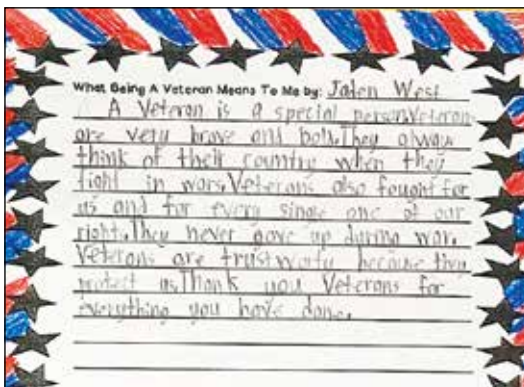
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Veterans Day

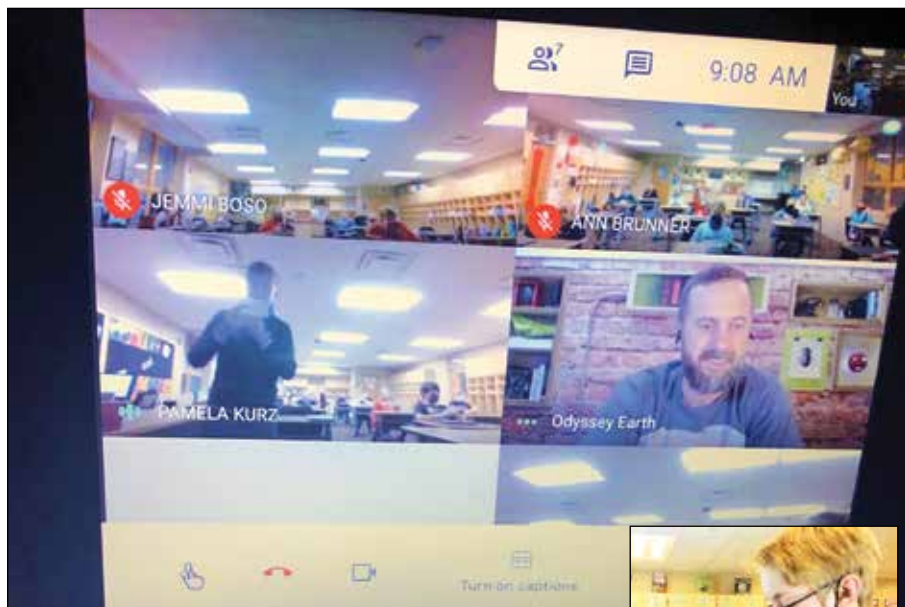

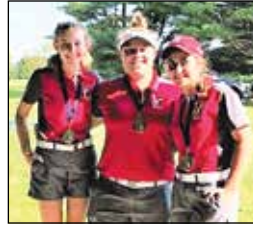


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Girls Golf

Child Find

In an effort to serve young people with disabilities, Northwest Local is continually in the process of locating and evaluating children from 3 to 21 years of age who are suspected as having a disability. Disabilities may include developmental delays, health impairments, autism, and traumatic brain injury. Individuals may contact the building Principals or Director of Special Services about children suspected as having a disability that may qualify for special education services. Information is available about special education policies and procedures in each building by contacting the building Principal. Northwest has a child identification process that includes the location, identification and evaluation of a child suspected of having a disability within and outside of district buildings. The Department of Special Services coordinates the child identification process. The Northwest evaluation staff uses a variety of community resources and systematic activities in order to identify children requiring special services. Included in this effort is consultation with appropriate representatives of private school students attending private schools located within the boundaries of the Northwest Local District to carry out this process. Northwest ensures that this process for students attending private or religious schools located in the Northwest Local District is comparable to activities undertaken for students with disabilities served in the public school setting.
