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
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Message from the News Committee



The Gavle Goat

The Gavle Goat

In northern European countries, a goat would be a symbol of Christmas. It is known as the Yule goat. This goat would help deliver presents and Santa would sometimes ride on one instead of a sleigh. So in 1966, the town of Gavle decided to put up a big, straw Yule goat for Christmas. However the goat was burned down on New Year's Eve. It has become a tradition for the goat to be put up every year. Unfortunately, most years it has also been burned down. To protect the goat the town has put up security cameras and stationed guards around the goat. It would also be sprayed with water and flameproof chemicals. Sadly, this hasn't been very effective. One year, hackers hacked the cameras and then burned down the goat. The Yule goat is an amazing tourist attraction around this time of year. The fact that it has been burnt most years probably attracts more visitors. Some people even bet on how long it will last. Luckily the goat hasn't been set on fire since 2016 so there is a chance that it won't burn this year.

Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is a North American holiday celebrated on the fourth Thursday in November. On Thanksgiving everyone gets a day off and families gather to eat a magnificent meal while saying what they're thankful for. Thanksgiving is thought to have originated from a meal between Europeans and Native Americans. In 1620, a boat called the Mayflower brought mainly English people to Massachusetts. The people on board were known as Pilgrims. The Native Americans who they shared the meal with were called the Wampanoag tribe. It is unknown what they had in that meal but modern Thanksgiving dinners would usually include stuffing, mashed potato, cranberry sauce and pumpkin pie. Like Christmas dinners, a turkey would normally be the main part of the meal. Thanksgiving is now a widely known holiday and is celebrated by the USA, Canada, St Lucia, Grenada and even Liberia. It's a day for gratitude and a day to appreciate what we have.

Kwanzaa

Kwanzaa is an African American celebration which is celebrated annually between the 26th of December and the 1st of January. It was created by Dr. Maulana Karenga in 1966 to celebrate African culture in America. This would not be celebrated in Africa nor is it a religious celebration. There are seven principles of Kwanzaa: unite, self-determination, collective work and responsibility, cooperative economics, purpose, creativity, and faith. These principles are represented by candles of the colours red (self-determination, cooperative economics, collective work and responsibility), green (purpose, creativity, faith) and black (unity). One candle would be lit every day. Red, green and black were the colours of the flag of the African liberation movement. This was the movement of African independence which took place between 1957 and 1993. Nearly 50 African states achieved independence during the period. Some other traditions on Kwanzaa would include gift giving, a banquet on the 31st of December and reflecting on the principle of the day. The last day of Kwanzaa is called the day of meditation. Participants would ask themselves three questions: Who am I? Am I who I say I am? Am I who I ought to be?

Hanukkah

Hanukkah, also known as the Festival of Lights, in a Jewish celebration Kislev 25 (Around

December). It is celebrated for 8 days, and each day Jewish people light a candle in the Second Temple of Jerusalem. Hanukkah celebrates the Maccabean victories over the forces of the King Antiochus IV Epiphanes. They were the first Jewish people to fight for their religion instead of their lives. According to I Maccabeans, Antiochus had invaded Judea, tried to Hellenize the Jews and destroyed the Second Temple. The most important of all Hanukkah traditions is the lighting of the menorah each evening. Also known as the Hanukkah lamp, the menorah is the Temple lamp stand with eight branches plus a holder for the shammash ("servant") candle that is used to light the other eight candles. One candle is lit on the first evening, and an additional candle is lit on each subsequent evening until eight candles are burning on the last evening. Olive oil was traditionally used for lighting the menorah, but it was replaced by candles, which are inserted in the menorah each night of the festival from right to left but are lit from left to right. A blessing is also offered while the candles are lit each night. The menorah was originally kindled outside the home, but it was brought inside in ancient times to guard against offending neighbours.

The Yule Lads

In the 13 days leading to Christmas, 13 troll-like people visit kids in Iceland. They are known as the Yule Lads. Every night kids leave their best shoes outside, and various Yule Lads leave gifts for nice kids and rotten potatoes for



the naughty kids, Their names are:
Stekkjastaur | Sheep Cote Clod.
Giljagaur | Gully Gawk.
Stufur | Stubby.
Thvorusleikir | Spoon-Licker.
Pottaskefill | Pot-Scraper.
Askasleikir | Bowl-Licker.

