

#### THE ATTENDANCE INITIATIVE

During the 2003-2004 school vear, the School Social Work Department in the Volusia County School District organized a team of district and school level personnel to begin a proactive approach to promoting regular school attendance. The purpose of the team was to collaborate and develop programs and interventions designed to promote the regular school attendance of all children in the district. Traditional approaches to reducing truancy have tended to emphasize the use of consequences to remediate truant behavior, however, according to a report by Dr. George M. Batsche, "the consequence approach has had limited effect. Reducing truancy appears less effective as an approach than increasing attendance."\* Since current research seems to indicate that it is more effective to develop strategies to improve attendance, the committee decided to approach improving school attendance as a goal that could best be achieved by raising awareness of the importance of attending school and by implementing programs that support student efforts and encourage regular school attendance. The ultimate goal of the district is to have all schools achieve an overall student attendance rate of 97%.

The committee set out to identify specific programs and interventions that promote attendance in a positive manner and at the same time provide support and encouragement to those students who struggle with attendance issues. The committee seeks to help schools raise their overall daily attendance rate by consistently making attendance a top priority. The committee continues to encourage schools to identify specific students with attendance problems and implement innovative ways of assisting those students in improving their attendance. Someone once said that "education is the key to success." If this is true, then regular school attendance is the key that unlocks the door to education. If our children are not in school, they not only forfeit their education, they forfeit their chance at a bright and prosperous future.

This booklet outlines the programs and strategies that have been implemented by the District Attendance Committee in its quest to ensure that the future of our children is not compromised. It provides information designed to raise awareness of the importance of regular school attendance. Most importantly, this booklet gives recognition to our students, who through their poems, posters, and video rap/songs serve as an inspiration to their peers in relaying the message that regular school attendance is critical to academic success. We also recognize those schools who have achieved the highest rate of attendance at their respective levels and schools who have distinguished themselves by achieving the greatest percentage of improvement in their attendance rate.

#### **Initiatives Implemented by the Attendance Committee**

- 1. A brochure was created entitled *School Attendance: The Path to Success*, which provides students and parents with information on the benefits of regular school attendance. The brochure is also available to school personnel.
- 2. A brochure was created entitled the *Florida Compulsory School Attendance Law*, which provides parents with an overview of the state's compulsory school attendance law and district expectations regarding school attendance.
- 3. A booklet was created entitled *Achieving Academic Excellence Through Regular School Attendance*, which offers resources to schools, parents, and the community in order to help achieve our goal.
- 4. Attendance Awareness Week has been approved by the district as an annual event. This is a week that has been set aside to emphasize the importance of regular school attendance.
- 5. A poem, poster, and video rap/song contest is sponsored to give students the opportunity to express to their peers the importance of school attendance.
- 6. Schools with the highest rate of attendance in each category (elementary, middle, and high school levels, and alternative education) are recognized for their achievement each semester.
- 7. The district implemented the Superintendent's Attendance Challenge which involves schools challenging the attendance improvement of other schools or by competing against their own attendance rate. The object of the competition is to see which school can gain the greatest percentage of improvement in their overall attendance rate during a specified period of time. The top winners receive a cash award.
- 8. The Shirley H. Lee Community Support for School Attendance Award is presented to a nominated individual that has exhibited exemplary personal commitment to providing support and motivation in the promotion of regular school attendance.
- 9. An agreement with the DeLand Police Department was implemented whereby truant students will be picked up and transported to their zone school during school hours.
- 10. An agreement was reached with the local Teen Court Administrators to provide services to students with poor attendance. Teen Court is a nationwide program whereby adolescents judge their peers who have been accused of minor delinquent offenses. The program sanctions students, as well as provides them with the opportunity to receive tutoring, counseling, and other services.
- 11. There is a collaborative agreement between the Volusia County School District and the Office of the State Attorney called Achieving School Attendance Program (ASAP). Schools make attempts to meet with parents of children who are chronically absent. If these attempts are unsuccessful, a letter from the state attorney's office is sent to parents requiring their immediate cooperation with the school.

- 12. The Attendance Committee meets on a regular basis to explore new and innovative ways to promote the regular school attendance of all children.
- 13. During the 2007-08 school year, four schools agreed to pilot the implementation of a number of attendance initiatives in order to examine the effectiveness of these interventions.
- 14. The "Everybody Everyday" Prize Patrol was implemented to recognize winners in the Attendance Poem, Poster, and video Rap/Song Contest.

