

- **√** Child's social security number
- √ Parent's Photo ID
- √ Immunization record
- Custody papers (if applicable)


Wrestling

Our State Qualifiers did Northwest proud, scoring enough points as a team for us to beat 45 other schools in State Team Sweepstakes! Mary, Abigail, and Charolette put up impressive performances in the preliminary rounds of competition with all three breaking to the quarter-finals. Mary Paydock went on to finish fifth in her semi-final round making her one of the top 20 Congressional Debaters in the state of Ohio! There were 175 total competitors in the event, and over 1,000 students in competition in all events combined! Kaylee Turley, Freshman, won State Champion honors at the Novice State Tournament held on March 13 with her first-place finish in Program Oral Interpretation.

The team wishes to thank all of the supporters who made this season possible by sacrificing many hours of judging, serving, coordinating, meeting, feeding, supporting, cheering, and coaching. They are integral members of our NHS Speech & Debate family! Without them, COVID competition simply wouldn't have been possible!

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Child Find

In an effort to serve young people with disabilities, Northwest Local is continually in the process of locating and evaluating children from 3 to 21 years of age who are suspected as having a disability. Disabilities may include developmental delays, health impairments, autism, and traumatic brain injury. Individuals may contact the building Principals or Director of Special Services about children suspected as having a disability that may qualify for special education services. Information is available about special education policies and procedures in each building by contacting the building Principal. Northwest has a child identification process that includes the location, identification and evaluation of a child suspected of having a disability within and outside of district buildings. The Department of Special Services coordinates the child identification process. The Northwest evaluation staff uses a variety of community resources and systematic activities in order to identify children requiring special services. Included in this effort is consultation with appropriate representatives of private school students attending private schools located within the boundaries of the Northwest Local District to carry out this process. Northwest ensures that this process for students attending private or religious schools located in the Northwest Local District is comparable to activities undertaken for students with disabilities served in the public school setting.
