

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#### 2021-22 NHS Speech & Debate Year in Review

Northwest High School's Speech & Debate team is preparing to close out its second full season. In the third year since its inception, the team continues to celebrate a multitude of firsts. Under the leadership of head coach Mr. Rick Woods and assistant coaches Ms. Lori Brown and Mr. Stephen Imler, the team has 22 active members who, combined, competed in more than 20 tournaments this season. Competing in the most competitive region in the State of Ohio, the team won accolades week after week with consistent top novice honors, top 10 performances, and steady improvement from every team member.

On February 8, Team Captain Mary Paydock became the first National Speech and Debate Association Academic All American in school history. She joins the ranks of Interscholastic Speech & Debate elite with less than 1% of all competitors receiving this high honor!

On March 4-5, we sent six Northwest competitors to the State Tournament: Mary Paydock Semi-Finalist, Abigail Meighen – Quarter-Finalist, Carson Fox – Quarter-Finalist, Abbie Thomas, Paige Owsiany, and Jacob Coleman.


# Kindergarten Registration

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# Kindness Week and Service


#### **Kindness Week**

Schools across the district recognized Kindness Week February 14-17. Each day students dressed in kindness-related themes: Let Kindness be your Superpower (superhero day), Kindness Makes Everything Shine (neon day), Kindness ties us together (tie dye day), and Dreaming of a Kind World (pajama day). To spread kindness in the building, students wrote notes of cheer and encouragement to their peers and the staff and sent "Valenkinds" on Valentine's day. Special bulletin boards and artwork adorned hallways, while teachers held Kindness Challenges in their classrooms, recognizing and awarding students "caught being kind." To spread kindness to our furry friends in need, each building raised funds and supplies for One of a Kind Pet Rescue.







































### ENTER TO LEARN LEAVE TO SERVE

Former principal Steve Jones purchased the sign that students see every day when they enter and leave the building: "Enter to Learn, Leave to Serve." It is a daily reminder that kindness is not simply a "theme week," but a civic responsibility. Teachers and staff aim to instill an "attitude of gratitude," stressing the value of students sharing their time, talents, and resources. Even our youngest students learn the joys of service. Northwest Primary students make Christmas cards for nursing homes, donate canned foods and toiletries for our local Community Outreach, participate in Veterans Day recognitions, and collect items to benefit One of a Kind Pet Rescue. A favorite fundraiser for students is bringing in change for Kiss the Pig. This money is given back to the community in several ways, including Bountiful Gifts, the Wounded Warrior Project, and Akron Children's Hospital.

Stinson Elementary volunteers annually to be Change Makers for "Have a Heart, Do Your Part" benefiting Akron Children's Hospital. Stinson students have been raising money for this worthy cause for the past 15 years. This year's art classes also found a creative way to give back. Students made over 300 artwork placemats for patient trays at Aultman Hospital to brighten patients' days during the winter holiday season. Stinson students also contribute to food drives, toiletry drives, and supply drives yearly.

This year, the students of Northwest Middle School collected an abundance of items for the Care Closet. Their collection was so successful, they were able to donate items to each building in the district to benefit students in need. They also collect money and supplies for One of a Kind Pet Rescue and hold food drives annually. This year, several students made and delivered holiday cards to area nursing homes.

Northwest High School students are also perpetually serving. Members of Student Council, National Honor Society, and Interact Club serve the students and staff at school as well as the community at large. Members of Interact Club write notes of encouragement and offer tokens of appreciation to high school staff members to brighten their day. In the community, they volunteer at the Senior Center, including serving monthly at the Swiss Steak dinners. They recently donated 40 hand-made dog toys to One of a Kind Pet Rescue in partnership with the Social Justice and Leadership Committees. Speech and Debate also recently donated two vacuums to this worthy cause. Interact Club is also partnering with Spanish teacher, Megan Brady, and her family to make blankets for Refuge of Hope Homeless Ministry. The group hopes to supply enough blankets for the needs of the 40 men currently sheltered there. Interact is also planning a towel drive for Refuge of Hope. They will be collecting new or gently used towels and hygiene products for the shelter. The club members previously built and planted garden boxes at Refuge of Hope, and they will return in the spring to plant new vegetable gardens. Interact also aims to help on a global scale. The club is spearheading an initiative to inform and educate the Northwest community about Human Trafficking. They are designing bracelets to raise funds for Safe Harbor, show support, and spread awareness about this global crisis. National Honor Society members also serve the school and their community. During the holiday season, they wrapped gifts at SPJ, delivered candy canes, and initiated a Letter to Santa program. They head the recycling program at the high school, serve as teachers' aids and peer tutors, and they will be reading to students at the Primary soon! As part of the Adopt-a-Trail program with Stark Parks, NHS has adopted 2 miles of the Towpath Trail. They collect trash and check general maintenance of the trail four times per year. Student Council members organize four annual blood drives; this year's last drive will be held April 27th. They have donated much-needed blood and have reached their goal of six \$500 scholarships for Northwest students, with possibly two more on the way! They also organize SWORD (Senior Work Outreach Day), a tradition that marks the end of their senior year and is a final reminder that seniors truly are leaving the high school to serve.

