Superintendent's Message

Dear Parents, Staff, and Community Members,

September is always a very special time in our schools, as many activities are underway--from Kindergarten students preparing

for butterfly migration to kicking off robotics and wind tunnel studies in our STEAM environments. We have also enjoyed welcoming families to our buildings on "Go to School Nights." This year, we have particularly exciting news. As I have shared previously, we launched an exciting initiative in The Winnetka Public Schools that involves the entire community. We are developing an Educational Master Facility Plan, the District's first in 20 years.



The process for plan development is referred to as "Future Ready D36." A design firm, DLR Group, was selected to guide the District through Future Ready D36 throughout the 2017-2018



school year. Future Ready D36 is a holistic process that will measure, validate, quantify and qualify opportunities to align our school facilities, enrollment, and vision for teaching and learning to meet the needs of current and future students in a fiscally responsible manner. There will be many community

engagement opportunities for all who wish to learn more and share input. The first sessions are scheduled for the end of this month (see dates at right).