# Maintaining Exceptional Attendance... What Makes the Difference

Many factors have had an impact on our school achieving such a high level of attendance. To put it quite simply, we cannot teach the students if they are not in school, so we do all that we can to encourage regular attendance. Listed below are examples of strategies that we use to promote exceptional attendance:

- > Administrators and/or identified staff members greet students and parents each morning and afternoon at our student drop-off area.
- Guidance Counselors discuss attendance laws with students at the beginning of the school year, emphasizing how attendance can affect future driving privileges.
- Teachers notify guidance counselors if there is an attendance concern with a student.
- > Lissette Fernandez, School Social Worker, makes home visits when necessary.
- When a student misses 5 days of school (as well as 10 days), the attendance clerk notifies the grade-level guidance counselor. The counselor then meets with the student and calls their parent/guardian.
- When a student misses 15 days of school, a Student Success Team Meeting is scheduled, and the parents/guardians are invited to attend. After the meeting, Ms. Fernandez monitors the student's attendance weekly.
- Improved communication between home and school helps to attain high attendance rates (Parent Portal, WebGrade, agenda planners, Active Classroom, School Notes, e-mail, etc.)
- > Students are encouraged to participate in the Attendance Awareness Week each year. Announcements are made each morning of this week, explaining the importance of regular school attendance.
- We recognize and participate in the Poem, Poster, and Video Rap/Song "Everybody, Everyday" contest.

At Creekside Middle we realize the importance of attending school regularly, and are diligent in our efforts related to student attendance.

# Excellence in Attendance... How to Achieve it

The entire Spruce Creek High School family is once again honored to receive recognition for having the highest high school attendance rate in the district. Spruce Creek is fortunate to have students, families and staff that understand the importance of regular attendance. Parental support, along with the dedicated efforts of teachers and staff, has made it possible for Spruce Creek to routinely have attendance rates exceeding 95%.

Many strategies have been implemented to encourage good attendance, but the single most important factor is maintaining an academic atmosphere in which students understand that meaningful teaching and learning takes place everyday. It is not a coincidence that the school with the highest attendance rate also boosts FCAT, SAT and ACT scores that exceeds the district, state, and national averages. Students understand that attendance and academic performance are inexorably connected. Everyone at Spruce Creek reinforces this concept, and the results speak for themselves.

One of the strongest reinforcements to student attendance is that Spruce Creek teachers take ownership of the issue and are in frequent communication with parents. While automated calling machines are part of the process, we believe teacher contacts are the most effective way of encouraging good attendance. The guidance staff also makes routine parent contacts and counsel students regarding the benefits of regular attendance.

In addition to these measures, Spruce Creek has an on-line system that allows parents to monitor grades, attendance, and other data from virtually any computer with internet access 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The school's *CreekConnect* system allows parents to check attendance by individual periods each day. We are confident that this electronic tool, along with frequent written reminders in the school newsletter and staff contacts, has helped us reach our attendance goals.

# Good Attendance... The Key to Success

Community Learning Center West is proud to be the recipient of both the Excellence in Attendance Award and the Superintendent's Attendance Challenge Award for Alternative Education Schools for the 2007-2008 school year.

Because we know that academic success is linked to consistent school attendance, CLCW is committed to improving attendance: one student at a time. Our success is a direct result of a cooperative effort between parents, staff, and students.

- Our School Social Worker, Carmen Amoros, is a driving force in our push to improve attendance. She tracks attendance for us, and produces recognition certificates each month for those students with perfect attendance. She has created a bulletin board in our cafeteria dedicated solely to attendance recognition, which she maintains and updates monthly.
- Awards are given to students who have perfect attendance each week. Every Friday, these students are rewarded with a pizza party, ice cream social, or other activity.
- > We use Connect-Ed for daily attendance notification.
- We sponsor monthly Family and Community Education Nights that feature speakers on a variety of topics that are useful to parents. The topic for one of these evenings centers on good attendance, and features a school social worker, guidance counselor, or other district staff person who gives tips for parents and teens to promote good attendance.



# Superintendent's Attendance Challenge Award Winners

2007-2008

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S ATTENDANCE CHALLENGE

"Innovation in improving school attendance" is the new buzz phrase for the Volusia County School District. During the 2005-2006 school year, the district decided that while the daunting task of improving school attendance involves much hard work, there was no reason it could not include some fun in the process. The Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Margaret A. Smith, approved an Attendance Challenge which was opened to every school throughout the district. All schools were encouraged to challenge the attendance improvement of other schools or compete against their own attendance rate during a specified period of time.

