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Back to school in COVID times

We are all so excited to be at school, although there are some rules we need to follow. COVID has changed the lives of many and we are very fortunate to be at school.

Pods: this is one of the biggest changes to our school day. In each class, the students are split up into groups of 4, 5 or 6 depending on how many children are in the class. These are called pods.

Sanitizing, masks and visors: This is another big change to the school. Sanitizing your hands before every meal, coming in from the yard and after the bathroom is very important. We also sanitize the iMacs and iPads after we use them. The girls in J5 and J6 also sanitise the computers after IT with Mr Lacumber. Masks and visors are only worn by teachers but you are welcome to wear one if you feel more comfortable. But you do have to wear one if you go to a music lesson or any other lesson in the Senior School. The cleaners are also doing extra cleaning while we are outside and in the bathrooms to keep everything clean.

Social distancing: The teachers have a square on the floor around their desk made of black and yellow tape this shows the student where 2 metres would be and to not go past that line. In Jellicoe there is a one-way system where

you must stay left on the stairs and in the corridors. If your classroom is in the Junior School building, Mrs. Lamplugh will greet you and tell you which door you may go through. Parents are not permitted to enter the buildings so that there are fewer people going in and out of the school.

Sharing: Due to Covid-19, for health and safety reasons we cannot share stationary, food and supplies etc. This is why for art we all have separate art packs to prevent sharing.

Assembly: This is very different this year as it is now a Zoom call. Every morning each teacher will enter their class into the meeting. Each class still prepares their own assembly every Friday.

Lunch: The lunch hall is now a little bit different from last year. The times you can eat stagger between classes to ensure social distancing. George and his staff are keeping everything clean and safe. At lunch we are split up at tables within our pods. There is tape around some of the areas to show you where you enter and exit.

Duck, Duck, Goose

KG LOWER-J3

1st Boomba

Boomba is a very fun game once you get the hang of it. All you need is something to pass around and at least five people. One person sits in the middle and the others stand around them. The person in the middle raises their hands slowly while everyone else in the circle passes around the chosen object. When the person in the middle hands reach the top, they clap their hands and whoever has the chosen object has to sit down and put their legs out, then in the next round the person who was passing to the person who's sitting down must jump over their legs. The game ends when only one person is standing and they're the winner.

2nd Tag

Tag is a game that never really ends. You can have as little as two people playing it. At the start one chosen person is on or "it". They then try to catch someone else. Once they have caught them, that person is now on and the person who caught them isn't any more. The game never really ends, so it usually takes all of break time.

3rd Duck, Duck, Goose

Duck, Duck, Goose is a very simple game. Everybody sits in a circle and one person stands outside it, that person then walks around the circle while tapping each person on the head and saying "Duck" as they do. Then when they choose they say "Goose" instead of "Duck". The person who was tapped gets up and chases the other person. The other person tries to sit in the person's old spot. If they get there the other person has to do the "Duck, Duck, Goose" pattern.

J4 - J6

1st Bulldog

To play bulldog a group of people choose two lines or walls to mark the ends. One person is on. Everyone else stands at one of the ends. The person who is on calls "Bulldog, bulldog I call..." and calls another person who is playing's name, that person then says "Open gates" and everyone runs to the other end. If the person that is on catches anyone, that person or people join the team of the person who is "on". The game ends when one person is still not caught and they win.

2nd Ultimate Tag

Unlike the original game of tag, this version can end. Everyone is on in this version, when you catch someone they sit down. If you get caught, then all the people you caught are up again. If two people catch each other at the same time, then they do "Rock, Paper, Scissors" and whoever loses sits down. The game ends when only one person is left standing, then they win.

3rd Capture the Flag

The group of people playing this must have two small objects or "Flags". They split themselves into teams and each team takes a base on a side of the playing area. Each team gets one of the "Flags" and hides them. Then when both teams agree on when to start, they run over to the other team's side and try to find the other team's "Flag", but if they get caught by the other team, then they have to go back to their base for 20 seconds. If they find the other team's "Flag", then they have to bring it back to their base without being caught. The winning team is the one who gets the opposing team's "Flag".



