

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LETTER FROM THE CHAIR



Dear GDS Community,

Our family joined the Greensboro Day School community when our oldest daughter started Kindergarten as our country was still coming to grips with the "new normal" shaped by the terror attacks of 9/11. All three of our daughters have been "lifers" at GDS, with the oldest two now in college, and the youngest currently in Upper School. My wife and I now wind down our time as GDS parents as our society again wonders what the "new normal" will look like – this time the worries fueled by a global pandemic.

We spent much time on our decision to send our children to GDS. I am a product of the public school system in North Carolina - from the beginning of my education through law school in Chapel Hill. My wife is a product of parochial schools and a Jesuit university, before also attending law school at UNC. And certainly the commitment to

pay for an independent school education is a serious one.

But we were attracted to GDS in the post-9/11 world for the same reasons that we continue to be dedicated to the school amid a global pandemic - because our society's future depends on giving our children access to the best education possible, and GDS provides that education. The high quality of a GDS education is enduring – it was there when our family started our GDS journey before the first generation iPhone, and it is present today, with iPads and Swivl technology a part of the daily classroom experience. Our GDS families benefit greatly from world-class teachers, staff, administrators, coaches, artists, and instructors of all stripes. And the education our children receive is all-encompassing. Yes, I am amazed by what GDS graduates know academically. But I am also impressed by their intellectual curiosity – the kind of curiosity that one needs to be a lifelong learner – as well as by their cultural awareness and empathy.

Our family was also attracted to GDS by great leaders. Ralph Davison was the Head of School when we began our GDS journey and his legacy of great leadership was carried on by Mark Hale. The GDS community is now fortunate to be led by one of the truly outstanding independent school leaders in the country today in Tracie Catlett.

As I close my three-year term as Chair of the Board of Trustees, I am also thankful for the opportunity to have worked with so many thoughtful and dedicated Trustees at GDS. As I have said many times, ours is a hard-working Board and one that is dedicated to the well-being of each student, family, faculty member, staff member, and GDS alumnus. It has been a privilege to lead this Board and it remains a privilege to serve on the Board going forward under the leadership of Chuck Keeley '81, as Board Chair. Chuck is well known to our community as a GDS alumnus, past parent, Board member, and Endowment Campaign Chair. 

If you enter a classroom at Greensboro Day School, you may still find March 11 written on the whiteboard. March 11 noted the last day of inperson classes for GDS students before the transition to Distance Learning caused by COVID-19. With parent-teacher conferences and Spring Break already scheduled, GDS made the decision to close the campus to all families, employees, and visitors and put distance learning and distance working in place. All meetings and community gatherings would take place through Zoom teleconference. Following three days of intense teacher training Distance Learning started for students on March 26.

As restrictions remained in place throughout North Carolina and other parts of the country and world, Greensboro Day School campus stayed closed for the remainder of the school year. With a little creativity, many school events were re-imagined and held virtually or at a distance, ceremonies took place over Zoom, we enjoyed coming together on Friday evenings to watch theatre productions from the past, and we cheered on the Bengals during a recording of the 2017 Dick's National Tournament game when GDS beat IMG Academy. We gave air hugs to 4th graders as they drove through the Lower School carpool line for a send-off, and we celebrated 8th graders as they prepared to enter high school. The Class of 2020 walked across the stage to receive their diplomas at a Drive-Up graduation ceremony, planned by a group of seniors, parents, and school administrators.

With the implementation of our Distance Learning program, we recognized that it would be important to collect feedback from the three constituency groups most affected, students, parents, and teachers. What is included on these pages are comments from the community shared in that process. We are very grateful for the feedback that allowed us to make adjustments, when possible, in real-time. We found that the comments were genuine and indicated that parents are truly partners in this work. Generally, the answers, celebratory or concerning were focused on student well-being, the daily schedule and screen time, logistics, and student progress.