Skyrgamur | Skyr-Gobbler.

Toronto Lights

In Toronto the annual Cavalcade of Lights marks the official start to the holiday season. The first Cavalcade took place in 1967 to show Toronto's newly constructed City Hall and Nathan Phillips Square. The Square and Christmas tree are illuminated by more than 300,000 energy-efficient LED lights that shine from dusk until 11 pm until the New Year. On top of that, you'll get to witness spectacular fireworks shows and engage in some outdoor ice skating.



- Break the pretzel into smaller pieces and put them onto the sides of the marshmallows for the arms.



The KGs enjoyed a sea-themed Lego STEAM challenge and had great fun creating a hermit crab from Lego blocks, pipe cleaners and other recycled bits. In the run up to Christmas, both KG classes and J1 students are looking forward to their Christmas themed mini STEAM challenge!

Block based coding in Scratch Junior

Both J2 classes have been working on mastering basic coding principles in Scratch Junior, using the wonderful picture book "Don't Worry Little Crab" as a stimulus to code their animations. The girls have been very creative with their Scratch Junior animations and will continue to work on this theme after Christmas.

Block based coding using the EdScratch App and the Edison robot

J3 and J4 students have been seeing the effects of their code on a little orange robotic device called Edison. They have been working hard to get to know how Edison works - which requires a lot of problem solving and team skills! At the moment, they have been focused on coding the features of a variety of 2D shapes, working from a structured coding environment towards a more loan from DCU as part of a project. exploratory one as their skills develop.










Interactive coding using the block based coding environment "Scratch" and a printed circuit board

J6 students are incorporating the coding skills learned in coding class with Mr. LaCumber with the Makey Makey, a printed circuit board that allows the girls to create interactive art pieces. The Makey Makey works by creating a simple circuit. An alligator clip is attached to an object (in this case, the student's artwork). When the students touch their graphite drawings, the computer thinks you're pressing the keyboard. By mimicking a keyboard and mouse the Makey Makey lets the students control any computer program with everyday objects.

Cycling workshops



On the 5th and 11th of November, J5R and J5W both did cycling workshops, as part of the Travel Flag for our Green Schools programme. These were facilitated by Laura, our Green Schools Travel Officer and her colleague, Sarah.

Laura, who showed us how to perform a safety check on our bikes, taught us how to turn right in traffic and how to cycle

safely beside another cyclist. We also played some cycling games to test our stability and balance.

Before she left, Laura kindly gave us some safety equipment, including hi-vis jackets, bells and bicycle lights. J5 will now be cycling to school with confidence on our Walk on Wednesdays!





Gingerbread Cookies

Ingredients

100g salted butter 3 tbsp golden syrup 100g dark muscovado sugar ½ tsp bicarbonate of soda 1 tbsp ground ginger 1 tsp ground cinnamon 225g plain flour.

Recipe

Heat the butter, syrup and sugar together in a small pan until melted (make sure not to touch the mixture as it gets very hot.) Once done, let cool for a bit.

Step 2

Mix together the bicarbonate of soda, ginger, cinnamon and flour in a large bowl. Pour in the buttery syrup mixture and stir to combine, then use your hands to bring together to form a dough. The dough will be soft at this point, but it'll firm up in the fridge.

Step 3

Put the dough on a sheet of baking parchment, shape into a rectangle, and lay another sheet of parchment on top of it. Roll the dough out to a thickness of about ½ cm. Transfer to a baking sheet to keep it flat, leaving the parchment in place, then chill in the fridge for around 30 minutes.

Icing

50g icing sugar ½ tbsp water

Step 4

Heat the oven to 190c / 170c fan, and line a large baking sheet with more baking parchment. Remove the dough from the fridge and cut out shapes using a cookie cutter. I used a circle cut out, but you can use any shape.

Step 5

Place the shapes, spread apart, on the lined baking sheet, and bake for 10 -12 mins. (Depending on the size of the cutters you use, they might need a few minutes more or less cooking in the oven). Leave to cool completely on the baking sheet.

Step 6

Meanwhile, mix the icing sugar with ½ tbsp water, you want to create a consistency that's thick and pipeable, and not too thin or it will run. Decorate the cooled biscuits with the icing using a piping bag with a thin nozzle. (If you do not have a piping bag you can get a plastic bag and cut a small hole in the corner.)

And finally, enjoy!

