It's hard to believe we have completed the first quarter of school and the colder weather is setting in! It has been a great start to the school year with much to celebrate. I want to

thank our faculty, staff, the parents and students for everything they have done to help us to hit the ground running toward another successful year.

We began the school year with the excitement of experiencing a Solar Eclipse. Last month we held our annual Homecoming celebrations concluding with the Homecoming Dance that was attended by nearly 800 of our students. As a part of our Homecoming weekend we induct members into our three Hall of Fames. AHS RANKED #1 IN NORTHEAST OHIO/#6 IN STATE OF OHIO

This year, *U.S. News and World Report* magazine analyzed over 22,000 public high schools in all 50 states and the District of Columbia and then ranked the highest-scoring public high schools in the nation. Aurora High School was ranked by the publication at **#1** in Northeast Ohio, **#6** in the State of Ohio, and at **#202** in the nation for 2017.

The high schools were awarded gold, silver, or bronze medals based on state proficiency standards, college readiness, and teacher/student ratios. The Aurora High School rankings earned the school the distinction of being designated a Gold Medal winner which indicates



the greatest level of college

readiness. There were a total of only 19 schools in Ohio that achieved the Gold Medal recognition.

Aurora School Board President Gerald Kohanski said, "Aurora has the best high school in Northeast Ohio, is ranked the sixth best of over 600 high schools in Ohio (top 1%) and has the lowest real estate tax rate of any of the fourteen excellent districts ranked below us in performance by U.S. News & World Report. The value proposition to the community is obvious."

As an added accolade,Aurora High School has also been named #16 in the State of Ohio in *The Washington Post's* Most Challenging High Schools 2017



annual ranking. Aurora High School's national ranking has also moved up from to #548 from # 572 in the 2016 report.

position with the Board on August 16, 2017. After a careful applicant review and interview process was completed, the Board selected Miriam Conner to fill the seat previously held by Annie Grohe until the expiration of the current term. If Conner desires to continue serving on the Board, she must run in the November 2019 general election.

Conner, who has a background and experience in the Field of Education, is an Aurora resident and an Aurora High School alumni. She went on to earn a B.A. in Youth Leadership from Judson College, in Elgin, IL and an M.Ed in Curriculum and Instruction from Ashland University, in Ashland, OH. She is currently an adjunct professor at Hiram University in Hiram, OH and is the host for the Northeast Obio Parenting Magazine's podcast. She has also been very active as a volunteer in the Aurora City School District holding many leadership positions, several of which have included Elementary PTO Secretary and Coordinator for the Aurora Reads program.

Aurora School Board President Gerald Kohanski said, "The Board of Education selected Ms. Conner from a group of very well qualified candidates. Her extensive background and training in the Education profession were major determining factors in naming her to succeed Annie Grohe. We believe she will add a needed dimension to the Board in relating to certified staff concerns and will also be a resource in future contract negotiations. Her passion and dedication to education and for children were very evident in the interview process."

Connor said of her new Aurora School Board position, "I am excited and honored to become a member of the school board. I love the Aurora City

JANATOVICH BEGINS YEAR AS NEW LEIGHTON SCHOOL PRINCIPAL



As many may have noticed, Leighton Elementary School has a new principal in town. Mike Janatovich, who was previously the assistant principal at Harmon Middle

School, has replaced Paul Goodwin as the principal at Leighton School.

Goodwin, who has returned to his assistant principal position at Harmon Middle School for the 2017-18 school year, explained over the summer that, "One of my new responsibilities is to help him [Janatovich] transition to the new position. He is an excellent educator and is eagerly looking forward to this new opportunity. It is a great move for Leighton and for the district."

Goodwin also said, "From my point of view, it has been both a privilege and an honor to serve this building and its students – to serve and work with the families that have entrusted their children to us. Working with this staff has been my pleasure. I have learned much from them and they have consistently taken wonderful care of me. Leaving is never easy – this is my fourth move in the district in my twelve years of being here. In leaving, important friendships and memories become part of you. What an opportunity it has been!"

Janatovich began his career as an 8th

grade Social Studies teacher in the Parma School District, moved on to the Cuyahoga Heights School District where he taught Science and Social Studies for nine years. After receiving his administrative license he then became the district's assistant principal and athletic director for grades 6-12.

Janatovich explained that, "When I saw that Harmon Middle School had an opportunity to truly be an instructional leader and work with kids on a daily basis, I knew that really was where I wanted to be. So I came to Aurora and I've had three great years as assistant principal at Harmon Middle School and I've grown a lot there in that time. I had an opportunity to come to Leighton and I'm truly excited for this opportunity as well."

