Stay safe over the Christmas break and have a wonderful time with your friends and families. I hope Santa Claus is very good to all of you because you have been great girls this term.



1. How is Covid-19 effecting your music lessons?

What are you looking forward to in 2021?



Can you tell us anything about yourself?





What do I like best about CodeClub?


I love Code Club because we make fun stories. I like Makerspace too because I had so much fun making the games.







Exercise in Cold Conditions

INSIDE GREEN-SCHOOLS

The Green-Schools Committee has been working hard on our travel flag. We carried out a survey about how everyone came to school. The results were that most people drove (58.3%), while only 16.1% of people walked. 8.3% of people cycled and 4.1% scooted. We would like to decrease the number of people driving and suggest that they walk, if they can, instead. If people live far away, they could try park and stride (park and stride means driving part of the way and walking the rest of the way.) Even one day a week could make a big difference.

The Green-Schools Committee did environmental reviews of the front and back entrances, to check if it safe for children to walk to school and to see if we could make them safer. At the back entrance, we think a pedestrian crossing at Temple Road and increased lighting would be helpful. At the front entrance, we found that the area was well-lit, with speed bumps and pedestrian crossings, but we recommend some signage to remind cars that pedestrians may cross the car entrance.

Brioche Christmas Trees

Making brioche might seem daunting, but it's actually quite easy! They do take a long time, but very little of that is actual work. It's also easy to customise this recipe for any brioche - just omit the food colouring, add any extra flavourings, shape however you please, and there you go!

Ingredients:

Two cups flour
100 grams butter, melted
A third of a cup milk
Two eggs
Two tablespoons honey
1 teaspoon yeast
A couple of drops of green food colouring.

Method:

Combine the yeast and flour in a largish bowl. In a separate one, mix honey, eggs, milk and melted butter together, and add to the larger bowl.

Mix vigorously till well combined. Cover with

a cloth, and leave to rise for 2-3 hours in a warm place. Brioche needs longer proofing time, as things like butter slow the rise.

Remove the cloth and place in the fridge overnight, or for up to forty-eight hours. Unfortunately, this cannot be shortened.

Take the dough out of the fridge and add the green food colouring. Knead until it is fairly well incorporated, adding more colour if necessary. It's probably best not to do this if you are doing something that involves your hands being seen later - mine had green marks for several days later.

Cut into Christmas tree shapes - I used a biscuit cover.

Leave to rise for 2-3 hours again, preheating the oven to 190 degrees.

Cook for about fifteen minutes, or until golden brown.

This festive recipe (from the BBC Good Food website, a helpful resource if you want recipes) is easy and simple, while very fun to do, particularly with the decorating! This makes a lot of icing and biscuits, so you can easily half it, if you wish.

Ingredients:

250g unsalted butter
200g dark muscovado sugar
7 tbsp golden syrup
600g plain flour
2 tsp bicarbonate of soda
4 tsp ground ginger (You can customise this as you wish, though start with this and go up gradually if you want it more gingery)

Royal icing:

400 grams icing sugar (if you don't have it, you can grind up normal sugar to a powder in a blender)

Two egg whites

Method:

Melt butter, gingerbread, muscovado sugar and golden syrup in a large saucepan over low heat. Be careful! This will be hot, and supervision may be needed.

Mix together flour, bicarbonate of soda and ginger

Combine both mixtures into a stiff dough, and knead for a few minutes.


Roll out in sections, cutting them out into whatever shapes you please.

Cook for about twelve minutes, till darker and firmer on the edges, and leave to cool.

For the icing, pour the egg-whites into a bowl, and add the icing-sugar gradually, till you have reached the right consistency.

Now, you can decorate as you please! This could make a fun family project if you wish!





6. A Christmas Story is Ralphie and his family finding ways to celebrate Christmas (and sometimes ruin it). I would recommend this for ages 10+.


5. A Christmas Carol is a remake of the beloved Dicken's tale about an old man who hates Christmas. I would recommend this for ages 9+.


One Starry Night



