# From the **Superintendent**

It has been a pleasure to see our students return to school excited and anxious for a new year! I want to thank our faculty, staff and the parents and students for everything they have done to help

us to hit the ground running toward another successful year.

We enrolled many new students again this summer, and we would like to welcome these families to our community. In total, we enrolled just over 200 new students this summer! Our overall enrollment increased about 20 students and we currently have about 3,000 students in our district.

Congratulations to the faculty, staff and students for earning the highest rating from the Ohio Department of Education (ODE)! The state report cards were released earlier in the school year and the Aurora City Schools was one of 28 districts (out of over 600) to earn the overall grade of "A". More details on our report card can be found on the ODE website. Our test data is outstanding again this year. Our students continued to achieve at the highest level in the state. Our overall district "GPA" score ranked us 9th in the state out of the 611 public school districts in Ohio. Aurora's high ranking statewide is the result of our district-wide alignment to classroom best practices and a rigorous curriculum. Our

2017-18 School Report Cards



The Ohio Department of Education has released the district report cards for the 2017-18 school year. As has been the case in the past, we are very proud of the academic accomplishments of our students. This year the district report card includes an overall grade. The Aurora City School District is proud to have earned the distinction of receiving an "A" grade for the overall mark. We learned that we were one of only 28 districts out of 611 in Ohio to earn this distinction. Congratulations to the Board of Education, administration, faculty, staff and especially the students for this level of success! The outstanding scores on these assessments help confirm that our students and staff are doing an incredible job!

That being said, the state report card results are just one set of data that we use to measure our students' learning.

As has been mentioned in the past, we also look at our ACT & SAT scores, our Advanced Placement scores, other district assessment data, as well as many qualitative measures that are important to student success. We feature many of the opportunities for learning and growth that are not reflected in these tests in our Quality Profile.

The report card grades for each area require some insight and reflection. We will spend time over the next few weeks celebrating our successes and reflecting on our challenges. On the achievement side our scores still rank us in the top 3-5% in the state despite the fact that we earned a "B" as an overall mark. Only six districts in the entire state earned an "A" on this measure. We are very happy with our Progress (Value Added) and Gap Closing scores. These scores demonstrate improvement for each of the measured sub-groups and that we are working to close, or even eliminate, gaps between these cohorts. It is gratifying to see the hard work that has been done by the administration and staff help close these gaps in achievement.

## **AHS SAFE DECISIONS WEEK 2018**

Students at Aurora High School experienced a week of



interactive activities focusing on the use of drugs, drinking and driving, and distracted driving. State Farm Insurance Agent Sean Devins and Don Qualters of Balanced Asset Management partnered together to create Safe Decisions Week which was held September 10-14, 2018.

AHS Principal Paul Milcetich explained that Sean Devins contacted him last spring about his ideas to create a program regarding safety for Aurora students. Milcetich said, "Obviously being in the schools we are always interested in partnering with our community, with our parents, to try to bring impactful programs to make a difference for our kids learning environment. We wanted to make it about helping students think

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about their decisions in a way that would keep them safe whether that's drugs, or alcohol, or driving a vehicle in a distracted manner." Milcetich added, "We really wanted to have a positive, proactive and interactive approach to the entire thing." Devins said, "It started out small and then it got big and it turned out to be awesome." Qualters said he loved the idea when approached by Devins. "What I love about this program when Sean and I first started talking about it was that it wasn't reactive to any event that happened or something that happened somewhere else in the country, we just said let's be proactive with the kids and let's encourage them to make safe decisions."

Students were involved with numerous activities during the week that included

a simulated impaired driving experience, a table maze game where students wore goggles



to impair their vision in a manner that mimics marijuana use, and a distracted driving simulator that allowed students to feel what it was like to drive a vehicle while distracted. Students also were treated to prize giveaways all week long and a crash vehicle on site as a safety reminder. The week also included booths with safety information available and the kick-off





to the new AHS Drug Free Club.

As a part of the outreach program, several speakers were also featured at both AHS and Harmon Middle School. The speakers included Rose DeRoia, a local mother who lost her son Tommy in 2016 to a drug overdose and Katelin Franklin of

Impact Teen Driver Speaker who flew in from California to present, "What Do You Consider Lethal?" to students. Franklin's son died as a result of distracted driving and shared her message and talked to Harmon School students about making responsible decisions.

The week culminated in a "Grey-Out" for safety on Friday. Students were encouraged to wear their Grey Out Safe Decisions spirit wear or wear grey clothing and attend the Grey Out Greenmen home football game against Tallmadge. Coaches were given special grey shirts and Devins and Qualters donated the specially designed grey football uniforms with Safe Decisioins Week patches to the players. Devins said that along with the speaker presentations, "The football game was my highlight of the week, to see the community come together."

This program has had even a broader impact after the week ended. Devins explained that through social media, "Word got out around Cleveland, word got out around Ohio and we are proud to say that we kind of created this thing, the school district, Don and I. It has now traveled to several states and we got the attention of the Governor's Office recently." Both Devins and Qualters hope to continue the program at AHS in the future



The Aurora City Schools' Special Services staff provides support to approximately 10% of the student population. This includes students with special education needs (9.4%) and students with Limited English Proficient needs (.7%). In addition to the special education support, the special services staff provides gifted instruction/support as well as gifted assessment opportunities for the Aurora City Schools' student population.

