

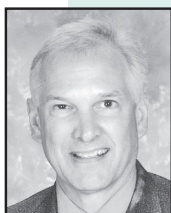

BEVERLY KUCH LEAVES SCHOOL BOARD AFTER 12 YEARS

Long time Aurora City School Board of Education member Beverly Kuch has retired from the Board after twelve years and three terms of service. Kuch's term began in 2015 and ended on December 31, 2017. Current Board member Stephen Sabulsky replaced Kuch effective January 1, 2017.

Kuch said she originally decided to run for a school board position in 2005 when she saw that an open seat had become available. She explained, "I believed then, and still believe now, that our schools are excellent and I felt it was time for me to give back to the community. I knew the Aurora Schools were already great, I just wanted to see if I could help make them even better." Kuch added, "I ran for the 2nd and 3rd terms because I felt our Board had done well in managing this school district (as the data showed) and felt we could continue to do so." Kuch explained that the reason she continued to stay on the Board even after her daughter Heather

graduated was because, "I stayed on after my daughter graduated because her being in the school district was not the reason I originally ran. So nothing really changed when she graduated."

During her time on the Board, she learned, "how a school district is run, and the complexity involved in running it. It amazed me that the superintendents during my terms (Pat Ciccantelli and

Russ Bennett) were able to keep up to date on the many aspects of running the district. I was amazed at exactly how much there was, from contract negotiations to keeping the buildings sound, while educating our children in the meantime. I learned a lot from them. We have the best people at all levels. I learned what a great community Aurora is and that we always had their support - from parents being involved to levy passage." During her tenure on the Board, Kuch said, "My memories of the last twelve years as a Board member would be primarily that our Board worked well together, each member bringing their own expertise and experience. We built a great relationship with each other, the administrators, the teachers and the staff."

When asked about her impact on the district as a Board member, Kuch stated, "I can't point to any specific thing that I personally accomplished, but I think that together we accomplished quite a bit: the superior academic performance, successfully navigating the continual programming changes mandated by the state, the expansion/remodel of the schools, and the stadium improvements and artificial turf, to name a few. We also worked closely with the City, thanks to their cooperation, and many joint programs/projects resulted. I just hope I was able to add a little to all of it and have a positive impact on the Aurora City School District."

Aurora School Board President, Geraard Kohanski, said, "It was a pleasure to work with Beverly for the past twelve years. She was an excellent Board member and always kept the welfare of our students and the community at large at the forefront. Beverly always exhibited excellent teamwork and a positive attitude, even in stressful situations. She is a very intelligent person whose good insights and comments will be missed."

AURORA SCHOOLS' EMIS/BENEFITS COORDINATOR AMY LANGE RETIRES

Amy Lange, the Aurora City Schools' Educational Management Information System (EMIS)/Benefits Coordinator, retired on December 31, 2017 after 27 years in the district. Lange spent 10 years as the Payroll Manager and then went on to work for 17 years in the role of EMIS/Benefits Coordinator for the district.

After earning her degree in accounting from the Youngstown Business College, Lange worked in accounts payable/receivable at the Samuel Moore/Eaton Corp. and was the Accounts Payable Manager for the James A. Garfield Schools.

After seeing an advertisement in the newspaper for a payroll position at the Aurora Schools, Lange applied for the position after deciding to, "try for it." After working for 10 years in the Payroll Department, Lange took on the role of EMIS/Benefits Coordinator for the district. Lange explained that, "the benefits part of my job was handling all the benefit data for the district. That included life, medical, dental, vision, and workers comp. It starts with explaining the benefits to new employees, enrolling them in all the benefit systems and then entering their deductions into the payroll system. This involved keeping many spreadsheets to make sure everything balances and then making sure the premiums were all paid at the beginning of each month. The part I enjoyed the most was helping the employee's with insurance issues."

Lange explained that the most difficult aspect of her job "was all the changes that occur continually on the EMIS side. You have to constantly go to meetings and keep up on what the state is doing. It grew into a very huge job that deals with every aspect of the District." As the EMIS Coordinator, Lange said, "My career started in accounting so I had to learn everything about the information on students, gifted, special education, testing, funding, scheduling, pretty much every piece of information on the district and how it affected funding and the report card. That is what I loved about the job. It was challenging and kept me on my toes and I continually learned every day."

When asked what she liked most about her job at the Aurora Schools, Lange explained, "I loved having the two different sides - EMIS and Benefits. I found in the 43 years I worked, I got tired of doing the same thing over and over so I changed jobs within companies and changed employers three times. I can honestly say I was never bored in this job. I found my place at Aurora and I was given the opportunity to take on this job that I absolutely loved." She added, "Aurora grew into one of the top schools in Ohio during my 27 years. It was exciting and I have to say I was very proud to be a part of it."