In regard to his three years spent at Harmon, Janatovich said, "I think one of the best things about Harmon was that Principal Mark Abramovich was a great mentor in that he didn't want to just divide it into just principal and assistant principal roles. Some middle schools traditionally say 'you be in charge of discipline' and that's your responsibility. We really collaborated on a lot of different things. I had a lot of opportunity to work with kids and an opportunity to work with teachers."

As far as his leadership style, Janatovich said, "Mr. J is a big kid. My wife always says I'm great at teaching kids because I'm a big kid myself. I'm really passionate about education. A lot of the things I do in my free time are reading educational books. But I also like to really get to know the kids. That's my whole focus as an educator and as principal. I'm not going to be somebody sitting behind the desk and just standing around the hallways. I'm going to be engrossed in the culture of the building. I want to get to know what the kids are doing. I want to know what their interested in. You'll probably find me on the playground playing basketball...just having a good time with them so they know who I am as a person. So they can feel comfortable coming to me and they can feel safe if they have questions or they need something. They have that support system. I think building that culture with myself and the kids will really allow Leighton to become that place where they know it's a great place and they know they are going to learn and we're going to have fun doing it. It's just going to be something that's exciting for all of us."

Regarding his first few months on the new job, Janatovich explained, "The transition to Leighton has been a great one. Quickly, I have been able to see how awesome the kids here are on a daily basis. Their energy and excitement for learning is amazing and fun to be a part of. Each day brings something new, which is a rewarding challenge to be a part of." He added, "My biggest

AHS GREEN/WHITE FLEX BLOCK SCHEDULE PILOT PROGRAM



Aurora High School (AHS) has been piloting a new Green/White Block Flex Time class period this fall. Administrators are testing this different

schedule, which involves reducing every student's eight class periods by 7 minutes each to allow for a 45-minute class period during the day to be used at the student's discretion. This change allows for a "Green Block" on Tuesday mornings and a "White Block" on Thursday afternoons.

During this flex time period students use an app created by the technology department to sign in and out of classrooms and locations throughout the building where attendance is always

We also have a new principal in the district. Mike Janatovich moved from his role as assistant principal at Harmon to his new role at Leighton Elementary. We are excited to have such an outstanding administrator to take over the reins from Paul Goodwin.

The report card from the Ohio Department of Education was released in September. Our students achieved at some of the highest levels in the state! You can see the details on the Ohio Department of Education website. Our high school students also achieved at record levels this past year on the ACT and the Advanced Placement (AP) tests. Our mean composite score for the ACT this past year was a remarkable 25.1; the highest mark in school history! On the AP tests, we had an 85% passing rate on over 900 total tests. The national average for passing on these difficult tests is 60%. Congratulations to our students and staff! The Ohio School Boards Association also recognized Aurora High School for earning the "Momentum Award." In order to earn this award the

Some of the options for students during this time period include, but are not limited to, collaborating with peers, making up assessments, organizing a student program, participating in a club or activity, attending a guest lecturer or speaker, working with a teacher, or pursuing learning in an area they have interest.

AHS Principal Paul Milcetich explained, "The goal of this schedule is to move in a direction where students are beginning to understand the way in which they learn and begin to take ownership.We realize the level of participation of our students and the restriction of our current schedule, so we have committed to a trial of this schedule until Thanksgiving to see how the time is utilized. We then plan to collect data on its effectiveness. The

school must earn straight A's on all of the value added measures! Speaking of strong academic accomplishments; we have one National Merit Semi-Finalist (Maddie Brandes) and one National Merit Commended student (Justin Voyzey) this year to represent AHS. Congratulations to both.

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Our students continue to shine in our extracurricular activities. Our Boys' Soccer team has had a great season winning the Suburban League title and an OHSAA Regional Championship as well. They played in the state semi-finals against Bay Village High School, but lost with a score of 2-1. The team had an outstanding season! Our football team earned a 13th consecutive trip to the playoffs. They finished strong winning six of their final seven games to earn this spot. Congratulations to boys' cross country runner Robbie Taylor who earned a trip to the state meet. The marching band hosted several local bands in our annual "Thunder Over Aurora" show.

School Safety is a priority and we have several programs and initiatives to help keep our students safe. Our School Resource Officer provides safety through her supervision, relationships with our students and staff, and through the many educational programs she provides in our district.