Maglionico's educational background includes a Bachelor of Arts and Science degree from Cleveland State University and a Masters in Educational Leadership degree from Kent State University. He also has a license to teach individuals with disabilities and holds both a Principal's License and a Superintendent's License.

Maglionico, who has experience as a special education teacher in the Ravenna Schools, also has a background as the special education supervisor at the Geauga County ESC and as a principal and director of pupil services at Crestwood Schools in Mantua, Ohio.

Aurora School Board President, Gerald Kohanski, said of the new hire, "Aurora's Special Education Department provides critical intervention services to a growing number of students. The school district is fortunate to be able to hire an excellent, skilled, and very experienced professional educator like Mike Maglionico to lead this important function."

## NEWLY CREATED AHS DRUG FREE CLUB

Aurora High School has announced the creation of a new Drug Free Club that began at the start of the 2018-19 school year. The purpose of this new club is to cultivate a healthy lifestyle for students. The club is run as an opt-in program where students and parents opt-in by signing a permission slip for random drug testing.

The objective of the club is to offer students a way of diffusing awkward situations with their peers. This would allow them to avoid peer pressure by using the drug club as a scapegoat. The program is designed to be non-punitive and any student that does test positive during a random drug test will not face any penalties from school district administration.

The drug testing will be done by Great Lakes Biomedical and is 100% confidential. Upon completion of the testing, the Medical Review Officer will finalize the results and will notify the parent/guardian of any positive testing result. Results will not be released to any other party without written consent of the parent/guardian. If a positive test result occurs, the parent/guardian may request counseling or follow up testing within the program. In order to be considered a member of the club in good standing, students must have clean results. Otherwise, they cannot be certified as "drug free."

Research has shown that preventing drug abuse can benefit communities both non-monetarily and monetarily. For every dollar spent on drug abuse prevention, communities can save between \$4.00 - \$5.00 in costs for drug abuse treatment and counseling.

AHS Principal, Paul Milcetich, explained that, "There will be multiple incentives and benefits throughout the school year for club members in good standing. The biggest prize is eligibility for a drawing in May where one lucky AHS student

# PE COLLABORATION WITH JAPANESE SCHOLARS

Craddock School Physical Education Instructor Gretchen Jessel has been working with Dr. Takahiro Sato, an Associate Professor at Kent State University in the School of Teaching, Learning & Curriculum Studies for the last five years. Sato has been traveling from the U.S. to Japan helping to create a global collaborative program between the two countries. Sato has helped to establish global physical education (PE) cross cultural studies with teachers in America in a study called "Jugyokenkyu". This allows professionalization for teachers by studying video, lesson plans and discussing the lesson process. Jessel explained, "Through him I share teacher education and teaching information with his colleagues in Japan about how physical education is taught in the U.S. and more specifically how I teach here at Craddock School."

In September, three visitor representatives from the Ministry of Education in Japan met with Jessel to observe and ask questions as she demonstrated curriculum and discussed the similarities and differences between the two countries. Visitors included, Dr. Miki Seida, Director of the Higashi Hiroshima School District; Dr. Satoshi Yoshino, currently at The Ohio State University as an Associate Professor who teaches and studies American education specifically in sports, physical activity and physical education and Dr. Yutaka Sato who is the Director of Teacher Training, Department of Sport Education of Culture and Sport Policy at the Toin University of Yokohama.

Jessel further explained, "I have also helped Dr. Sato with another Japanese Professor, Dr. Naoki Suzuki, who received a grant for studying elementary PE class handout materials for children in Japan, South Korea, China, and the U.S. I am one of Suzuki's American teachers whom he can gather information about PE in the U.S. and Ohio."



# VETERANS STADIUM TRACK AND TURF REPLACEMENT



The Aurora High School's Veterans Stadium 2018 summer football field replacement construction project was completed in time for the fall sports season. According to Superintendent Pat Ciccantelli, "The new facility is beautiful and the new surfaces provide a safe place for our athletes to compete. This project was completed within budget and was available for use by our sports teams for the fall sports season."

Both the high school track and field were replaced due to wear that was beginning to make the surfaces unsafe for student athletes to continue to use without a safety risk. The decision was then made to replace them. Construction company bids were considered and the project was awarded to Astro Turf. The total projected cost for the project was \$503,500. This was an overall savings of approximately \$100,000 over the next closest bid for the project. Ciccantelli said, "We received an excellent product and a great installation and I'm very happy with the end result." The track was 16 years old and the field was last replaced in 2008. The life expectancy on a running track is 15 years and typically 10 years for a turf football field.

Athletic Directory/Facilities Manager, Paul Powers, stated, "This was a project that was very important to have completed for the safety of our athletes. The condition of both the track and field had deteriorated over the years, as they do, and the summer months were the perfect time to complete the renovations. Our athletes have come back to facilities that are safe and the quality will allow them to compete at the highest level."


