Curriculum News

K-5 English Language Arts Curriculum Updates

The district has adopted and will implement new English Language Arts materials in our elementary classrooms. Primary staff members with be implementing the Wit and Wisdom and Geodes materials. Wit and Wisdom materials focus on using authentic literature and art to build knowledge, vocabulary, reading, and writing skills. Geodes is a companion to Fundations and students will use their decoding skills while building their reading fluency skills. Stinson staff members will be implementing the Wonders (2020) reading series. Wonders uses a rich range of print materials and resources to support building a strong reading foundation, accessing complex texts, finding and using text evidence, and engaging in collaborative conversations and writing opportunities.

Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS)

PBIS is an evidence-based three-tiered framework focused on addressing student behavior to improve social and academic outcomes. Each building PBIS team has developed behavioral expectations and curriculum to support their building framework and expectations. During the first few weeks of school, students and families will learn about the PBIS program. The long-term goal of the PBIS initiative is to improve student academic performance, foster social and emotional competence, reduce negative behaviors, and decrease the incidence of student-report drug/alcohol abuse and office discipline referrals and suspensions. The PBIS framework emphasizes prosocial skills and expectations by teaching and acknowledging appropriate student behavior. We are excited to implement PBIS in all of our school buildings to ensure we are meeting the academic and social-emotional needs of our students.




Transportation News

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Kevin Peck Memorial 5K: The Annual Tradition of Remembrance Returns!

Morning drizzle didn't dampen the spirits of runners and walkers on Saturday, July 24 at Heritage Park. One hundred fifty-six participants laced up their sneakers to honor Kevin Peck, support the Perseverance Scholarship fund, and achieve their personal fitness goals.

The Kevin Peck Memorial 5K was established in honor of Kevin Peck, a 1998 graduate of Northwest High School who was tragically killed in December 2011. Kevin was a state qualifying track and cross country runner. His untimely death was a tragedy to all who knew him. In his memory, the Kevin Peck Perseverance Award Scholarship was created. Kevin often lamented that the hardest step of running was the first. He held the belief that hard work would pay off, and once he got going, eventually he would reach his goal if he kept at it. It is with this in mind that this award is presented, to serve as a first step.

On behalf of the friends and family of Kevin Peck, proceeds from the event benefit the Kevin Peck Perseverance Award Scholarship and the Northwest Local Schools Track and Cross Country Teams.



Meal Charging Policy

The goal of the Northwest Local Schools Food and Nutrition Department is first and foremost to provide healthy and nutritious meals to our students so they can better function and learn at school. However, there are guidelines in place that must be followed. Therefore, the following policy has been implemented.

Our policy will be as follows at any level:

- Students will not be allowed to charge ala carte items.
- Students must have cash or sufficient account balance to make a purchase.
- Students whose account balance falls below \$5.00 will be verbally notified of their balance at the cash register.
- This same procedure applies to adults.

To make this a success for both home and school, we offer and online program called, "PayForIt" that allows parents/guardians to deposit money into their child's account (at www.northwest. sparcc.org then click on Parent Tab then "PayForIt") that can be managed from home, allowing the parent to check lunch balances. You will need your student's 10 digit student ID number to access the information. This can be obtained through the school's secretary or the cafeteria. You may also send cash or check with your child/ student to school to be deposited into their lunch account. One check can be written for all students in the same family. Please list in the memo section, the students name and how much money you would like placed in each account.

The school lunch program also offers free and reduced lunches for those families whose income meets the criteria. Parents/Guardians may apply online at www.northwest.sparcc.org under the Parent Tab. Forms must be completed each school year to qualify. Only one application per family unit needs to be completed. Forms can also be completed any time during the school year should a situation arise where you may need assistance. We also have applications available at the school offices. It is best to fill these forms out, as soon as possible, to make it a smooth transition for your child/student.

We realize there are of course those times when students or parents/ guardians forget lunch money. In this case, we will allow students a onetime charge that day with the intention the charge must be paid the following day. The parent/guardian will be contacted by the school to discuss what options are available in order to eliminate the balance due and enable the student to be able to obtain a lunch in the cafeteria. If a satisfactory resolution is not obtained after these efforts, a letter, this charge policy, and an application for Free and Reduced lunch will be sent home.

Thank you for participating in the Northwest Local School lunch program.

PUBLIC RELEASE

Northwest Local School District announced its 2021-2022 program year policy for free and reduced-price meals or free milk for students unable to pay the full price of meals or milk served under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast, After School Care Snack or Special Milk Program. Each school office and the central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines will be used for determining eligibility. Children from families whose annual income is at or below the Federal Guidelines are eligible for free and reduced-price meals, free milk if the school participates in the Special Milk Program, and to have school fees waived.

Application forms are being distributed to all homes in a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free and reduced-price benefits, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. A complete application is required. Households which currently receive Special Nutrition Assistance Program Benefits (SNAP, formally known as food stamps) or Ohio Works First (OWF) funds for a child must provide the child's name, the SNAP or OWF case number and signature of an adult household member on the application. Households which do not receive SNAP or OWF funds must provide the names of all household members, the last four digits of the Social Security Number of the adult signing the application or state "none" if the adult does not have a Social Security Number, the amount and source of income received by each household member. If any of this information is missing, the school cannot process the application.

