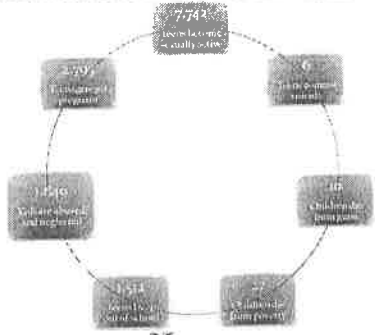

Don't tell anyone, but this is the smartest class, Mr. Ashby has ever had.

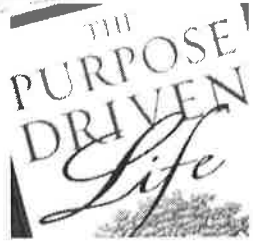

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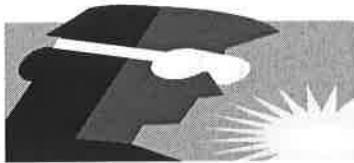

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So What's a Paradigm?

A paradigm is the way you see something, your point of view, frame of reference, or beliefs.



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Habit 1

Be Proactive

- **Paradigm:** I am responsible for my behavior and the choices I make.



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- **Definition:** Take responsibility for your life.

Habit 2

Begin with the end in mind.

- **Paradigm:** I visualize results



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- **Definition:** Define your mission and goals in life.

The ANT is a wonderful example of a creature that is totally goal oriented and does not let setbacks deter it from its goal. They:

1. Know what they want and know where they are going.
2. Are persistent and never give up.
3. Set goals.
4. Plan.
5. Think about tomorrow rather than just thinking about today (grasshoppers think summer all summer, while ants think winter all summer).
6. Work hard.
7. Work Smart.
8. Choose to keep going until they get what they want or die.

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Habit 3

Put first things first.