Since the beginning of organized education, schools have competed against each other in areas such as sports, academics, performing arts, etc. Such competitions have generated excitement and enthusiasm among students and staff. Winning promotes a sense of satisfaction and pride within the entire school community, and losing encourages more determination to do better the next time. While a contest to improve school attendance does not possess the glitz or glamour of other competitions, it can encourage improvement. The fact that the district had the added incentive of a substantial cash award for the winners made the attendance challenge a more enticing idea. Unlike other competitions in which only a select few students can participate, the Superintendent's Attendance Challenge provides an opportunity for every student to get involved. Many of the schools that entered the contest implemented innovative strategies to encourage their students to attend school, and they closely monitored their student attendance rate. The schools that triumphed were thrilled with their accomplishments, and those that were defeated began planning strategies for the next year's challenge.

The Superintendent's Attendance Challenge began on January 16, 2007 and ended on March 29, 2007. This time period was specifically chosen by the district because of the lower attendance rates that traditionally occur during this time period. A total of 38 schools entered the competition, 8 schools challenged other schools, and 30 challenged their own attendance rate. The schools that won their individual challenge received a small cash award. Schools who achieved the greatest percentage of improvement at the elementary, middle, high, and alternative education levels received cash awards of \$500 for first place and \$125 for second place. The percentage of improvement was calculated by comparing the attendance rate at the end of the previous school year with the attendance rate achieved during the Superintendent's Attendance Challenge, the third, nine-week period.



At Tomoka, attendance awareness activities are multi-faceted. Throughout the year, teachers and staff emphasize the importance of being in school every day. In addition to the routine focus of regular school attendance, the following activities were instrumental in increasing the attendance rate of Tomoka students during the 2007-2008 school year:

- Clear and concise school based procedures were developed for absences and tardies.
- During Attendance Awareness Week and the Superintendent's Challenge contest, identified students presented poems related to the importance of regular school attendance on the Tomoka Today Show. Classes with improved attendance were eligible for a Webkinz drawing and earned a pizza party.
- The school newspaper, "Smoke Signals," was used as a vehicle to inform parents and students about attendance activities.
- Each quarter, students with perfect attendance received attendance award certificates.
- A parent designed a bulletin board in the front office entryway to display the names of students earning quarterly perfect attendance. The bright board was organized by grade level and showcased colorful balloons and happy Tomoka students.
- A bulletin board in the cafeteria was decorated by students and sent a clear message regarding the importance of attending school. Each class responded to the statement "It is important to attend school because..." and these responses were prominently displayed on the bulletin board.
- The school guidance counselor held bi-weekly meetings with students who were experiencing attendance issues.

Tomoka Elementary School promotes a caring school environment whereby students are met each morning with a warm smile and a greeting. Upon entering the school campus, students can count on seeing a friendly face. One of our major goals is to foster an environment that is welcoming and safe for our students. We want students to look forward to coming to school and putting their best efforts into being the best student that they can possibly be.

Sweetwater Elementary's commitment to achieving and maintaining excellent attendance involves initiating daily communication with the parents of students who are absent or tardy. Contact is made by an Office Specialist who either makes a personal call to the parent or by utilizing Connect-Ed. Our involved teachers make phone calls to parents who are habitually late or absent. They reinforce the importance of being in school from the time the bell rings so that students do not miss valuable instruction. We also send out 10-day, 15-day, and 20-day letters to the parents/guardians of those students who are chronically absent or late. Our School Social Worker, Connie Corwin, receives copies of each of these letters, and makes visits to the homes of the most truant students in order to offer assistance to the students and their parents. Our Guidance Counselor, Amy Otto, makes regular interventions with students who are often late or absent. This includes working with the individual student, the teacher, and making phone calls to parents. The mission of Sweetwater Elementary is to strive toward a lifetime of "personal best," guided by a positive attitude in a nurturing environment. We try our best to instill the mission of a "lifetime of personal best" by being at school every day and by being on time.

- ☆ Posters encouraging excellent attendance were placed throughout the school.
- An award system was instituted with FCAT "bucks" for additional encouragement leading up to FCAT testing.
- ☆ A Connect-Ed message was used to encourage attendance for FCAT time.
- ☆ Perfect Attendance awards were provided.

Seabreeze High School is extremely proud for being recognized three consecutive years as a Superintendent's Attendance Challenge winner. As a team, we work very hard to promote good attendance and encourage our faculty and staff to work collaboratively in developing interventions that would improve the attendance and academic success of all. We firmly believe that regular school attendance is critical to our students and that they will truly be "left behind" if they are not here.

Our Student Success Team used the following incentives to help improve attendance: recognized students, teachers, staff, and administration every nine weeks with Perfect Attendance certificates and awarded Most Improved Attendance certificates, doughnuts, pencils, and attendance awards at the end of the school year. School spirit is high at Seabreeze High, and all students are encouraged to participate in school activities and after school events. Last year our Student Success Team was diligent in meeting twice per week to focus on and identify those students having patterns of non-attendance. Our team, Mr. Brian Richardson, SST Chair; Mrs. Jan Sayers, School Social Worker; and Ms. Jacalyn Jones, Assistant Principal, worked together and met with students and parents at school to discuss interventions and strategies to improve attendance. The parents who could not come to school were contacted by phone, mailed letters, and/or a home visit was made by the social worker. The students' teachers and guidance counselors were also actively involved in the process. Alternative school sites, the Bridges Program, tutoring opportunities and other counseling services were considered as appropriate for each student.