FOUNDERS' DAY

On February 14, 2020 we celebrated Greensboro Day School's founding with a formal proclamation from Mayor Nancy Vaughan and the City of Greensboro declaring February 14, 2020, Greensboro Day School's Founders' Day. We hosted various activities throughout campus including a school-wide art project, history lesson, trivia, special treats, and a panel of speakers featuring GDS Alumnus, Wayne Robinson '76, former Head of School, Ralph Davison, former teacher, Marilyn Jones and Head of School, Tracie Catlett.

The Articles of Incorporation to begin Greensboro Day School were submitted on February 14, 1970 and filed on February 17, 1970 by the attorneys, Thornton Brooks, Allen Foster, and James Williams.

The Incorporation listed 14 individuals as the 'original directors': Lawton Gresham, Alice Isaacson, Jane Eskridge, Robert Lincks, Jim Schenck, Tom Ruffin, Jr., Allen Foster, Jack Warmath, Charles McLendon, Shep Griswold, Sion Boney, Kathleen Bryan Edwards, David Brown, and Thornton Brooks.

We are thankful to these individuals for having the vision and the courage to begin Greensboro Day School.


Only threads of our past life left behind. Threads of memories: memories of being with friends, memories of being outside, memories of exploring the world.



GREENSBORO DAY SCHOOL ANNOUNCED GDS ONLINE



The Swivl device acts as a dock for the iPad, following the speaker around the room, and uploading recordings to the web. Faculty will begin Swivl training this summer.

"Outside of the recent COVID - 19 interruption to on campus-learning, we recognize a great demand for online courses," said Head of School Tracie Catlett. "This new program allows GDS to greatly broaden its reach. Students outside of North Carolina and the United States can apply for admission to GDS Online. Naturally, GDS Online means that we will be fully prepared should a resurgence of COVID-19 occur this fall.



GDS students produced the QuARTantine art show, featuring student and faculty artwork created during the pandemic.

... the winningest coach in North Carolina high school basketball history ...



Freddy Johnson was named the 2020 winner of the Morgan Wootten Award for boys' basketball.

This prestigious award, presented by the Elks Hoop Shoot, is named after Morgan Wootten, who served

as the Head Coach of DeMatha Catholic High School in Hyattsville, Maryland for 46 years. Wootten is one of four high school coaches enshrined into the Basketball Hall of Fame. The annual award recognizes two outstanding high school coaches, one for boys' basketball and one for girls' basketball.

"The Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame is proud to annually honor the legacy of Hall of Fame coach Morgan Wootten while recognizing high school coaches who use their platforms to positively impact the lives of their student-athletes," said John L. Doleva, President and CEO of the Basketball Hall of Fame. "While victories are important, Mr. Wootten taught us there is a greater value placed on the impact coaches make on players that carries on to their future endeavors and we applaud Coach Johnson and Coach Prudden for their efforts."

The 2020 winner of the Morgan Wootten Award for boys' basketball is Freddy Johnson from Greensboro Day School (Greensboro, North Carolina). Freddy Johnson became the head boys' basketball coach at Greensboro Day School in 1977.



Freddy Johnson named recipient of Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame's 2020 Morgan Wootten Award for Lifetime Achievement in Coaching High School Basketball.

At GDS, he has compiled an overall record of 1080-300, a winning percentage of 78.2%. He is the winningest coach in North Carolina high school basketball history, reaching the 1,000-win milestone in November 2017. His teams have appeared in 19 North Carolina Independent School Athletic Association State Championship games, winning a record 11 state championships. His teams have also won 27 conference championships, and he has been the Conference Coach of the Year 23 times. He was the USA Today North

Carolina Coach of the Year in 2015 and the BallisLife.com National Coach of the Year in 2017. Johnson has coached in seven all-star games, including the 1997 Capital Classic All-Star Game, the 2013 McDonald's All-American Game, and the 2017 Jordan Brand Classic. He is an inductee in four Hall of Fames, including the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame in 2016.

The 2020 winner of the Morgan Wootten Award for girls' basketball is Jill Prudden from Oak Ridge High School (Oak Ridge, Tennessee).

The Morgan Wootten Award winners were selected by a nationally based committee of Hall of Famers, national high school media members, tournament directors and others who have significantly impacted the game.

