
## A Retreat Reflection by Mrs. Bartleson, Theology Teacher and Director of Student Life On the evening of March 24th, 122 OLMA students embarked on a service retreat to raise money and awareness for

homelessness. The sophomores and juniors involved in the retreat raised \$4,135 for the Atlantic City Rescue Mission, which provides food and shelter to thousands of homeless people each year. In addition, the Atlantic City Rescue Mission is the largest provider of comprehensive services to about 25% of the state of New Jersey's homeless population. The retreat began at 6 pm with a prayer service led by the Campus Ministry



team. The prayer service centered the students and sent them forth to begin their immersive experience. Students then traveled outside where they worked together to build cardboard structures as part of the Cardboard Box City initiative, an experiential learning experience that other schools, churches and youth groups have been participating in across the country. Students used limited resources, such as tape, scissors, and cardboard to construct their









Recently, Aly competed in the N.J. State Competition