TEACHER SPOTLIGHT

Emily and Lauren interview Mr. Fitzgerald on life as teacher during a pandemic and a sneak peak into his recent wedding during COVID times.



How are you finding teaching during Covid-19?

It has definitely been challenging and a brand new experience for me, especially when we went online between March and June. I felt that all of the girls coped very well with this last year. It is good to have everyone back in school though.

Since we have come back in August, there have been noticeable changes which have made teaching very different than before Covid. It is difficult when girls cannot move around the classroom for certain lessons and activities like they could before. It is especially tough when the girls cannot share materials.

There is a lot more “Direct Teaching”, with me standing and talking in front of the classroom a lot more. I try to incorporate as many projects and other activities as possible.

It is still important to keep things interesting, but I do miss being able to plan an activity spontaneously, which gets all of the class working together, rather than in Pods or Bubbles. Hopefully those days will return again soon.

Do you like having to wear a face mask all day?

I wouldn't necessarily say that 'I like wearing masks'. It's something that we have to do to protect other people and to keep each other safe. It's difficult sometimes, because girls can't see my facial expressions when I wear it, which are very important when teaching a class. For example, sometimes the girls in my class can't tell if I'm smiling or not if they are telling me about something funny that happened to them.

I have been trying to use the microphone so

that everyone can hear me through my mask. I am getting more and more used to wearing the mask by now though. I forget I'm wearing one during the school day. It is important that we as adults are wearing masks, to show that we are caring for others. Younger people, who will be adults themselves in the future, will see this and know that it is the right thing to do.

What was it like getting married during Covid-19?

It was very different from a traditional wedding. I used to work in a hotel when I was in college, and weddings would have 300 people! Ours had only eight. We had originally hoped we could have our wedding in July, but the restrictions prevented that. We were asked if we wanted to have it in September instead, just in case there were more restrictions, so we both said YES! We had to wear masks to the ceremony but we were allowed to take them off while exchanging our vows and our rings.

My wife, Shannon, is from California in the USA. All of her family were going to come originally, but they couldn't travel to Ireland. I also could only bring a few of my family and friends there. Much less than I would in normal times. While we were sad about this, they still were there virtually and we made it a very special day. Hopefully when we are no longer in a pandemic, we can have a huge party with all of our family in California there. So, in short, yes, it was very different to a 'normal wedding', but it was a very special day which we both really enjoyed. Thank you to all of the Alex girls and staff for all of your lovely wishes to both myself and Shannon.

Do you have a favourite actor?


Yes. Emma Watson is my favourite actress.





Eva and Maddy interview Ms. Brandon about teaching Preschoolers during these challenging times

Do you like teaching the Preschoolers?

I love teaching in the pre-school as no two days are ever the same. Everything is new and exciting to a pre-schooler and it is lovely seeing the world through their eyes and watching how proud they are to learn to do things for themselves. The first preschool class

I had is now in J3 and it is amazing to see how well they transitioned into the Junior School and how independent and confident they have become.

How has teaching Preschoolers changed with Covid-19?

Preschoolers don't really understand about

Covid-19 so I think it is important that we create a safe but lovely environment for them, where the girls and their families feel supported. This year the class is divided into two pods called the ladybirds and the butterflies and the classroom is divided into two areas. These pods allow the girls to learn and play in small groups. The girls also sit in their pods in the canteen and we have found this has been a lovely way for them to make friends and get to know the other girls in their pods. The girls are being taught to wash their hands throughout the day but this is something they have always enjoyed doing!

What is it like on a normal day for the Preschoolers?

This year the Preschoolers have to come into the classroom without their parents which they have been very good about. We always have an activity set up for them when they arrive such as painting, drawing or glueing. On Fridays we watch assembly on Zoom and play in the role play area. Each day after snack and play time we have story and circle time in our pods. This gives the girls a chance to share their own thoughts and experiences and we work on our theme for that week. After lunch in the canteen the girls play outside again. On Wednesday the Preschoolers have ballet and Thursday is playball day.

