PURPOSE

School Purpose

The purpose of Holbrook Elementary school is to ensure high levels of learning for all students in a safe environment. The Holbrook Elementary mission statement is: "Together we will ensure high levels or learning for all students in a safe environment."

Description of the School

Community

Holbrook Elementary is in a suburban, residential neighborhood at 1018 E 250 N, Bountiful, Utah 84010

Student Body

We currently serve 475 students in grades K through grade 6. In our preschool we have a total of 66 students which bring our total count to 541. Our ethnicity breakdown 82% Caucasian, 12 % Hispanic/Latino, 1% Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 1% Asian, 1% Black or African American and 2% multiple races. Student Economic Status is indicated by having 13% who qualify for free/reduced lunch. English Language Learners (ELL) make up 2% of our student population. The percentage of students receiving Special Education services is 23% of our population (including preschool and speech services). The average class size is 23 students per teacher.

Staff

Holbrook has sixty three employees. Thirty two the employees are certified teachers and/or have a bachelors degree.

School Culture

Our school culture is centered on kindness and excellence as indicated by both academic and nonacademic factors. This is accomplished by highly dedicated school employees and parents who are involved in all levels of learning and various activities. We benefit from parental involvement, ranging from participation in ILP conferences and parents facilitating a choir and a musical production. Parent and educator collaboration is the key to our success. To support student academic and social emotional growth, Holbrook adopted a House System based off of the Ron Clark Academy House System beginning the 2022-2023 school year which emphasizes the importance of community, safety, kindness, and empowerment. The four houses are Altruismo, which promotes giving back to others, Amistad, which promotes friendship, Isibindi which promotes courage, and Reveur which promote a sense of community and unity. On any given Friday one may find House Meetings or school-wide House Celebrations in progress where we will use this time to learn skills to help students succeed as well as building relationships in a mentor model. Students may also be involved in service projects around the school along with their house members.

Unique Features & Challenges

Multiple generations of families have attended Hannah Holbrook Elementary School. This creates a heritage of loyalty and high expectations from the community, the children, and their parents. Challenges at Hannah Holbrook include limited additional funding due to a comparatively higher socio-economic standing and a comparatively smaller student body. We hold a Tech Trek fundraiser annually to secure technology funding to enhance instruction and prepare our students to be successful in an increasingly technological work force.

Needs Analysis

Notable Achievements

Holbrook students are consistently participating and excelling in a variety of academic competitions including: STEM Science Fair, Spelling Bee, Math & Science Olympiad, Davis District Decathlon and Vex Robotics. We have purchased iPads and are utilizing music creation software to expose our students to digital music creation and understand CTE topics at a deeper level. Parents and community volunteers support many school activities such as: School Musical, Choir, Ribbon Week, Chess Club, Running Club, Read-a-Thon, Birthday Tables, Mountain Man Rendezvous, Hoop Shoot Competition, Patriot Day, Field Day, Volunteer Reading Tutoring, and a variety of additional PTA involvement and supported activities. All students benefit from 1:1 technology, meaning technology is highly integrated into daily instruction. Each student has either an iPad (K-2) or laptop (3-6) to use throughout the school day and in the evenings/weekends. It allows for remote learning and has allowed for learning to continue in the face of inclement weather. We are in our seventh year with a school-wide intervention time where we give targeted interventions to help students. We are working on further implementing PLC's and making data driven decision to drive personalized instruction and enrichment.

Areas of Recent Improvement

Over the past school year Holbrook has had an addition of an outdoor classroom. The outdoor classroom will allow students more time exploring their education in an outdoor setting which allows for more movement and learning opportunities like studying plants that may not have been as authentic indoors. We have been identified as a PBIS

(Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports) pilot school working to improve culture and climate through positive interactions and restorative practices. Our teachers have been attending specialized training in the science of reading (LETRS), Ron Clark Academy instructional strategies and community building. Our reading aides and resource teachers have been trained in the SIPPS program as well (Systematic Instruction in Phonological Awareness, Phonics, and Sight Words)

Areas of Needed Improvement

Continual work on improving our Tier 1 instruction to ensure students are learning the "big rocks" (priority standards) as identified by the teachers and then intervening with students not meeting these standards. Continue to improve our Tier 2 intervention in the Language Arts, to increase teacher intervention skills and improve student reading proficiency. Use our Literacy Coach to assist us in moving forward in meeting these standards while providing in house professional development for both our teachers and our reading aides. We also want to address the growing social and emotional learning (SEL) needs of students, and this will create a stronger school-wide focus using Ron Clark Academy House System. We will also hire Social Skills TAs to work with students in 1-1 and small-group settings, in collaboration with our School Counselor and identified by our grade level teachers. The Social Skills TAs will also help implement social skill activities.

The state goal is at least 60%.	Did not meet goal	Holbrook Elementary did not meet this goal. We attribute decreased attendance as a significant factor in not achieving adequate growth. Additional action steps are adding an increase focus on attendance through consistency in sending attendance letters, additional training for our staff in the Science of Reading and the implementation of SIPPS as our Tier 2 and Tier 3 intervention program.
Increase the number of proficient students by 25% as measured by the iReady Math Diagnostic test, as we progress from the beginning of year (BOY) in September to the middle of year (MOY) score in January.	Did not meet goal	From BOY to EOY, Holbrook Elementary School increased proficiency by 23%. We were two percent short of our goal. This could be attributed to the increase in chronic absenteeism.
Based on a Social Skills Rating Scales (SSRS) survey of teachers, using the SEL Walkthrough Tool, and DSD Climate Student Survey in the fall and spring, to obtain baseline data, we will implement a targeted plan as a school and Community Council to implement recommended changes to make intentional and	Met goal	SEL strategies, curriculum, and activities have been embedded at Holbrook. We are seeing increased support for student challenges such as behavior, emotional needs, and attendance.

significant gain our knowledge and use of skills imperative to social-emotional learning (SEL) and personal development.

Our increased focus on SEL development will result in increased time on task in the classroom, fewer instructional interruptions, decreased office referrals, and greater collaborative skills in students as they engage in academic and social activities in the classroom and throughout the school. Specifically, we know that meeting this goal will also help us to meet our two academic goals in reading and mathematics.

A MLL (Multi-language learner) aide will be hired to work with our non-English speaking students. (LAND TRUST FUNDS) K-2 Teachers and Resource teachers will receive Sound-Wall trainings to help with implementation of Science of Reading strategies. K-6 and resource teachers will receive training from our Holbrook Literacy Coach a minimum of three times during the school year to further enhance Science of Reading strategy implementation. SIPPS (Systematic Instruction of Phonological Awareness, Phonics, and Sight Words) Will be used as Tier II and Tier III instruction for struggling readers.