Previous boys' basketball award winners include Bill Kruger (Clear Lake High School, Houston, TX), Gene Pingatore (St. Joseph's High School, Westchester, Illinois), William "Speedy" Morris (St. Joseph's Prep, Philadelphia, PA), Bob Dwyer (Archbishop Carroll High School, Washington, DC), Harvey Reid (Ralph L. Fike High School, NC), Gary McKnight (Mater Dei, CA), Vito Montelli (St. Joseph High School, CT), Jack Curran (Archbishop Molloy, NY), Joe Gallagher (St. John's College, DC), Ralph Tasker (Hobbs High School, NM), Robert Hughes (Fort Worth Dunbar, TX) and Bob Hurley, Sr. (St. Anthony's, NJ).

Boys Basketball Success Recognized by MaxPreps

MaxPreps recognized Coach Freddy **Johnson** and the boys basketball program on numerous occasions this spring.

On April 15, MaxPreps ranked the top 10 most dominant boys basketball programs of the last 10 years in North Carolina with GDS coming in the top spot. Using the below methodology, MaxPreps awards points for: Top 25 finishes in the MaxPreps state computer rankings (25 points awarded to the No. 1 team, 24 for No. 2 and so on), Top 25 finishes in the MaxPreps national computer rankings (50 points for No. 1, 49 for No. 2 and so on), State championships (20 points), and State championship game appearances (10 points). Greensboro Day owns state titles in 2015, 2017, 2018 and 2019 and has been ranked in the state Top 25 each year of the past decade. The Bengals also finished as state finalists in 2012, 2013 and 2014 and possess a win percentage of over 86 percent during that time frame.

The Bengals finished with 317 points, 100 points more than the second team in the ranking! (Boys basketball named most dominant program decade for state of NC.)

On April 24, MaxPreps listed the top 100 high school coaches in the nation. Through consistent success and longevity, some coaches become the face of high school sports programs or even the school itself. It's not all that unusual for coaches to spend 40 years at one school, leading multiple generations of athletes in a community. MaxPreps set out to identify 100 of the top high school coaches in the country, men and women who have won multiple state and national championships, set records and worked to perfect their craft over decades. Our own Freddy Johnson was recognized in this listing. Coach Johnson was the only coach from North Carolina to be included in this list.

On April 28, MaxPreps decided to look back on the last ten years to identify the most successful boys' basketball programs in the nation during that time period. Developing a program into a consistent winner on a national level is a daunting task in the current landscape as roster turnover, coaching changes and many other factors contribute to inconsistencies across a 10-year period. Win-loss records and national rankings were the primary factors considered with postseason success (at the state and national level) also part of the equation. The Bengals were recognized as an Honorable Mention on this list. The list only included 18 teams. Of those 18, GDS was one of only four teams who won over 300 games during the last decade! (Also recognized as Honorable Mention for boys basketball program of the decade in the nation!







2019-20 Girls' Basketball: A Season to Remember



During the last several seasons, the girls' basketball team has risen to new heights, under the coaching of Mrs. Mara Montana. Three years ago, the team had a record of 12-15. Two years ago, the team improved to 20-11 in Coach Montana's first season as Head Coach. This past season, the girls finished with an overall record of 28-4, the third best record ever for a GDS girls basketball team. Coach Montana stated that she could not be more proud of this team and all that they accomplished this season.

This season was exciting. The team started the season off strong, winning their first 16 games by an average margin of victory of 24 points per game. The team took care of business in conference play, going undefeated, winning each game by at least 18 points on their way to capturing their 2nd straight conference championship, finishing the season 28-4.

This year's team achieved some major milstones:

- They finished the season undefeated at home for the first time in program history (17-0).
- They earned the highest seeding in program history for the HAECO tournament.
- They, for the first time in program history, were ranked #1 in the State by MaxPreps for both public and private schools.
- This was the first time in program history the girls were ranked by MaxPreps in the Southeast region.
- They received the #1 seed for the NCISAA State tournament which is the highest ever in program history, where for only the third time in program history they made it to the Championship game.
- They defeated the reigning 1A, 2A, 3A, and 4A NCISAA State Champions, along with the 4A and 3A State Runner-Ups in both South Carolina and Tennessee.