For the chocolate marquise:

150g of egg white 80g of yolk 85g of sugar 68g of butter 145g of dark chocolate Oven preheated at 180 degrees

Procedure:

- Beat the egg whites and half of the sugar
- In another bowl, beat the rest of the sugar with the yolks
- Melt the butter and chocolate in the microwave and mix them every 30 seconds until they melt
- Mix the yolks and the chocolate and butter together when the chocolate and butter have reached 30 degrees.
- Start beating them together, then take some of the dough and mix it to the egg whites
- Then add the rest of the dough and mix slowly
- Spread the dough on baking paper and put it in the oven for 15-18 minutes

For the cream:

300g of whipped cream 40g of yolk 200g of milk 40g of sugar 15g of cornstarch 7g of gelatin sheets

Procedure:

Vanilla essence

- First put a bowl in the freezer to make it cold
- Put the gelatin sheets in cold water
- In a pot, put the vanilla and milk and leave it until it starts boiling
- Meanwhile, in another pot, put the sugar, the yolks and the cornstarch and mix with a whisk
- When the milk starts boiling put 1/3 of the milk in the other pot and mix
- Pour in the rest of the milk, put the pot back on the stove and keep mixing for a few minutes until the cream becomes dense
- Take the pot off the stove and mix energetically, until it looks shiny
- Take the bowl out of the freezer and pour the cream inside it
- Add the gelatin sheets and mix it until they melt
- When the cream isn't hot anymore put it in the fridge
- Meanwhile half-whip the cream and when it's ready take the cream out of the fridge and pour 1/3 of the whipped cream in the cream
- Then pour the rest of the whipped cream, mix them and put it in the fridge You can add raspberry or strawberry jam if you like!

For the chocolate ganache:

200g of dark chocolate 180g of whipped cream

Procedure

- Pour the cream in a pot and wait until it boils
- As soon as it boils take it off the stove
- Add the dark chocolate and mix with a whisk until it becomes a smooth cream

Putting it together:

- On the marquise spread the the jam and cream
- Roll up the marquise and cover it with cling film
- Put it in the fridge and leave it for 2-3 hours
- Take off the cling film and cover the log with the rest of the ganache

(hocolate Cookies

Ingredients

120g butter, softened
75g light brown sugar
75g golden caster sugar
1 egg
1 tsp vanilla extract
180g plain flour
½ tsp bicarbonate of soda
¼ tsp of salt
You need 150g of whatever chocolate chip
you would like
Method

STEP 1

Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4 and line two baking trays with parchment paper. Cream the butter and sugars together until very light and fluffy, then beat in the egg and vanilla. Once combined, stir in the flour, bicarbonate of soda, chocolate and ¼ tsp salt.

STEP 2

Scoop 10 large the best of the mixture onto the trays, leaving enough space between each to allow for spreading. Bake for 10-12 mins or until firm at the edges but still soft in the middle – they will harden a little as they cool. Leave to cool on the tray for a few minutes before decorating.







DECORATION

Ingredients

Milk chocolate A bag of hard pretzels Dark chocolate chips Red M&Ms

Decoration

- Cut the pretzels in half.
- Melt the milk chocolate in a glass bowl with boiling water in a pot underneath it on a stove.
- Dip half of the cookie in the melted chocolate and put the dark chocolate chips as eyes and the red M&Ms as a nose.
- Then put half of a pretzel on each side of the cookie and let them set. Enjoy!



Peppermint Balls

Ingredients

227g heavy whipping cream 454g semi-sweet chocolate, finely chopped 78g unsalted butter, at room temperature 1 teaspoon peppermint extract

For the chocolate coating:

226g milk chocolate Some crushed up candy canes for on top

Method

- In a small saucepan over low heat, heat the cream just until it comes to a boil
- Immediately remove cream from heat and add in chopped chocolate
- Allow the mixture to sit, untouched, for two minutes, then whisk smooth
- Stir in the butter and peppermint extract and vigorously whisk until smooth and shiny.
- Pour the mixture into a medium bowl and cool to room temperature
- Tightly cover the bowl with plastic wrap and refrigerate for 2 hours, or until firm enough to scoop.

