Some families got her autograph on copies of her book, *Juneteenth: A Children's Story*.

Ms. Lee, a longtime Fort Worth resident and retired educator, came to prominence following her decades-long efforts to get Juneteenth proclaimed a national holiday. In early February, more than 30 members of Congress signed a letter nominating her for the peace prize. The awards will be announced in October.





JON KELLAM

Head of School Jon Kellam bids farewell to The Oakridge School this summer. He has worn many hats during his nearly three decades-long career here – as a teacher, coach, administrator, mentor, mentee, and friend – and poured his heart into the lives of countless students, alumni, faculty and staff, community members, and more. We reflect on his leadership in this special issue of Outlook.

Ahead of the school’s 40th anniversary, Jon Kellam sat down for a one-on-one interview with Director of Marketing and Communications Bridget Lewis. He reflected on his time at Oakridge.

Can you talk about your introduction to Oakridge and your initial thoughts about the campus?

My first introduction to the school was through the athletic director at the time and his name was Doug Woodcock. I was quickly thereafter introduced to Andy Broadus, the headmaster at the time. I’ll never forget the first time I drove on the campus. I kind of just got this feeling that there was something special behind that white picket fence. At the time, the school was much smaller, 14 years old, but there was still a charm and kind of a humble sophistication about Oakridge that I think still exists today.

You’ve seen incredible growth in facilities over your time at Oakridge. What changes most stand out in your mind?

Oakridge has grown tremendously since I started working here in 1993. I remember an early childhood building, an upper school building, and the lower middle school building, the SAC and the MAC. That’s really all we had. Since that time, and when we actually had two double-wide trailers out in our quadrangle, we’ve built a beautiful Fine Arts Center with over 32,000 square feet dedicated strictly to the arts. We have a library, an information center and a

technology center, as well as the facilities we have built across the street that make up the Oakridge Athletic Complex. In addition, we have built a brand new state-of-the-art kindergarten center. We have a security building and all that comes along with that, and we’ve continued to renovate some of our older spaces. It’s been an exciting, exciting journey.

During your time here, in what roles have you served?

I started here in 1993 and I was an Upper School English teacher and a varsity soccer coach. I taught and coached other classes as well. Early on in my career here, I was the founder and director of the Summer in the Oaks program. For about five years, I was an administrator in our Middle School followed by Assistant Headmaster for four years, Associate Headmaster for four years, and I became the Head of School in 2007.

With all of the physical additions, what have been some other responsibilities that have come with such growth?

In addition to caring for the facilities and constantly making sure that we’re doing excellent things in these facilities, we also believe that our students and our faculty members should give back to the community. We allow the community to come to our campus and use our facilities. Like the police training center down the street, they use our track all the time to do their workouts with their new recruits and so forth. We also like to get our students out in the community and work with Mission Arlington, Tarrant County Food Bank, Lighthouse for the Blind, etc. We think it’s important for our students to realize how fortunate they are and to help those who are in great need.

At a time when we have more college prep-style schools, charter schools, etc., what do you think keeps Oakridge competitive in today’s changing world?

Well, the educational landscape has changed dramatically since 1979. There are so many choices and options. So, one of the things

about Oakridge and about our mindset here is that we just can't be complacent. If we're going to provide a top notch education for our students and help them to get what they want, a great college education and a promising life and career after college, we have to continue to provide excellence in the areas of academics, arts, and athletics. One way we've done that is to think about the skills that our students are going to need to have to compete in college and beyond. Most recently, we have spent great amounts of time and resources dedicated to helping our kids to become great communicators. We want them to be collaborators. We want our students to be able to solve problems and think critically and we also want them to be creative thinkers. So, doing those things and putting that at the forefront of our decision making helps us to design our curriculum and our Oakridge experience.

For those who might not know anything about Oakridge and what we mean when we say we are family, describe the unique sense of connectedness here.

To me, the Oakridge family is about relationships. The family is just about the people in this community who developed strong bonds with one another. Our community is made up of students, it's made up of faculty and staff, it's made up of alumni, and grandparents, and aunts and uncles, as well as other partners we have in our community who work with our students and we work with them. This Oakridge family that we have is about taking care of one another. It's about looking out for one another, supporting one another, encouraging, being there during good times and bad. One way that that can happen here at the school

is that we have preschool through grade 12. A child can enter here when he or she is three-years-old and go 15 years to graduation as a high school senior. The neat thing is after they graduate and go off to college, they always come back.

Talk more about family. What has it meant to be a parent while serving at Oakridge?

Again, I'm a really blessed person. I started working at the school when I was 29-years-old. My first year here I got married and several years after that Kristi and I had our first son, Cole. Not long after that we had our second son, Cade. While I've been here 26 years, each one of my boys entered this school as preschool students and now they've both graduated.

You've talked about Oakridge helping children become the best version of themselves. Instrumental to that are the teachers in their lives. What did you look for when hiring faculty and staff?

Number one, we want to hire happy, passionate, interesting people. You know, those who will have a great impact on the young people they teach, guide, and lead. It's a given that we want those who are masters of their content area.

But really what we're trying to find out in our interview process is this: is this a quality human being who moms and dads would want in front of their child either part of the day or all day long.

What do you think your legacy will be?

When I'm asked about legacy, I really think about Andy Broadus and the impact that he's had on me and on the school. I've learned so much. He's taught me so many things. When it comes to caring for the school, we've learned that we should always strive for excellence, that we should never be complacent, and that we should treat everyone well. Relationship building and education go hand-in-hand. If we're going to continue to be a strong Oakridge, we really need to have a school where all students and faculty members are valued, people are allowed to be individuals, and understand that education won't look the same for every student. Everyone wants the same thing – they want a quality education, a college education, and a good life. We're fortunate here that we work with families who love children and value education just like we do.