While it sounds easy, the team saw many ups and downs throughout the season, but they continued to push forward.

ZERO seniors. There was not a single senior on this year's team. They were led by multiple juniors: Hailey Blackwell '21, Je'Bria Fullwood '21, Caroline Wyrick '21, Lesley Thomas '21, and Paula Graichen '21. These juniors have been the backbone and foundation of the program shift.

Hailey Blackwell '21 was the true leader of this team. She was the leading scorer due to her fast style of play at the point-guard position. Everything this team does goes through Hailey. She was the team's MVP this season and was named All-Conference and All-State.

Je'Bria Fullwood '21 brought toughness to this team. She is tenacious on the defensive end which disrupted opposing offenses and led to easy offensive opportunities. She and Hailey provided a 1-2 defensive line that was arguably the best in the state this past season. Je'Bria was the Conference Player of the Year and named All-State.

Caroline Wyrick '21 added scoring opportunities from the wing. She was able to knock down the 3-pointer, or pull-up off one dribble. Caroline added depth to this team's rebounding efforts as she crashes the boards hard. Caroline was named All-Conference.

Lesley Thomas '21 and her height strengthened the team's rebounding opportunities. She was a force on the inside on both ends of the court. Lesley was one of the team's leaders, holding her teammates accountable.

Paula Graichen '21 brought additional height at 6'3 and created an interesting dynamic as she played inside and out. Her basketball IQ is her strongest skill. She was able to see the floor and understands the game like a college player. Paula was named All-Conference and All-State.

The team made a deep playoff run, reaching the NCISAA state championship game for only the 3rd time in program history. Unfortunately, the team fell just short to Providence Day School, despite a feverish fouth-quarter comeback.

The team is hungrier than ever and will return the majority of its young team for the 2020-21 season in which they look to win the program's first ever state championship. ■

Here are a few exciting highlights of our Booster allocations/activities this year:



Almost.



Climbing the Film Industry Ladder

Speaking as an underclassman, **Alex Beaver** '08 was a face to know on campus. He was witty, fun, involved (2008 senior class president), and creative. (He was the artist of the 2008 yearbook cover, for example).

In his junior and senior year, he was actively involved in Video Production class and AP Studio Art, which introduced the then 17-year-old to the work he wanted to pursue — directing and producing film. "Taking AP Art led me to Video Production for sure. It was through high school Video Production projects that I realized film and video essentially combined the mediums that really interested me — music, soundscape, picture, photography, writing. It's everything," Beaver said. He fell in love.

After interviewing him and hearing about his progression in the film industry, it is safe to say there were a few specific strategic chances he took that helped get his foot in the door. That takes a healthy amount of humble confidence that he may deny having, but it's there.

Beaver enrolled in UNC-Wilmington fall of 2008 specifically wanting to major in Film. During his time in Wilmington, the state of NC turned into a hotbed for filming, so he was in the right spot. This brings me to his first strategic chance in spring of his senior year. He did not get the internship he wanted. The internship he did get left a lot of free time in his schedule, so he visited the office of the original internship he sought. After a 30 minute interview, he walked out with a part-time job instead of an internship. After graduating a few months later, that part-time job turned into fulltime. Some would say that is luck, but he brought that opportunity about by putting himself out there. Take note.

The film equipment rental house he worked out of was in the midst of supplying the majority of lighting & grip equipment and all 10 sound stages for the filming of "Iron Man 3." Beaver specifically worked in the lighting and grip rental warehouse on the EUE/Screen Gems backlot. "We were slammed preparing their newest equipment orders and repairing broken lights, stands, etc," he said.