Aurora School Board President Gerald Kohanski said, "Amy Lange served the Aurora district well during her long career in the Central Board Office. As Benefits Manager she was a key resource for our employees and their families. Her extensive knowledge of this very complex area was always impressive. Most of all, her pleasant and upbeat personality will be missed by everyone. We wish her a happy and long retirement."

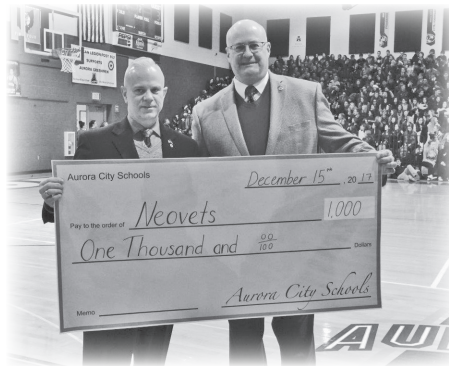

In December 2016 the Ohio General Assembly passed **HOUSE BILL 410** and it was fully implemented for the 2017-2018 school year. HB410 now requires school districts to track attendance by the hour/minute versus ½ day and full day increments that were previously reported. Districts are also now required to notify parents in writing when defined absence thresholds are met or exceeded.

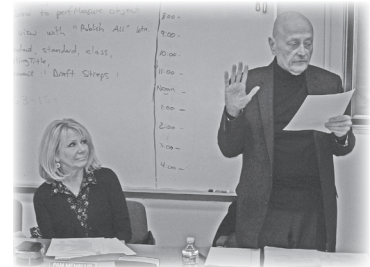

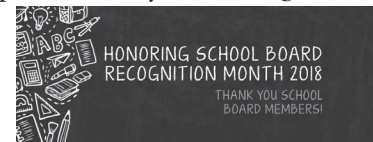
AURORA SCHOOL BOARD ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING ~ January 3, 2018

AURORA HIGH SCHOOL EARNS MOMENTUM AWARD 2017 FROM THE OHIO DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION



Aurora High School (AHS) has recently earned the Momentum Award 2017 from the Ohio Department of Education (ODE). The award recognizes schools for earning A's on every value-added measure on the 2016-2017 State of Ohio Report Card. Aurora High School also previously received the Momentum Award for their 2015-16 Report Card results.

According to the ODE website, "The Momentum Award is presented by the State Board of Education and recognizes schools for exceeding expectations in student growth for the year. Schools must earn straight A's on all Value-Added measures on the report card. The school or district must have at least two Value-Added subgroups of students, which includes: gifted, lowest 20% in achievement, and students with disabilities." The value added is a measure of growth and not overall

achievement, making this award much more difficult to attain.

Aurora Schools' Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction, Mike Roberto, said of the award, "We are always grateful and proud of the recognition of the good work taking place at Aurora High School. The students, teachers, and administrators put in a lot of time together to reach this level of success. The 'Momentum Award' is a natural by-product of student learning (collaboration, problem solving, critical thinking, etc., which we call our students' 'roots') which is really the driving force of the work being done at AHS."

AHS Principal, Paul Milcetic, added, "I'm very proud of this. It's very impressive. It's a very hard metric to meet at the high school level."

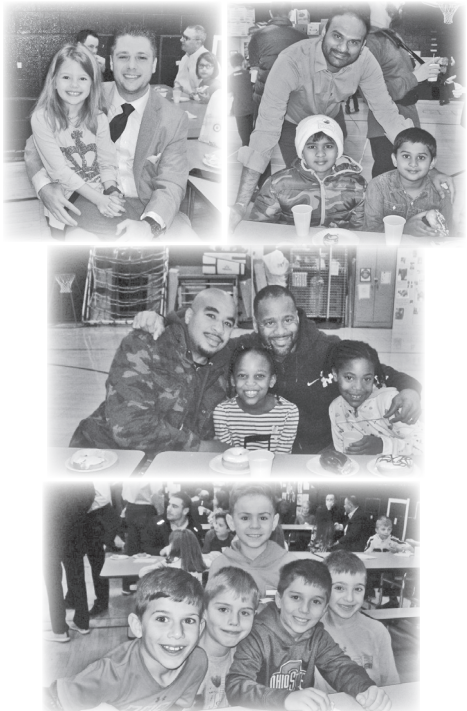