Seabreeze has the lowest dropout rate and the highest graduation rate of any high school in our district. Moreover, AP test scores have improved by 15% over last school year's scores.

Through the collaborative efforts of all, Seabreeze High School continues to strive to:

- Encourage teachers to call parents (for behavior, academics, attendance) and document the calls by using Parent Contact Logs when they recognize poor attendance patterns, etc.
- > Increase student engagement in school and community activities
- > Increase graduation rates

- Recognize and provide incentives for perfect attendance and improved attendance for students

Seabreeze High also served as a pilot school during the 2007-2008 school year. As a pilot school, improved attendance was our goal, however the focus on attendance also helped promote academic success at Seabreeze High School. As an entire school body, there is regular emphasis being placed on attendance every day by every member of our school staff. Faculty and staff set high expectations for all students and emphasis is on reaching their fullest potential. As we are aware, "No one rises to low expectations." We consistently recognize the uniqueness of our students and address their specific needs.

Mainland High School believes that good attendance at school is the key to every student's academic success. Because we knew that our daily attendance needed to improve, we set forth to make it one of the things on which we would focus some time and effort. As a result of that decision, the importance of attendance was always addressed in some way within every written and verbal message sent to students and parents. We also knew that we had to encourage close connections between the students and what goes on at school, and in fact, that was the key to our increase in attendance. Some of the specific things that Mainland High School has done to raise our attendance rate are:

- ➤ Attendance of athletes, band members, cheerleaders, and all those who participate in extra curricular activities is reviewed. Those who miss school unexcused are not permitted to participate in the activities.
- Messages concerning the importance of attendance are sent in newsletters, on the web site, and in speeches at school events and in the classroom.
- ➤ Clubs and other venues are created to involve ALL students in something on campus. The most recent organized groups created at Mainland include a Hacky Sack Club, the principal's advisory committee, Public Relations Club, and students as mentors and tutors for Student Learning Community Labs.

Mainland High School will continue to focus on our attendance, but more importantly, on our students.

Our success with improving attendance is truly a cooperative effort between parents, staff, and students.

- ➤ We have an AMAZING school social worker, Carmen Amoros, who is a driving force in our push to improve attendance. She tracks attendance for us, and produces beautiful certificates each month for those with perfect attendance. She posts the names of all students on a bulletin board reserved for this recognition in the cafeteria. We have business partners who donate coupons for meals and other items that are presented to students with perfect attendance.
- Awards are given to students who have perfect attendance (in addition to good behavior and academic progress) for the week. Every Friday, these students are rewarded with a pizza party, ice cream social, or other activity.
- > We use Connect-Ed daily for attendance notification purposes.
- > Barbara Nenno, a teacher who handles attendance, makes personal phone calls each day to check on the whereabouts of absent students.

Euclid Learning Center is proud to be recognized for our efforts in ensuring a high rate of attendance at our school. Our success is due to the dedication and professionalism of our caring staff. Being a small school gives the administrator the opportunity to attend every attendance meeting and to get to know students and parents on an individual basis. We use a team approach toward attendance. Our teachers, guidance counselor, social worker and clerks are involved in encouraging each student that attendance is an important part of their school experience.

Many times it is the small comments that make a large difference. One example of how we demonstrate part of the Volusia County Mission statement, "...through the individual commitment of all..." was seen recently in an interaction between our custodian and a student who had been absent the day before:

Custodian: "We missed you yesterday. Were you sick?"

Student: "No, but thanks for asking."

That may seem like a small thing, but it made such a difference to that student that they mentioned it to me later in the day. Sometimes, just showing that we care is the best way to ensure improved attendance.

Our school social worker, Mrs. Teresa Wright, plays a significant part in this process. Although we have a constantly changing population, efforts are made by Mrs. Wright to contact parents, many times including home visits. She, without a doubt, goes above and beyond her duties and expectations on a daily basis.

Mrs. Teresa Lee, Euclid's attendance clerk, goes above and beyond in her efforts to notify parents of students' absences on a daily basis. When students are at home with no valid excuse for being there, she encourages them to come to school, even if they are late.

In summary, our improved attendance is due to positive social interactions and safe, secure, friendly, family atmosphere. Most of our students enjoy the atmosphere at Euclid Learning Center.