Yet Beaver found his mind wandering from the confines of the warehouse to the big time Hollywood sets a mere hundred yards away, on the other side of Marvel security. This brings me to a second pivotal action Beaver took in his career. Getting creative about how to get past security, he loaded up a golf cart with empty boxes of lighting tubes. The security guard eyed him and the boxes and miraculously let him pass. After unloading the empty boxes onto the stage, a crew member, Smokey, spotted him and shouted his way. He shrunk on the spot. The jig was up, or so he thought.

Smokey put his arm around Beaver and took him straight to a lighting technician and introduced him. "Beaver, this is Mark Graves. He needs someone like you on his crew. You up for it?"

He's never looked back.

Now, Beaver is an assistant director in the Directors Guild of America based in Atlanta. His resume includes work as an Assistant Director on "Ozark," "The Outsider," & "Stranger Things," Key Set PA on "The 15:17 to Paris" & "Game Night," and Director of two Futurebirds music videos.

Everything is freelance. "You have to meet producers. Your current job is your next job. If you do well on that job, that producer is going to hire you on another one," he said. "I'm lucky somebody told me that in the beginning. That is how you have to think about it — it's all about meeting people and proving you're good and good to work with."

Jason Bateman's "Ozark" and Clint Eastwood's "The 15:17 to Paris" are two of his favorite shows on his resume. He worked closely with their crews and learned so much from both filmmakers, especially Bateman. Bateman has become a close mentor of Beaver's. They've worked on four seasons of streaming TV and two feature films. "On every single one, I learn more and more from him," Beaver said. "Not only is he one of the most experienced filmmakers I've ever

worked with, he is one of the most caring and loyal leaders I've encountered in any situation."

To current GDS students considering a career in film, Beaver offers the following advice:

"If you have an iPhone, make something," and consider your senior project as an opportunity to make something. For his senior project, Beaver produced a 12 minute video about **Will Phillips '08** dreaming in the middle of a biology test before being awoken by teacher Ben Zuraw's booming voice. He also recommends reading the following books: "Making Movies" by Sidney Lumet, "Rebel Without A Crew" by Robert Rodriguez, and "Ready When You Are, Mr. Coppola, Mr. Spielberg, Mr. Crowe" by Jerry Ziesmer.

Being on the campus of a competitive school for 13 years taught Beaver how to compete academically with his peers. "I went to UNC-W, and a lot of the people in our grade went to Georgetown, Duke, etc., and those are the people I was competing with [in the classroom]. I knew I wanted to go somewhere creative, but I still competed. I cared."

He also thinks being a Lifer taught him lifelong social skills. "I am who I am today because of the culture GDS instilled in my class and me, as well as allowing us young students so many freedoms." GDS helped him form lifelong bonds with so many great people, including teachers. Dr. Jane Gutsell, who taught English, was his most influential teacher. "She was really hard on us, she made us perform," Beaver said. "But she also was such a kind and gentle woman. She'd let you sleep in her class. She wouldn't wake you up — you'd wake up an hour later surrounded by a completely different class of students... She made us think, made us learn, and made us want to learn." No topic was out of bounds — the two freely discussed religion, philosophy, culture.

A typical day right now for Beaver is crazy. "I love to be the person who can hatch

a plan and execute it whether things go according to plan (they never do) or not. Murphy's Law is the law," he said. "Every day is a new day with new sets, locations, crew personnel, actors, directors, etc. I find comfort in the perpetual flux of my job." Dr. Gutsell introduced him to Heraclitus's idea that everything is in flux, and he has found comfort in that idea ever since.

He hopes to have directed "something of substance" on his own by age 32. He is 30 now and working on it, so stay tuned.

SCHOOL RETIRES 2 ATHLETIC JERSEYS

Greensboro Day School retired Tamera Thorpe '15's #21 basketball jersey on Friday, December 13, after the girls' basketball game against Ravenscroft School.

Thorpe is a 2015 graduate of Greensboro Day School, a 2019 graduate of the University of North Georgia, and is currently a graduate student at the University of North Georgia studying kinesiology.