FREE HEALTH CARE:

Families with children eligible for school meals may be eligible for FREE health care coverage through Medicaid and/or Ohio's Healthy Start & Healthy Families programs. These programs include coverage for doctor visits, immunizations, physicals, prescriptions, dental, vision, mental health, substance abuse and more. Please call 1-800-324-8680 for more information or to request an application. Information can also be found on the web at http://jfs.ohio.gov/ohp/consumers/familychild.stm. Anyone who has an Ohio Medicaid card is already receiving these services.

The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program official. To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished is true and correct. Applications are being made in connection with the receipt of federal funds. Schools or other officials may check the information on the application at any time during the school year. Deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable state and federal laws. Foster children are categorically eligible for free meal benefits regardless of the household's income. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals or milk for them, contact the school for more information.

Under the provision of the policy, Dan Levengood, Treasurer, will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian disagrees with the decision on the application or the result of verification, the decision may be discussed with the determining official on an informal basis. If a formal appeal is desired, the household has the right to a fair hearing. A fair hearing can be requested either orally or in writing: Shawn Braman, Superintendent, 2309 Locust St. S, Canal Fulton, Ohio 44614 330.854.2291. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Households may apply for benefits any time during the school year. If a household is not currently eligible and if the household size increases or income decreases because of unemployment or other reasons, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for free or reduced-price benefits if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In accordance with Federal civil rights law and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) civil rights regulations and policies, the USDA, its Agencies, offices, and employees, and institutions participating in or administering USDA programs are prohibited from discriminating based on race, color, national origin, sex, disability, age, or reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity in any program or activity conducted or funded by USDA.

Persons with disabilities who require alternative means of communication for program information (e.g. Braille, large print, audiotape, American Sign Language, etc.), should contact the Agency (State or local) where they applied for benefits. Individuals who are deaf, hard of hearing or have speech disabilities may contact USDA through the Federal Relay Service at (800) 877-8339. Additionally, program information may be made available in languages other than English.

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From the High School Principal's Desk

Allow me first to congratulate our recent graduates from the Class of 2021. These high school years go by so quickly and parents, more often than not, are left asking, "Where did the last four years go?" Freshmen First

We are excited to announce that on Tuesday, August 17, only freshmen will be attending at the high school. Sophomores, juniors, and seniors will begin on Wednesday, August 18. This day, dedicated to our incoming ninth-graders, will allow them to get the "high school experience" a day prior to the official kickoff. Freshmen First, from a time perspective, will look identical to a normal school day. It will begin at 7:25 AM and end at 2:20 PM. Lunch will be offered for purchase, or the students may elect to bring their lunch. Buses will pick up and drop off as a typical school day.

The students will participate in various activities throughout the day as well as learn the policies and procedures at the high school. They will walk their schedule, have the opportunity to meet their teachers for an abbreviated amount of time, and be made aware of the expectations at their new school.

We are hard at work preparing for this special day and look forward to welcoming our new students to Northwest High School.

Attention Parents of Seventh-Graders!

A reminder to all parents of students entering seventh-grade this school year: The State of Ohio requires seventh grade students to be updated on shots. Students must receive vaccinations, and records must be shared with the middle school office prior to October 8. Students may be excluded from school after that date if no records have been received. Please schedule shots with your child's doctor at your earliest convenience.

K-5 Phase-In Days are Back!

Phase-in days were implemented last year for K-5 students due to COVID, but we discovered how beneficial these were for our young students. The days were very successful in getting the students comfortable and acclimated to the building. The limited number of students for their first day of school eased the students' nerves, and they got to know their teachers and building right away. With many children returning from online learning, we feel it is important that we have phase-in days once again to assist our students with their return. Therefore, the class lists will be divided in half, with one half attending on August 17 and the second half attending on August 18. All students will return together on August 19. On August 17 and 18, the school staff will greet the children when they arrive, and direct them to the gym (third and fourth) and to the cafeteria (fifth) where their homeroom teachers will be waiting for them.

The exact day your child will attend will be listed on the class lists which will be posted August 6 on Stinson's main doors. We look forward to a positive, meaningful, and exciting start to the 2021-2022 school year!

Third Grade Orientation

Before the last school year ended, the second grade students had the opportunity to spend the day at Stinson Elementary getting to know the teachers, touring the building, and growing their excitement for their transition from the Primary to Stinson. The Stinson staff likes to do everything they can to ease any anxiety the children may feel before coming up to their new school.

During the visit, the children had the opportunity to meet their special teachers for next year and participate in mini-lessons in PE, Music, and Art. They spent some time with the school counselor, the principal, and played games in the computer lab. They toured all parts of the building and spent a few minutes on the exciting and adventurous playground! The goal of orientation is to provide a level of comfort when they return to school and get the children excited to attend Stinson Elementary!

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Child Find

In an effort to serve young people with disabilities, Northwest Local is continually in the process of locating and evaluating children from 3 to 21 years of age who are suspected as having a disability. Disabilities may include developmental delays, health impairments, autism, and traumatic brain injury. Individuals may contact the building Principals or Director of Special Services about children suspected as having a disability that may qualify for special education services. Information is available about special education policies and procedures in each building by contacting the building Principal. Northwest has a child identification process that includes the location, identification and evaluation of a child suspected of having a disability within and outside of district buildings. The Department of Special Services coordinates the child identification process. The Northwest evaluation staff uses a variety of community resources and systematic activities in order to identify children requiring special services. Included in this effort is consultation with appropriate representatives of private school students attending private schools located within the boundaries of the Northwest Local District to carry out this process. Northwest ensures that this process for students attending private or religious schools located in the Northwest Local District is comparable to activities undertaken for students with disabilities served in the public school setting.