For the chocolate coating:

Microwavable method

- Place your chocolate in a glass bowl, broken up into small chunks
- Put it into the microwave, in thirty second intervals
- Between intervals, make sure to stir your chocolate

Boiling method

- Get a medium sized saucepan and fill it one third full with water
- · Place that on the hob and wait for it to boil
- While that is boiling, break you chocolate into pieces and put them into a glass bowl
- Once the water has started boiling, place the bowl into the pan, so it's not touching the water
- Wait for it to melt, whilst stirring continuously
- Before you start, make sure you have enough room in your fridge for both baking sheets. The truffles must chill before being dipped in the chocolate
- Line two large baking sheets with parchment paper and set them aside.
- Measure 2 teaspoons of the truffle filling and quickly roll it between your hands to form a ball.
- Transfer to the prepared baking sheet, and repeat with all truffles. Refrigerate the rolled truffles for at least 15 minutes before dipping in the chocolate.
- Remove the chilled truffles from the fridge and begin dipping them into the chocolate using a small spoon or fork. Transfer the dipped truffles back onto the baking sheets and sprinkle with crushed candy
- Allow truffles to sit at room temperature until set, about 1 hour.

Cake Pops

Ingredients

200g golden caster sugar 200g unsalted butter, softened plus extra for the tins 4 large eggs

200g self-raising flour 2 tbsp cocoa powder

1 tsp baking powder

½ tsp vanilla extract

2 tbsp milk

White chocolate Big Oreos Mini Oreos Sprinkle

STEP 1

Heat oven to 190C/170C fan/gas 5. Butter the base and sides of two 20cm round tins and line the bases with baking parchment.

STEP 2

In a large bowl, beat together 200g golden caster sugar, 200g softened unsalted butter, 4 large eggs, 200g self-raising flour, 2 tbsp cocoa powder, 1 tsp baking powder, ½ tsp vanilla extract, 2 tbsp milk and a pinch of salt until pale.

Divide the mixture between the prepared tins. Bake for 20 mins or until a skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean.

Leave to cool in the tin for 3-5 mins.

STEP 5

Wash your hands!

Once the cake is not too hot to touch, start to mash it



up, until it forms a dough. You have to do this while it is hot, or else it will not stick together and form a dough.

STEP 7

After you have formed the dough, start to roll them into little balls. They should be about as big as a golf

STEP 8

After you have made all the balls, put them in the freezer and let them harden for about 10-15 minutes.

STEP 9

While the cake pops are hardening, melt your white chocolate. It will be easiest to dip them if you do it in a microwave safe jug, but if you don't have a microwave, you can use a double broiler.

After the cake pops have hardened, you are ready to dip them into the chocolate. Make sure they are fully coated, and let the excess drip for a minute before doing the next one. If you have an old shoebox, you can poke holes in it to stand them up, but if not you can just put them on a plate.

Then, after you've dipped, you can put decorations of your choice. I put Oreos and sprinkles to make them look like snowmen.

STEP 12

Put them in the fridge to let the chocolate harden.

STEP 13

Dig in!

These cake pops are so tasty and Christmassy and I really recommend you make them!

Meg's Hot Chocolate Sticks

Servings: 12

When it comes to hot chocolate sticks, the possibilities are literally endless. Think of all the flavour combinations or toppings you could use! These hot chocolate stirrers are the most perfect homemade Christmas gift EVER!



Ingredients

- Flavourless oil (such as sunflower or vegetable), for greasing
- 500g (10.5 oz) milk chocolate pieces
- 3 tablespoons Cadbury hot chocolate powder
- · 200ml pouring cream
- · Mini marshmallows to decorate



Directions

You will need:

pastry brush, mini muffin tray or 12 empty 47g Fromage Frais pots (washed and dried), wooden lolly sticks

- I. Dip the pastry brush in the sunflower oil and paint a very thin layer of oil over the insides of the Fromage Frais pots/mini muffin tray.
- 2. Put the chocolate in a bowl and heat in the microwave in 30-sec bursts until runny, stirring after each blast. Or melt it in a heatproof bowl set over a pan of simmering water (get an adult to help you).
- Warm cream in pot just before boiling point add to hot chocolate mix.
- 4. Stir and add to the melted chocolate, mix together.
- Carefully pour the melted chocolate into the pots. Set for 5 mins in the fridge.
- Remove from fridge, add the marshmallows and the spoon then let set for further 2 hours.
- 7. These will easily last for 2 3 weeks once wrapped.



The Girl who saved Christmas


Setting:


