ENGLISH COURSES

ENGLISH I Course # 08110 Prereq: none Level: 9 Credit: 1.0	The focus of English I is development of language skills in a program through metacognitive literary analysis, problem solving strategies, cooperative learning, and multimedia presentations. Students will read and analyze a wide range of expository and narrative reading materials at their instructional level. General areas of focus include: myths, poetry, short stories, novels, and various works of non-fiction. <i>This course fulfills one of two "Intensive Writing" requirement</i> <i>credits.</i>
ENGLISH II Course # 08120 Prereq: English I Level: 10 Credit: 1.0	English II continues with the goals from English I in emphasizing metacognition as well as print and vocabulary skills. Students continue to develop strategic reading and writing skills while studying works from various genre. <i>This course fulfills one of two "Intensive Writing" requirement credits.</i>
ENGLISH III Course # 08130 Prereq: English II Level: 11 Credit: 1.0	The focus on language development continues in English III. Students continue to apply reading strategies to improve understanding and fluency. General areas of study include: short stories, novels, biographies, Deaf studies, and various works of non-fiction.

Analysis of specific case studies through simulation and community activity familiarizes students with the groups, organizations, issues, and ideas that make up the American political system. Students will explore the causes of different political beliefs and behaviors and the role of interest groups and political parties. For the class of 2020 and beyond, this course will fulfill the Illinois requirement of one semester of civics education, as well as mandated study of the US Constitution and Illinois Constitution.
APPLIED AMERICAN POLITICS Course #08290 Prerreq: None Level: 10,11,12 Credit: 0.5	Students will follow the curriculum of American Politics with a more local focus. SCIENCE COURSES	
APPLIED BIOLOGY Course # 08450 Prereq: none Level: 9, 10 Credit: 1.0	This science course is especially designed for the student who does not have a strong background or vocabulary base in science or scientific concepts. Topics include: introduction to the science laboratory, the scientific method, charts and graphs, measurement and the study of ecosystems, human body systems, and varieties of animals. Class activities are geared toward concrete, active learning situations that are highly visual and can be taught in a hierarchical manner. <i>Curriculum in this course is a modification of the grade level standards but is in alignment with the Illinois Learning Standards</i>
APPLIED EARTH SCIENCE Course # 08460 Prereq: none Level: 9, 10 Credit: 1.0	This science course is especially designed for the student who does not have a strong background in science and scientific concepts and have basic academic skills. Topics include: Introduction to the science laboratory, the scientific method, charts and graphs, measurement and applied earth science, such as the study of energy, geology and meteorology, and space science. Class activities are geared toward concrete, active learning situations that are highly visual and can be taught in a hierarchical manner. <i>Curriculum in this course is a modification of the grade level standards but is in alignment with the</i> <i>Illinois Learning Standards</i>
INTRODUCTION TO EARTH SCIENCE Course # 08410 Prereq: none Level: 9, 10,11 Credit: 1.0	Earth Science is offered for the student who has some previous experience in science and whose language skills are average or better. This course covers the science of the non-living environment. Topics include introduction to the science laboratory, basic geology, weather and its effect on the environment. Students are expected to write lab reports, do library research and read outside materials.
INTRODUCTION TO BIOLOGY Course # 08430 Prereq: none Level: 9, 10, 11 Credit: 1.0	Biology is offered for the student who has some previous experience in science and whose language skills are average or better. It is a study of living things (plants and animals) and how they relate to the environment. Covered in this course are topics such as ecology, evolution, genetics, and the plant and animal kingdoms. Students are expected to write lab reports, do library research and read outside materials. <i>This class will have the option of dual credit through RIT.</i>
COMMUNITY BASED SCIENCE Course #: 08400 Prereq: Coordinator Approval Level: 9, 10,11,12 Credit: 1.0	Students enrolled in this course focus on concepts of science vocabulary, environmental awareness, seasonal awareness, communication, socialization, functional life skills/recreation leisure skills, and applying those concepts to real world opportunities through community experiences This course may be taken multiple times with teacher approval. Curriculum in this course is a modification of the grade level standards but is in alignment with the Illinois Learning Standards

HEALTH EDUCATION Course # 08481

Prereq: none Level: 10 Credit: 0.5

APPLIED HEALTH

Course # 08491 Prereq: none Level: 10 Credit: 0.5 Health, a state-mandated course, is required of all sophomore students. The course covers a number of specific topics including: the positive effects of exercise and the ill-effects of drugs; alcohol and tobacco; first aid; human birth, growth and development; reproductive systems; and sexually transmitted diseases.

This course addresses the practical applications of health related topics listed above for course 08481. *Curriculum in this course is a modification of the grade level standards but is in alignment with the Illinois Learning Standards*

BUSINESS TECHNOLOGY COURSES

Course # 08811 Prereq: none Level: 9, 10, 11, 12 Credit: 0.5

COMPUTER APPLICATIONS

Course # 08831 Prereq: Keyboarding Level: 10, 11, 12 Credit: 0.5 The content is similar to Essential Technologies (BUS 6121). This course is designed to develop and refine correct finger placement techniques to develop speed and accuracy. The student also is introduced to basic word processing functions using Microsoft Word. Formats and features include letters, outlines, reports, columns, tables, résumés, and graphics.

This course will focus on developing basic computer application skills, spreadsheets, and proper use of the internet. Students will work with Microsoft Word, Excel, and Windows to develop the computer skills necessary for basic computer use.

WOODS TECH I

Course # 08751 Preq- none Level- 9,10,11,12 Credit: 0.5

OFFICE SYSTEMS

ART COURSES

ART FOUNDATIONS I & II Course # 08841, #08842 Prereq: none Level: 9, 10, 11, 12 Credit: 0.5 each This course is for DHH students interested in art. Art Foundations or Studio Art are highly recommended for all art courses at the sophomore, junior, and senior level. Students learn basic skills and techniques of drawing, painting, sculpture, printmaking, ceramics and calligraphy. Art appreciation is included through films, slides, the internet and field trips. Sketchbook assignments supplement class work.

DRIVER EDUCATION

COMMUNITY MOBILITY

Course # 00000 Prereq: Teacher Recommendation Level: 10, 11, 12 Credit: 0.5 The curriculum is designed to prepare students for the vocabulary and concepts that relate to driving and navigating the community. The units that will be covered are: car parts, insurance and licensing; traffic signs, signals and roadway markings; speed limit; negotiating intersections; basic car maneuvers; sharing the roadway; bicycle safety; public transportation. At the end of the course students will be given a final exam that covers driving skills, if they receive an 80% or better they can be enrolled in Driver Education. This class is a prerequisite for Driver's Education based on teacher recommendation.

DRIVER EDUCATION

Course # 08611/08612 Prereq: Sophomore, Junior, or Senior class standing Level: 10, 11, 12 Credit:.25 Credit (1 Semester) Fee: \$350 Successful completion of the course is required to obtain a state driver's license prior to the age of 18 years. Driver Education is a multiphase course consisting of 30 classroom hours, up to 6 hours of simulator training, and a minimum of 6 hours of in-car training.

Students must be 15 years of age on or before the class begins.

In addition, Public Act 88-188 requires that a student must have passed at least eight (8) courses in the previous two semesters in order to be eligible to take Driver Education. In other words, if a student fails too many classes, he or she will not be eligible to take Driver Education and will be withdrawn from the class.

Prereq: Coordinator Approval Level: 9,10,11,12 Credit: Variable Students will develop life skills which will allow them to function more independently in the domestic and vocational domains. *This course may be taken multiple times with teacher approval.*

RELATED INSTRUCTION I This course is designed to develop the general work skills that are Course # 08720 applicable to all work environments. The curriculum focuses on helping Prereq: Coordinator Approval students practice and evaluate their skills as an employee. Emphasis Level: 9,10,11, 12 is placed on self-advocacy, entering the world of work, and succeeding Credit: 1.0 as an employee. Deaf role models from the community will be invited to discuss their own personal experiences of transitioning into the world of work. <u>Concurrent enrollment in S.W.T is required</u>. This course may be taken multiple times with teacher approval. **RELATED INSTRUCTION II** This course is individualized to address the work skills needed to the Course # 08730 vocation in which the student is currently working. Attention is also Prereg: Related Instruction I given to the chosen profession of the student. Course content, teaching Level: 11. 12 style, and student assessments are modified to accommodate Credit: 1.0

 Transition Plan outcomes. Individual Transition Portfolios are created to foster independence for post-secondary employment and/or services. Concurrent enrollment in S.W.T. is required. This course may be taken multiple times with teacher approval.

 In-school and community work experiences are available in a variety of settings to teach general work related skills. Students are supervised and evaluated on attainment of employment competencies. Concurrent enrollment in Related Instruction is required. This course may be taken

SUPPORT SERVICES

TUTORIAL Course # 08511/08512 Prereq: None Level: 9, 10, 11, 12 Credit: 0.5

Credit: 0.5

This course provides support to DHH students for their academic courses and progress towards IEP goals. Students receive DHH teacher supervised study time to complete homework and prepare for their mainstreamed and self-contained courses. Student progress and grades in all classes are monitored by the teacher and more directed assistance may be provided. Executive functioning skills such as study strategies, organization skills, time management, and problem solving are addressed and evaluated during this time. Related services as scheduled in a student's IEP can also be accessed during this time. Students receive a Pass/Fail grade. *This course may be taken multiple times with teacher approval.*