What COVID restrictions do you have in preschool?

Preschoolers are too young to understand how to social distance which is why they are divided into smaller pods. They stay in their pods in the classroom, canteen and at ballet and playball. They are not allowed to bring toys from home and we can only have things in the classroom which can be cleaned after every use.

How are the Preschoolers finding Covid-19? The Preschoolers have adapted very well to all the changes Covid-19 has brought. They are very aware of hand hygiene and what to do when they cough or sneeze. They are getting used to coming into the classroom without their parents and not bringing toys from home.

Are you going to do anything exciting with the Preschoolers for Halloween?

We are very excited about Halloween in Pre-school Lower. We are decorating our classroom with pumpkins, scary decorations and our Halloween art work and on the last day of school we will come to school in our costumes and sing some Halloween songs. In ballet we are learning a monster dance and we hope to perform Old Mc Donald had a haunted house for the rest of the school.

COOKERY CORNER

FLAVOUR OF THE MONTH

Baking and healthy eating are whole different worlds, aren't they? Baking is fun and delicious. Healthy eating is boring and disgusting.

Or is it? Must it be? What if we could combine the two... And make a delicious and fun, yet healthy combination?

That is what the Cookery Corner is going to try to do, so prepare yourself for this edition's recipes: Muffin Miracles and Apple Flapjacks!

Muffin Miracles

Mmm, muffins. Delicious, flavourful... Wait, what are they doing in a healthy eating section? What if I told you about a miracle, extinct in commercial muffins, but common in home-made ones where tastiness combines itself with healthiness, creating a muffin that somehow contrives (and I'm still trying to work out how this works) to be fluffy and delicious... Yet healthy and wholesome. And, as well as that, they're really easy!



Muffin Miracles

Ingredients:

- One cup of whole-wheat flour
- One cup plain flour
- Half a cup rye flour - if you don't have or don't like rye flour, just swap it for whole wheat.
- One and a half teaspoons of baking powder
- Half a teaspoon of baking soda
- One quarter of a cup honey
- Two eggs
- A cup of buttermilk - if you don't have it, add two tablespoons of vinegar or lemon juice to a cup of normal milk and leave it for five minutes.
- Half a cup flavourless oil - I used sunflower, but you can use whatever you have, or melted butter if you have none

Flavours:

Berry Oat: Around two tablespoons of oats and another two of berries for half the batch. For a full one, about four tablespoons of oats and four of berries.

Carrot Cake: A teaspoon of cinnamon and two tablespoons of grated carrot, or for the whole thing two teaspoons and four tablespoons.

Anything else you can think of! Use your imagination, and dream up wild flavours!

Method:

First, preheat your oven to 180 degrees Celsius. Then, mix together all the flours, the baking soda and the baking powder.

In a separate bowl, combine the eggs, buttermilk and oil. Tip this in and give it a stir, making sure to incorporate all the flour-mixture.

Add the honey and mix it in. If you're using more than one flavour, divide the mixture up. If not, just use the original bowl. Add your flavours, and the batter is done!

Line a twelve-hole cupcake tray and drop a couple of spoonfuls of batter into each case. (I filled mine quite high, so if your's are smaller, you may need another tray). Pop them in the preheated oven and set a timer for fifteen minutes. (Or, if you're doing smaller ones, try ten). When you can stick in a skewer and it comes out clean, they're done!

Apple Flapjacks!

Ingredients:

- 250g oats (mix of jumbo and regular)
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 250g apple puree/applesauce (I used apple and pear)
- 30g butter
- 2-3 Tablespoons honey
- Set an oven to 180 degrees celsius

Method:

Line a 18 by 18 centimetre tin with baking paper
Mix oats and cinnamon together!
Melt butter and honey and mix all ingredients together.
Bake for 20 minutes, and there you have it!




J5 HOCKEY BLITZ

BLEEP TEST

grandparents and cousins.


Starting a new school in sixth class, I was definitely feeling apprehensive but that did not last long because all the girls in my pod and class are so kind and inclusive.