Thorpe currently holds numerous Greensboro Day School girls' basketball records including most points scored in a game (38), most field goals made in a game (14), most free throws made in a game (14), most 3-point shots made in a game (5), and is the girls' single-season record for points scored in a season (568). She is also Greensboro Day School's all-time leading scorer (boys' or girls') with a total of 2,248 points scored. While at GDS, Thorpe also was a member of the track team and holds the school record for the 4x100 relay, set in 2013.

As a junior at GDS, Thorpe made the Regional Super 60

selection, and as a senior, she was named to the Top 100 National Prospect List. She was named All-Conference and All-State three times. Thorpe participated in the 2014-15 North Carolina Private School All-Star Game and was a McDonald's All-American Nominee. As a senior, she averaged 22.7 points, 4.5 steals and 4.4 rebounds per game. She helped lead the girls' team to appearances in the NCISAA State Championship Game in 2012 and 2014.

Thorpe's jersey is the first girls' basketball jersey to be retired.

Greensboro Day School retired Elizabeth Lancaster Bagden '03's soccer jersey Tuesday, January 28, 2020, during an upper school assembly.

Bagden is a 2003 graduate of Greensboro Day School, and a 2008 and 2011 graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Bagden was a 'Lifer' at Greensboro Day School, attending the school from Kindergarten through 12th grade. While at GDS, she was a member of the National Honor Society and was the Editor of the yearbook.

During her time at Greensboro Day School, she was a member of the soccer, field hockey, track, and swimming teams. On the track team, she ran a myriad of events, including the (100, 200, 4x100, 4x200, 4x400). She was the team's Most Valuable Runner as a junior. As a member of the swimming team, she was a freestyle sprinter, competing in the 50 and 100 frees and on the 200 and 400 free relays. She spent six years on the varsity field hockey team, starting in the 7th grade and led the field hockey team to its first and only state championship appearance in 2002. As a field hockey player, she was named to the All-Conference team twice and as the Conference Player of the Year as a Senior, and named to the All-State team during her senior season.

On the soccer team, she was the starting goalie for all four seasons of her high school career with a record of 77-13-7. Of the 77 wins, 66 were shutouts. Those teams won three state championships in 2000, 2002, and 2003 and was a runner-up in 2002. She was named All-

Conference for three years and All-Region for two years.

While at UNC, she was a member of the women's soccer and lacrosse teams, a feat that only one other UNC studentathlete has been able to do. She was named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll in all four of her years at UNC. As a member of the UNC women's soccer team, one of the most prestigious programs in the country, Elizabeth was a member of the 2003 and 2006 National Championship teams. As a member of the UNC lacrosse team, she was named the team's Most Improved Player in 2004 and helped lead the lacrosse team to the NCAA Quarterfinals in 2005 and 2006.



STRONGFOUNDATIONS

The cornerstones of my intellect, wit, and strength were chiseled into my identity while I was a Bengal.

As a human being in the GDS community, I was unexceptional in almost every way: academically, socially, artistically, philanthropically. (It's no wonder that I was advised I would not be accepted to any of the six schools to which I had applied for college admission.) I was outstanding at nothing; in truth, I made not one significant contribution to the school I attended for seven years.

But considering the secrets I kept, I was actually quite proud of that. Underachievers, I have found, have an uncanny ability to survive.

GDS is well-known to be a small, tight community, where it's hard to keep a secret. Being a student in an environment where everyone knows everyone else's business, through some sort of social osmosis (walking the halls was enough to keep you informed of things you wouldn't have even asked to know), was often thoroughly exhausting for me. As I approach the 30-year anniversary of leaving those halls, (my truth long-since out of the closet), I know that my ability to adapt and survive was made possible largely from having strong foundations.

In the last week of school before Senior Projects began, I was diagnosed with cancer.

Though known as extroverted, I had a repertoire of masks. I was determined not to become defined by a diagnosis when I had worked hard for years to avoid other stigmas. I just wanted to get out alive. Support came in surprising ways throughout my Senior Project; I was enveloped in North Carolina Shakespeare Festival and CTG projects where actors and staff members helped me manage my workload so I could juggle the onslaught of clinical consultations and appointments that descended on me. Whirlwind would be an adequate adjective to use, and in truth, without the Senior Project, my life might have disintegrated.