MOMENTS THAT MATTERED

We asked some special members of the Oakridge family, past and present, to reflect on their time with Jon Kellam.

I first met Jon Kellam when he came to Oakridge as a teacher and coach. Through the years he has served the school in several positions. One you may not know about is an architect and construction supervisor. When The Oakridge School received a generous gift from the Quinn Family to update the original Early Childhood Center building and build The Quinn Kindergarten Building, Jon and I became the "project managers!"

Over spring break in 2010, we began the updates on the Early Childhood Center. We worked together with a small construction team knocking down walls, redesigning the office area, constructing a super playground structure, enlarging the playground, building new fences, installing new countertops in the classrooms and much more. Jon was there on a daily basis to see the project completed on time.

We then began meeting with the architects on The Quinn Kindergarten Building. During these months I saw a man dedicated to the true mission and vision of the school. I have seen evidence of this so many times. He has always been a leader that walks with others to lend a hand. I observed this recently at his retirement celebration at Oakridge. As the crowd was leaving and the crew was cleaning up, Mr. Kellam was folding chairs and stacking them on racks. I am sure the future will provide many more hats for Jon to wear creating more memorable moments!

Jon's collaborative approach dates back to his St. Louis youth when he often leaned into support his mom and siblings. When he joined Oakridge's faculty class of 1993 – the school's 15th anniversary year – Kristi readily joined him and soon their two sons. Meanwhile, Jon rose through the ranks as an outgoing personality who dared to ask questions like, "How can we be a school not just of today, but tomorrow, too?"

Determined and detail-oriented, Jon helped shape a litany of Oakridge experiences, ranging from a beautiful arcadian campus grounds and gardens, up to that moment of rarified oration at the close of the show. What a privilege it has been to collaborate with such a multi-faceted leader.







MAKING SENSE OF FINANCIAL LITERACY


Financial Literacy. Two small words with large implications! A seminar taught this year by Upper School Math Teacher, Mrs. Melanie Hartsell, exposed students to real world learning about personal finance and how math and money affect our lives and world economy.

“Because of the seminar, my students better understand how to manage their money and are better equipped to make good financial decisions,” said Mrs. Hartsell. The students completed three modules and became certified in Financial Literacy (personal finance - budgeting, credit cards, home mortgages, employment, insurance, taxes, banking, college, etc.), Marketplaces, and Data Science, which Hartsell called a hot career field right now.



Freshman Aadit Mehta said, overall, he learned valuable information that he previously hadn't considered. “We learned about the differences in credit and debit, loans, marketing, insurance policies, and so much more. I have chosen to take a job in data analysis this summer and I feel this seminar helped me.”

According to Forbes, a widely cited study by Standard and Poor's in 2016 found that only 57 percent of adults in the United States are financially literate, meaning they understand three out of four fundamental concepts for financial decision-making.



During one of their classes, a guest speaker discussed data science as a future college degree and career. Sophomore Marco LaRovere said the seminar helped him better understand and develop skills that aren't commonly taught in school.

“The essential skills have prepared me for the future and placed a variety of tools under my belt,” he added. “I've learned how to file taxes, complete W-4 and W-2 forms, insurance, economics, credit, banking, and many more basic finance skills. This class has definitely made me feel more prepared for the future and I'm grateful for the opportunity.” LaRovere landed an internship with a data scientist in the northeast and said he never would have been introduced to this field without the seminar.



SPELLING SKILLS PUT TO THE TEST



With the correct spelling of “desperate,” seventh grade student, Coco Blackwell, became the champion of the Oakridge Spelling Bee in January. Her victory came just under an hour after the competition began with the word “caverns.” In all, 15 Lower and Middle School students competed. EXPLORING THE WETLANDS

Students at the Early Childhood Center enjoyed exploring the Wetlands right outside of their school. This year, they saw dragon flies in the damp grassy area near the buildings, butterflies, anoles, skinks, and Texas spiny lizards. "They love the crunchy sound and feeling of stepping on acorns and pecans as they cross the wooden bridge and the carpet-like thick layer of leaves," said Vickie Reed, ECC Teacher. Master roboteers, Eshan Singhal and Matthew Hwang, ready the machine for eight performance trials. OakDemo-3 must carefully navigate around a meticulously designed field avoiding blocks and trees as she completes the challenges set by the BEST Robotics organization.

The timer starts. The machine lurches. A building is handily demolished. The remnant materials are lifted, transported and balanced on a trailer. Robotics team members and spectators watch in anticipation as Tanish Kothapalle's "Light Pole Installation Apparatus" is put to the test. "Awesome!" "It worked!" "Perfect!" Three light poles are flawlessly set around the field. Wait. "OH, NO!" A miscalculation has set the stage for the now rogue OakDemo-3 to drag a pipe bundle past the boundaries of the playing field. The test of her autonomous abilities ends with a PENALTY! Regroup. Grab the bundle, "Go!" Eight trials later and the results are an Oakridge School

record beating score. (Note: Also a Martin High School beating score).

The 2021 BEST Robotics DemoDaze Competition was held November 6. The Oakridge School's Robotics Team competed in the BEST Classroom 2021 portion of the event. In this section of the event, the team's efforts were broadcast virtually to the judges for scoring. Game day brought an end to a six-week endeavor that began September 11, 2021.

In addition to the physical robot development and performance, the competition included engineering and marketing components. The entire process was memorialized and published in an Engineering Notebook. The finance, cost, application and marketing of the robot's capabilities were documented and presented to the Best Robotics Judges.





She is currently working with brain and breast cancer cell lines to see if packaging the drug in liposomal nanoparticles will penetrate the tumor better than normal tissues, resulting in selective delivery of encapsulated drugs to primarily cancer cells. 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
