CHAPLAIN'S THOUGHT OF THE WEEK

Festival Time

This week will finally see Glastonbury Festival turn 50, after two years of cancellations due to the pandemic. Starting in 1970 with tickets $\pounds 1$ (with free milk from Worthy Farm) and 1,500 festival goers, tickets now cost from $\pounds 280$ and 210,000 people are expected! The festival will, this year, coincide with planned rail strikes, which in turn will have a knock-on effect to road travel... everything is interconnected!

We feel this interconnection more widely as so many events in places across the globe are impacting us all, not least those most vulnerable in society. These words of Persian poet, Saadi, dating back to the second century; can be found at the entrance to the United Nations building in New York:

'Human beings are members of a whole In creation of one essence and soul. If one member is afflicted with pain, Other members uneasy will remain. If you've no sympathy for human pain, The name of human you cannot retain!'

In his book 'A Promised Land', former US President Barak Obama commented on the impact of this poem in the setting of the UN and in the context of global peace and welfare, the realisation of how interconnected we are. In the Bible, St. Paul writes of many people in the early church yet all being part of one body, each connected to another and all being interdependent, 'Its parts should have equal concern for each other. If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honoured, every part rejoices with it.'

Dear God

Thank that our world is a glorious tangle of beautiful connections.

Thank you for connections between people near and far.

Thank you for connections between people and our planet.

Thank you for my immediate connections, family, friends, community.

Thank you for wider connections that make me aware of fragility across our world.

Thank you for wider connections that enrich my life in so many ways.


Help me to connect with people and planet wisely and well, today and everyday.

Timelines and an all new enquiry on the 1381 Revolt

This year, the history department have been redesigning our Brilliance curriculum and introduced a number of new histories that have been inspired by the latest scholarship. Year 8 pupils have been focusing on a big picture of the late Medieval period and in this display, we have been adding to as we teach certain topics chronologically.

This has helped our pupils visualise the sequence of events and make connections between events. With the new 1381 enquiry, pupils have looked at the traditional narrative of the Peasants' Revolt, the local dimension and also looked at various interpretations which have been collected on this display.