With my Senior Project (barely) completed, graduation came and went. I worked my summer job through treatments. I went away to college in the fall. (I got accepted to all six schools.)

And there I was. Me - the Crown Princess of Underachieving - NOT struggling to live on my own, 1100 miles away from home. I quickly discovered the value of my foundations.

I found that the least stressful part of my life was academics. I found that even with my new medical regimens and schedule, I could manage my coursework. I rediscovered my love for theatre and directed large scale productions on campus, largely due to a support system who understood the treatment traumas I was enduring.

I learned to love country music. Because if Dolly was good enough for Bob Satterfield, she was damn sure good enough for me.

I spent hours with my first love, art, because I knew how to manage my time. Because translating French literature with Dr. Davison had taught me patience and how to dedicate the time truly needed to engage with a text. I identified tasks that needed more effort and time (close reading) and which ones needed less because they came more easily (most writing), and which ones I could ignore (algebra).

I survived the Dallas Central Expressway. Because one experience of riding in a van driven by Sherry Dove to a swim meet taught me to value my life and take Driver's Ed seriously.

I knew how to conduct research and study independently. Because Mr. Bowman taught me that the world is full of wonder and mystery if we look closely and carefully, and Mr. Moore and Dr. Gutsell instilled in me a love for words so I could attempt to share those wonders and mysteries.

Having these solid academic foundations gave me the mental and emotional space to deal with the other stressful things going on in my life - things over which I had little control most days. It also gave me the freedom to develop new skills that I needed to survive.

And survive I did. Things got much worse before they got better; secrets have a way of coming to light, social osmosis or no. I have gaps in my memory from being burned, PTSD from being poisoned, and Frankenstein scars from being cut; I was the walking trinity of cancer treatments before I was 25. But I am still here.

And here, there must be a solemn nod to my experiences as a Bengal.

I have built and rebuilt my life a dozen times over, because you can do that, you know, when you have strong foundations.



Remembering BOB SATTERFIELD

Competent teachers help you learn, good teachers help you understand, great teachers help you master the material and become your best self. Bob Satterfield was a great teacher.

Mr. Satterfield was essential to GDS culture from the school's opening day. I have one of those crystal-clear childhood memories of him leading an assembly in the social hall of the old Temple Emanuel on Greene Street, where classes were held during the months before the Lawndale campus opened.

The all-school meeting was about creating a student government. I raised my hand and asked Mr. Satterfield an inane question, one of my specialties as an eight-year-old.



Mr. Satterfield did not get mad. He did not brush it off. He asked me a question back. The two of us then discussed the role of the filibuster in the emerging political processes of Greensboro Day School, concluding, sadly, that there was none.

Flash forward a decade. Junior year advanced math met right before lunch. It was a boisterous group and the only thing standing between us and a trip off campus in John Wikle's Toronado was that last equation on the chalkboard, but instead of getting restless we were geeking out on the work and when we got a little too excited Mr. Satterfield could quiet the room with a softly-spoken "Boys!" You wanted to do your best for him, and he somehow got the best out of you.

And for all the years in between those two experiences, and for many decades after, Bob was a constant at Greensboro Day School. He was there a generation later, when my own kids were students. Maybe you never took one of his classes, maybe you didn't overlap with him at all, but if you ever had a patient and kind teacher at GDS who kept working with you until they found that certain specific way to make the light go on, even when your cognitive dimmer switch was stuck on low, well, that was the school he helped create.

What do you really know about your teachers when you're a kid? Not much. They seem so old, part of the strange world of adults and authority figures, and then years later you look back and realize how young some of them were. Mr. Satterfield was just starting out when he arrived at a brandnew GDS as one of the original handful of faculty members, freshly wed, not so far

removed from the tobacco fields of Caswell County where he grew up.