We are so proud of our students who serve others in countless ways. The aforementioned activities are merely a sampling of their many acts of kindness, generosity, and service.



















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


#### **Academic Challenge**



The *Northwest Girls Basketball Team* made Northwest proud as "3-peat" **PAC** 7 **Champions** under the leadership of Coach Kevin Lower: "We had a great group of student-athletes this past season. It was a pleasure coaching these ladies. They have left a lasting legacy for the Northwest Basketball Program." The team finished their season with a 24-3 record, the most wins in a season, including a 14-game winning streak! They were District Champions, only the fifth time in school history. **Gianna Kuhn** set school record for most assists in a season, and **Lily Bottomley** set the school record for most points in a season. **Coach Kevin Lower** was awarded PAC 7 Coach of the Year and NE Inland Coach of the Year. **Lily Bottomley** was selected as PAC 7 Player of the Year and NE Inland District Player of the Year. **Ashley Cudnik** earned 1st team honors, and **Carly Spradling**, and **Gianna Kuhn** received Honorable Mention.

The *Northwest Boys Varsity Basketball Team* finished their season with an overall record of 11-12 and a record of 9-3 in the league, earning **2nd place** in the PAC. Alex Goddard earned 1st team All-League honors and Ray Stokes earned Honorable Mention in District 4 Awards. In the PAC 7, Alex Goddard and Ray Stokes earned First Team honors, Chase Badger earned Honorable Mention, and Coach Mike Lower was named Coach of the Year. Congratulations!

The *Freshman Boys Basketball Team* were **PAC 7 Champions**, finishing with a record of 10-3. The team won their final 6 games to defeat Orrville 63-47 in the finals to become "back to back" PAC 7 Champions. Congratulations to our freshmen athletes coached by Dave Cooper: "I am proud of the effort and sacrifice this group made to rally around



each other at the end of the season. Each game we had someone willing to step up and lead the team on both ends of the floor. They placed the team above themselves and finished the season strong to achieve their goal."

The team went back to work, and up next was a split with Division I Massillon and Copley, followed by a sweep of New Philadelphia and Mogador. That lead to a 3-2 weekend at Woodridge to finish 6th at their tournament. The team competed at Marlington and went 2-2 in duals. The team finished 7th out of 16 teams in the Green Tournament. Many wrestlers placed in this tournament, including Bradyn Wolfe, Owen Gonzales, Ben Schilling, Cody Workinger, Brad Garber, and Cody Logan. The success at Green set the Indians up for more success at Cuyahoga Falls where they went 3-0. Senior night at Northwest was a success but costly. The Indians split with close loss to Norton and a win against Doylestown. The Indians lost several athletes to injury for the remainder of the season. The Indians finished 2-6 in their remaining duals to finish the season with a 14-13 dual meet record. The Indians finished 5th at the PAC-7 tournament lead by Bradyn Wolfe's 1st place finish. Wolfe finished 4th in the league's wrestler of the year voting. Northwest hosted sectionals and finished 9th with 6 placers: Bradyn Wolfe, 2nd, Cody Workinger, 3rd, Josh Faris and Ben Schilling, 4th, and Mason Gonzales and Owen Gonzales, 6th. Bradyn Wolfe, Josh Faris, Mason Gonzales, and Ben **Schilling** were named to the Pac-7 All- Conference Team.




#### **Family Science Night**