And some of the things you know about your teachers are just wrong. Bob loved Dolly Parton. We thought she was corny and he had somehow missed the '60s, man, but of course he had lived through them and he was right about Dolly, she's awesome. The birth of his first child was the talk of the school, our own celebrity baby, but in retrospect he and Vada didn't actually start a family just to entertain us. They were real people with full lives. Who knew? We believed he belonged to us.

Flip things around and it can be mortifying to realize how clearly your teachers saw you at times in your life when you were little more than a lump of clay soaked in hormones. Yet somehow Mr. Satterfield always made you feel good about who and where you were. Like the late Lenwood Edwards, another formative figure from the school's early days, he never lost sight of the best in students even when they were still searching for it themselves. His obituary says that as head of the discipline committee "he was known for his calm counseling rather than harsh punishment." That sounds about right.


The rest of the faculty — also real people! — loved him too. He mentored a student teacher named Kathy Bland, later Kathy Davis, who went on to become an all-time great at GDS. He and Vada ended up sharing a lake house with the formidable chemistry teacher K Windham, his opposite in public persona but equal in soul.

The obituary – you really should read it – lists some of the honors he earned during his decades at GDS. There were a lot of them, including yearbook dedications and



the Hendrix Teacher of the Year award and a scholarship fund in his name. But his greatest legacy at the school is that faculty DNA characterized by decency, humor, and a belief in what students can accomplish. My daughter, Sydney, who was taught by his proteges, told me that in those classrooms, "he was always there."





Remembering AN ESSENCE TO THE PLACE: BOB SATTERFIELD

It was an honor to have been able to share 17 of Bob Satterfield's 37 years at Greensboro Day School.


When Vance Robertson retired in 1986, we set out to appoint a new Assistant Director for the Upper School. This person would be in charge of school discipline and so would need to be firm but flexible, fair and of good judgement, to possess calmness, good humor and compassion; and, particularly, this person needed to have a special relationship with students. As it turned out, finding the right person was not difficult at all, and I consider the years Bob Satterfield and I worked together in the Upper School office to be the most enjoyable and rewarding in my years in independent education.

Bob and I discovered we had some things in common. We taught subjects (geometry and Latin) that turned out to be useful after all. We shared an interest in poking around flea markets, looking for treasures, and in good barbecue. Sometimes we combined these two interests, and, I have to tell you, on one occasion, it was in the middle of the day.

More importantly, I like to think we shared a sense of what a school should try to be.







Bob was there that first day, September 14, 1970, at Temple Emanuel, 713 N. Greene St. He remembered walking what would become the school property with Ted Welles, the first headmaster, hearing him describe the kind of school that would arise from those cornfields.

In 1972, following Headmaster Pat Boardman's heart attack, Bob and two other teachers actually served as the school's chief administrative officers—the Triumvirate, they were called—and, of course, Bob continued to teach five classes.

Much has changed since those days: the split-rail fences are gone, Bob cut off his mustache. What remained was the steady and constant influence he had in the development of our school.

Over the years, Bob provided wise counsel to six heads of school, and to many more

teachers, administrators, parents and students than the theater could hold.

Whether judging the appropriateness of attire of the Male Homecoming Court, a quaint custom of the 1980s and '90s, or presiding over the Discipline Committee, which in those days was also the Honor Court, Bob brought an empathy and understanding which defined his career. In the fall of 1971 it seems the school newspaper had conducted a faculty interview on the subject of the efficacy of corporal punishment, and, while one staff member actually said "only as a last resort," Bob Satterfield dismissed the possibility of such a notion with that quick warmth of his and disabused others of a practice which surely seems unthinkable today. The anecdote is retold in Lo, Hearts Behold, a history of the school's first 25 years. It ends with these words:

The caring and nurturing approach of this strong geometry teacher is remembered by all who have reflected on the early days of the school. It is indeed the thread that runs through the career of the one person who has served GDS continuously since the day it opened. If there is an essence to the place, you will find it in Bob Satterfield's classroom and office, in his positive way of working with young people.

As an institution and as the individuals who comprise it, we cherish those memories and values of Bob Satterfield, that essence, and we are charged with taking care that they are honored and observed into the future.
